HAS 43 YEAR RECORD IMPROVING PASTURES

Forty three years ago, Knox Brown of Spencer county started a pasture improvement and conservation program on his farm. That he has done a good job was proved recently when he was named the district master pasturistman by judges who had inspected many other good farms.

The main points in Brown's pasture program, observed Nevin L. Goebel, county agent for the University of Kentucky, have been the control of weeds, fertilization, and keeping pasture land in pasture. In addition, new clovers and grasses have been used on the farm. All but three acres of the 341 acre farm have been limed, and all fields that indicate a need for phosphate through soil tests have been so treated.

Civil Defense officials estimated in Kentucky to bring mate 68,000 persons will be needed in Kentucky to bring the state up to full strength in the round Observer program for civilian aircraft spotters. Kentucky ranks 2nd among the 48 states in the production of flutopar, 8rd in bituminous coal, and 4th in fire and ball clay. Kentucky has never been a wholly agricultural state. Back in 1810, with a population of a little over 400,000 it had 2,000 distilleries, 267 tanneries, more than 24,000 looms, 38 rope works, and 36 salt processing plants as well as iron furnaces, cloth and paper mills, forges and wagon factories. Car And Truck Collision Injure Airman

Standard Oil Truck driven by Bill Coffey is hit by Chevrolet at Calloway on U. S. 25.

Three men narrowly escaped death when a fast moving Chevrolet driven by James Jauck of Detroit, Mich., ran into the Standard Oil Truck driven by Bill Coffey of Mt. Vernon. The accident happened early Tuesday about 8 o'clock in the morning on U. S. 25 near Calloway, south of Mt. Vernon. The Chevrolet car was coming around a sharp curve and was unable to stay in line but passed at least a yard wide in the wrong lane. The Standard Oil truck was going south and was caught on the door. The impact tore off the front wheel of the Chevrolet and upset the gasoline truck. Bill Coffey was pinned beneath the truck but was able to break a hole in the windshield and creep out of the cab. He was un-

injured. Traffic on the highway was held up for at least two hours and the string of cars stretched for a mile in both directions. It so happened that one of the large car hauling trucks got ditched as it attempted to get by the wreck, and held up the traffic for an hour before it could be pulled out of the mud. The Bales' Garage from Livingston had to use two wrecker trucks to right the turned over gasoline truck. Gasoline had been spilled over the highway and a spark could have ignited the gasoline. Fortunately the damage to the truck was considerable. The car was practically a complete wreck.

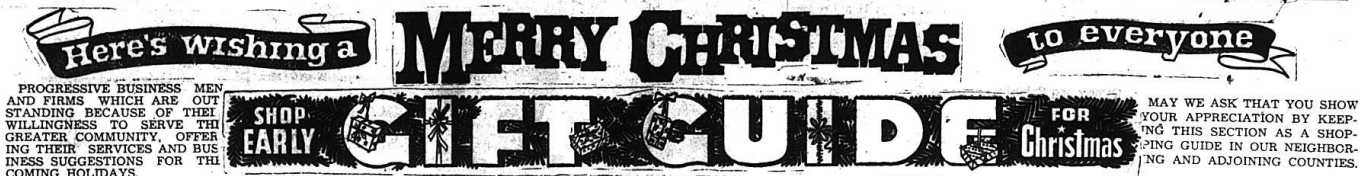

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

It looks like another big year for grassland farming in 1953 for New Cooperators of the Rockcastle County Soil Conservation district. Clay Colson work unit, conservation of the soil. Conservation Service has given more assistance to farmers on renovating, seeding, improvement and management of pastures than on any other one of the long list of Conservation practices.

Farmers are applying a number of practices such as contouring, terraces, diversions, liming, stockwater development, pastures, cover crops, liming and phosphate and potash in a coordinated program designed to use every acre within its capacity and treat it according to its needs for protection and improvement.

Farmers cooperating with the district have treated and seeded 200 acres to grassland grazing land in 1952. More farmers are turning to grassland farming every year.

Probably the greatest lesson learned during the extremely dry year was the importance of having an adequate acreage of drought resistant perennial grasses and legumes for grazing and hay. Hundreds of farmers saw on Henry Brown's farm how services without the dry weather. As a result of this demonstration and others like it the acreage of service is expected to be greatly increased in 1953.

Another lesson learned during the dry weather was the importance of farm ponds. Farmers found that ponds located and constructed ponds were life savers by providing stock water and also decreasing the loss of fish to swimming and fishing.

Farmers are making requests at the Soil Conservation Service office for assistance in their 1953 Conservation work. Mr. Albert Ramsey Clear Creek

Nevertheless, ever since the time of the wise men from the east, gifts have been brought and laid at the feet of Christ, in one way or another.



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Wisdom

What a treasure of wisdom, through these 19 centuries, have been poured out for the Master's service. Not that men can make God wise; but the wisdom and learning of mankind can be added to the wisdom and learning of Christ and his cause. To have one fact alone, the translation of the Bible into hundreds of languages throughout the world, the work of translating can never stop, because languages are ever changing; the English and the French of this century are not the same as they were centuries ago, and Bibles translated for those times become hard to understand in our day.

Not that a new English translation is needed every few years; but somewhere, all the time, into some language or other, this work is being carried on. It is no simple job; a translator must not only know Greek and Hebrew, but also, and very thoroughly, the language into which the translator is making. Most good translations are made by groups, for many heads are better than one at this work.

When we add to the work of the translators all that other scholars have done, all the brain work that has gone into the printing and binding of the books and distributing them in many ways; we can see what the devotion of intellectual talents has meant, through the centuries, to the Christian religion.

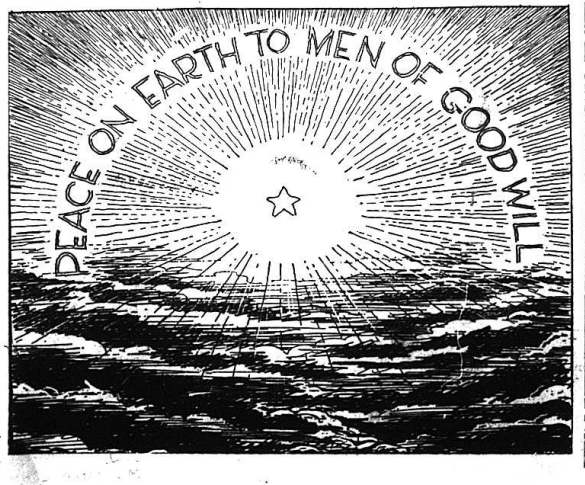
