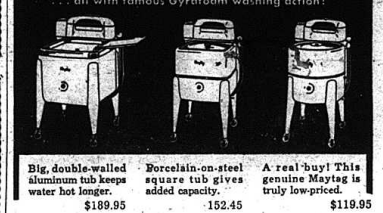

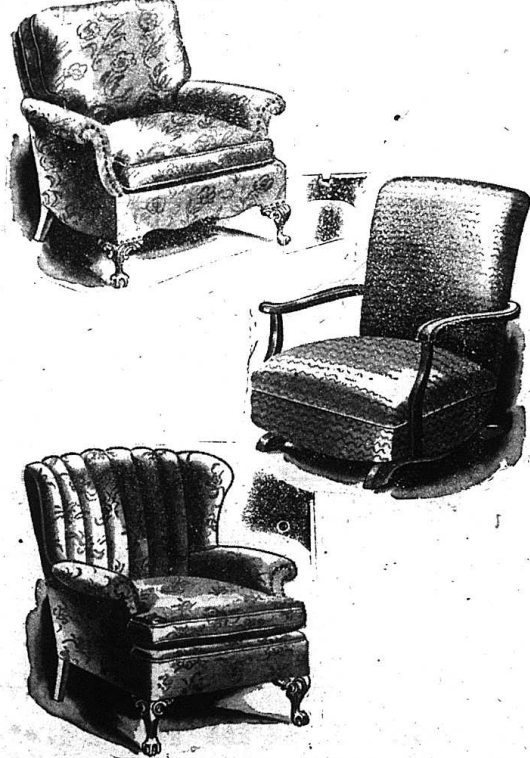

Attempted Bank Robbery Foiled By Local Man

Two Men Die In Crash When Bandit Tries To Escape. Third Man Dies Of Heart Attack At Accident.

It Was No Joke . . . Told to Get In Corner and Be Quiet . . . Loof Bag Is Left

C. Lafe Owens thought a Mt. Vernon bank robber was joking, tried to wrest gun from him and was shot in hand.

The attempted stickup began when Gillis Allen entered the bank, drew a gun and ordered Mrs. Laura Brown (staffing) and Mrs. Ann Miller, clerks, to "get in that corner and be quiet" after they explained they couldn't open the time vault.

Teller Bernard Mitchell can smile now, holding the little bag left behind—and empty by the would-be bank robber.

Probably at no time in the long history of this little city has there ever been an event that had such an aftermath of tragedy as the one that happened last week Thursday when a lone man attempted to rob the Bank of Mount Vernon in broad daylight and failed so tragically.

Three days later on Sunday afternoon three funerals were held simultaneously within a radius of a few miles, all the

is a stickup. They were told to open the door and go inside. They were huddled in a corner of the bank just behind the entrance. "Do as I tell you, don't report this, you will not be hurt," said the bandit to them. Then he asked them to open the safe. The women said that they cannot open the safe. They do not know the combination. For quite a few minutes the bandit and the women argued back and forth about opening the safe. About twenty minutes later Bernard Mitchell, also an employee of the bank arrived at the bank, not knowing what was going on inside. When he unlocked the door, the bandit turned the gun on Mr. Mitchell and on Lafe Owens who was with Mitchell. This is a stickup," he told the two men. Lafe Owens at first thought the man was just kidding but soon realized that it was a serious business. He grabbed the man by the arm and warded off the pistol. In the tussle that ensued the pistol went off, and the bullet hit the ceiling and grazed Owens' index finger. The bandit pushed Owens away from him and then fled in panic. The shot that went off had attracted the attention of Mr. Charles Childress who was standing at the door of Bryant Bros. Store across the street from the bank later Mrs. Ann Miller and Mrs. Laura Brown returned from their noon day lunch to the bank. The bank is usually closed during the noon hour. 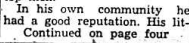

The body of the bandit was taken to the Berea College Hospital where it was later identified as Gillis Allen of Climax and an employee of the Berea Rubber Plant for the past year. The gun he used in the holdup had recently been purchased at Berea. It was a thirty-two caliber pistol. Jack Petresky, plant manager of the Berea Rubber Plant and Clint Henaley, personnel director of the same plant, went to the College Hospital to identify the body. It was difficult for them to realize that this should be the man who would hold up the bank, for he had a perfect record at Berea. It was a job that required a great deal of technical skill. It meant that he would have to know the exact amount ingredients to be mixed. Allen was one of the plants top men.

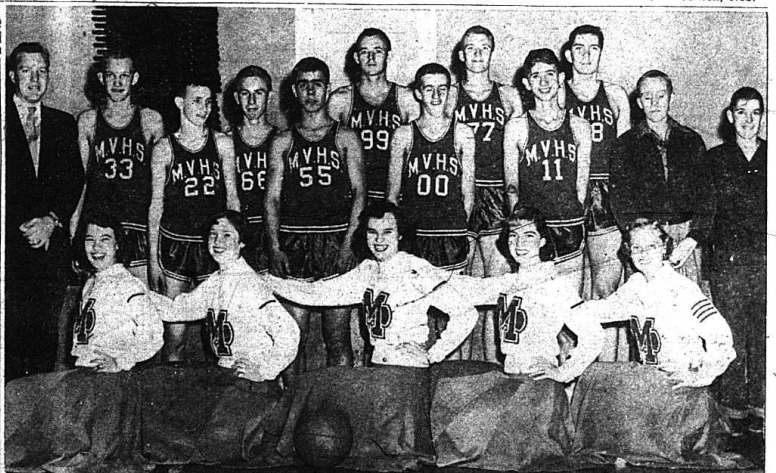

It was a great shock to this community to hear of the sudden death of Luther Howard in Mt. Vernon Saturday Dec. 6. He was born Jan. 8th 1907, making him 45 years, eleven months and eight days of age at the time of his death. He was married to Lettie Gibson who preceded him in death in 1947. 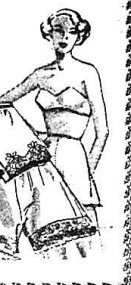

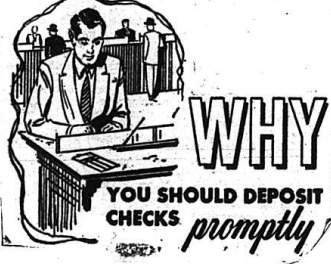

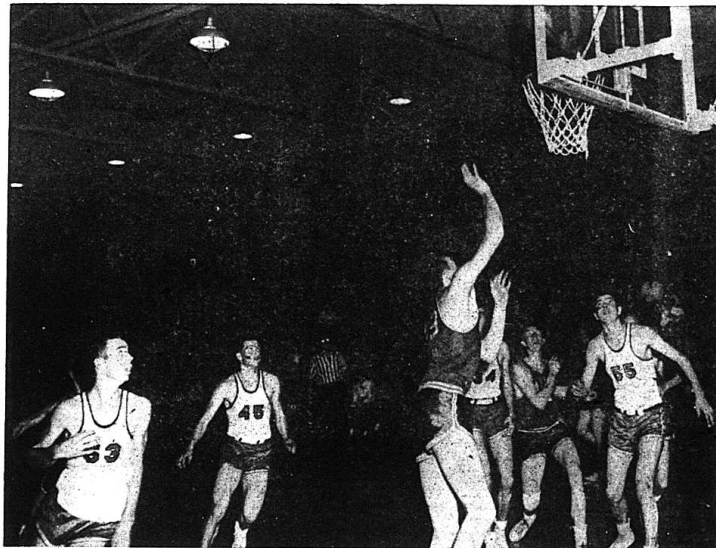
