**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**

 Apple Crisp with Coconut  
 4 apples  
 1 c coconut  
 Juice of 1 lemon.  
 One fourth c water  
 One half t nutmeg  
 One half c sifted flour  
 Three fourths c brown sugar  
 One-eighth t salt  
 One-fourth c butter or margarine

Peel, core and slice the apples, then alternate with layers of coconut in a buttered baking dish, add water, lemon juice and nutmeg. Combine flour, sugar and salt. Cut in butter. Sprinkle this mixture on top of the apple slices and coconut. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, for 40 minutes, or until apples are tender. Serve warm

with cream, or top with vanilla-ice cream for special occasions.

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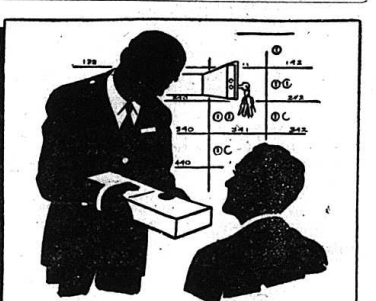

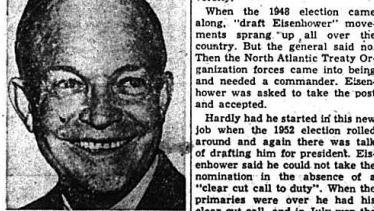

The following auction sale

was handed to us by Mr. Robert J. Ballentine of the McKenzie Court. The McKenzie Court, held just south of Versailles, Kentucky on March 1, 1849. The old items show them look so much out of place in our modern world. Mr. Ballentine and his wife came here from northern Minnesota to spend the winter. The couple has traveled much. They spent one winter in California and another in Florida. They chose Kentucky in order to see some of the historic spots of the state and also enjoy the more temperate climate of this region. Mr. Ballentine is a retired railroad worker and makes it a hobby to collect items of this nature. He told us that he has the record of every town and city that they have visited together with the mileage distances. Here is what that sale bill said:

Having sold my farm, and am leaving for the "Oregon Territory" by ox team, I will offer on March 1, 1849, all of my personal property to wit: - All ox teams except two teams, Buck and Ben and Tom and Jerry; 2 milch cows; 1 gray mare and colt, 1 pair of oxen and yoke; 1 baby yoke, 2 cart, 1 iron plow whose mole board, 80 feet of poplar weather boards, 1,000 3-feet clippings, 1500 10x7 fence rails, 1,600 gallon soap kettle, 85 sugar troughs made of white ash timber; 10 gallons of maple syrup, 30 spinning wheels, 30 pounds of beef tallow; 20 pounds of beef tallow; 1 large loom made by Jerry Wilson, 300 poles; 100 split hoop 100 empty cans; 1 32-gallon barrel of Johnson-Miller whiskey, 7 years old, 20 gallons of apple brandy, 1 40-gallon copper still, 1 dozen oak tanned leather, 1 dozen reap hooks, 2 handle hooks, 3 scythes and cradles, 1 dozen wooden pitchforks, 1000 interest in tan yard, 1 32-caliber rifle, bullet molds and powder horn, 5/16 made by Ben Miller, 30 gallons of soft soap, hams, bacon and lard, 40 gallons of sorghum molasses, 6 head of fox hounds, all soft-mouthed except one. 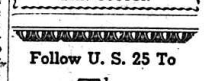
