Forest Fires Cause Immense Damage Over County

Copper Creek Section hit hard. Most of fires are under control but vigilance essential.

Forest fires have broken out in many places during the past week. Damage to young growth trees has been high. Some of the damage was so bad that the trees will not grow again. The U. S. Forest Ranger at Berea has estimated the damage was as high as \$200,000. The loss of timber is hard to figure out because of the potential value of small timber that grows up again. The fires began to break out early last week, after days of the worst fall drought this year. It came at a time when the leaves were falling from the trees, when the grass was dried up, when all vegetation had died and was as inflammable as it could be made.

When I asked the forest ranger about the situation, he made a statement in a calm but stern voice that "no fires of any kind should be made outside of as long as the drought lasts." The combustible possibilities of dry leaves and grass to smolder and the moment a fire gets out, it is hard to spread with overwhelming power and speed.

Some of the fires have been started due to carelessness, some by cigarette ends thrown on the highway, others by hunters and maybe some by tramps.

The Forest Ranger stated that about 2,000 acres of government land was burned over. He could not estimate how much of private land was burned over.

Mr. Clay Colson, of the U. S. Soil Conservation District, said that the fires have done as much damage to the soil as they have done to the trees. He stated that the soil is being washed away and that the trees are being killed.

Local Telephone Receives Notice Of Loan Approved By R.E.A.

R.E.A. headquarters of Washington approves loan of \$225,000 to Mr. J. F. Dees for rebuilding telephone lines in Rockcastle County.

The local Telephone Company of which Mr. J. F. Dees is the president and owner has received word from the R.E.A. of Washington, D. C. has approved a loan of \$225,000.00 for the purpose of reconstructing the present telephone system so that more adequate service can be given. The telegram was sent by Eric C. Clements and Senator J. F. Dees. The telegram read as follows:
J. F. Dees, President of the Telephone Co. Broadhead, Ky. Glad to report REA today approved loan in amount of \$225,000. This money will make possible converting system to dial. Approximately 130 miles new subscribers. Eric C. Clements USS. Thomas R. Underwood

In a statement to us by Mr. Dees, he said that this loan will be fully protected by collateral property of the company and that it will require about a year before construction on the new system can begin. Just why the delay was made is not clear, but apparently there is a lot of red tape that has to be done before a big loan can be made. Mr. Dees stated that there will be a delay in getting the material.

The plan includes the building of 135 miles of telephone lines and an addition of 518 new subscribers. Just what the contract is with the government we were unable to learn. Mr. Dees plans to rebuild the present telephone exchange in Broadhead and put up a new building which will house the new telephone which will be a dial system. An Open Letter To . . . Southern FARMERS

As many of you know, I introduced General Dwight Eisenhower to a Southern farm audience of many thousands in Memphis on October 13. I did so because I am for him heart and soul. As I said in my introduction, I am for him because "he is the best candidate for the good people of the South." Because I am a life-long Democrat, and because my activities as president of the American Farm Bureau Federation for so many years were completely on a non-partisan basis, I feel an obligation to my farmer friends to explain why I have taken this course. The purpose of this letter is to let you know the reasons.

- 1. THE DESPERATE NEED FOR A CHANGE IN ADMINISTRATION; 2. THE GREAT QUALIFICATIONS OF EISENHOWER, THE LEADER AND THE MAN.

You will note that I did not mention our farm program. I did not because our present farm program is not an issue, even though the Trumanites are trying feverishly to make it one. I was part and parcel of the development of our farm program over the years and I can tell you without qualification that it was developed jointly by the farm leadership and the Congressional delegations of the South and other agricultural areas of the country without regard to party affiliation. I personally know this to be true.

and in Memphis General Eisenhower, responding to my introduction, paid tribute to the fair-minded, non-partisan approach which farm leaders in Congress have always taken regarding farm legislation.

It is a cold and indisputable fact that the present Administration is the first to threaten this program which means so much to American agriculture and the Nation. It was the Truman Administration which sponsored the infamous Brannan Plan as a substitute for our present basic program. The only reason we do not have the Brannan Plan today is that the farm leadership and Congressional delegations from agricultural states rose almost to a man and defeated this dastardly proposal which would have regimented and socialized American agriculture. Make no mistake about it—the farmers of America are still threatened with the Brannan Plan. If the Truman Administration succeeds in electing Stevenson, another drive will be made to enact this socialistic legislation.

I say to my friends that under General Eisenhower there will be no Brannan Plan. I say further that our farm program, if ever changed will be changed only after the farmers themselves want it changed, and that such changes will be those that will strengthen, and not disturb, our basic farm program. He has said this publicly and he has reinforced his statement by his personal assurances to me. I THEREFORE NAIL AS LIES STATEMENTS THAT ARE BEING MADE BY MEMBERS OF THE ADMINISTRATION AND THEIR PROPAGANDA AGENCIES, INCLUDING THE PHONY COMMITTEE FOR AGRICULTURE PROGRESS THAT (1) THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY ALONE GAVE US THIS PROGRAM; AND (2) EISENHOWER, IF ELECTED, WOULD TAKE IT AWAY.

I gave two reasons why I like Ike for President. The first has to do with the great need for a change—not only a change in faces but also a change in the type of leadership we have had these last few years.

THERE IS A MESS IN WASHINGTON, AND IT IS DEEP-ROOTED. ONLY A CHANGE IN PARTY LEADERSHIP CAN CLEAN IT UP. This is not, and is not intended to be, a reflection on the character or integrity of Governor Stevenson. Try as he might, if elected, he will owe his office to the crowd that created the mess, and will be thwarted at every turn. These are my reasons for liking Ike and for supporting him fully. I want the farmers of America who have so often honored me to know what those reasons are, and how deeply I feel about them.

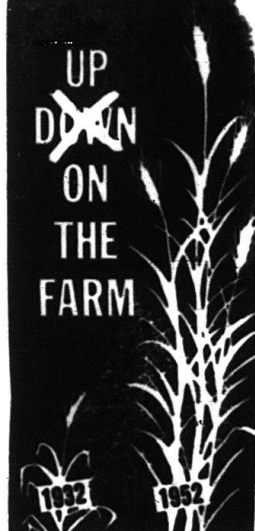

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Cecil Gentry, Ottawa, has just completed a farm pond on his farm. The pond was staked out by the Soil Conservation Service Technicians who also supervised construction so it would meet specifications of the County P M A Committee.

Payments for the pond will be made at the rate of 10 cents per cubic yard of dirt in the dam, by the PMA toward earning the Soil Building payment set up for a farm. Farmers who are building ponds and want them to meet the requirements for payment should contact the SCS or PM A before work begins and have the pond properly located and staked out.

Mr. Gentry plans on stocking his pond with fish so it will provide many hours of recreation as well as a source of food for the family table.

Mr. Fred Hardy, District Biologist with the Dept. of Fish and Wildlife Resources will be in Rockcastle County Nov. 5, to visit all plantings of indigenous biocler and multiferous plants that have been made here with fish pond and cover. He will also pick up at that time all requests made by farmers for these materials for 1953. Farmers can secure these planting materials without cash by placing a request with the Soil Conservation Service or the Conservation Officer for the county.
