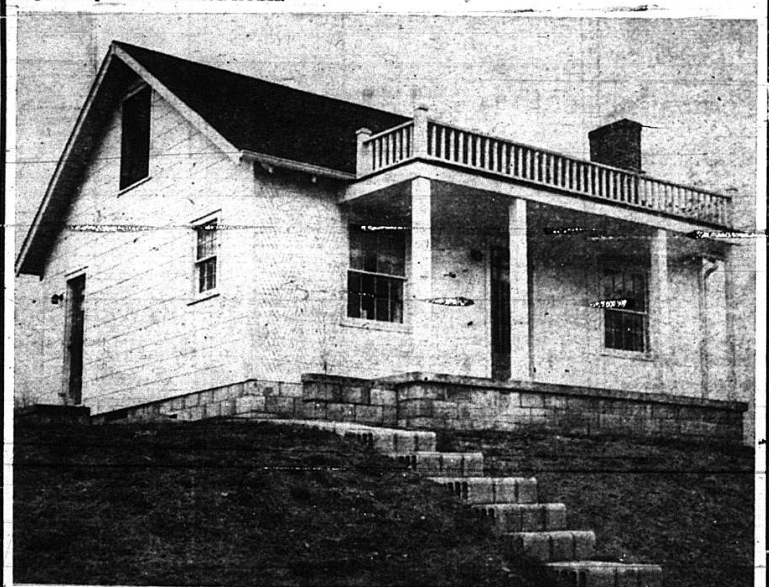

Three Different Fires Destroy Buildings

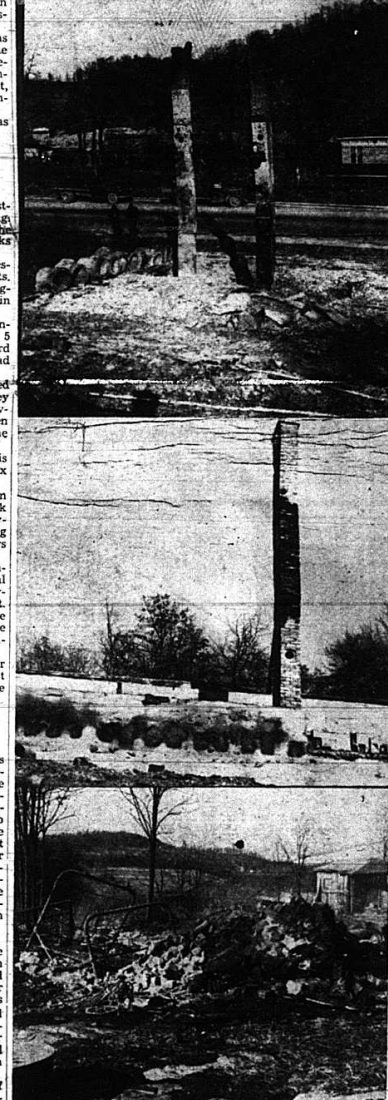
Almost simultaneously three buildings were razed by flames Sunday night in County.

Paris Publisher Taken By Death

Jess March Alverson Sr., publisher of the Paris Enterprise died last Friday. He was 79. He died at the Bourbon Co. Hospital which he entered Tuesday for the second time after suffering a heart attack six weeks ago.

Alverson had spent virtually his entire adult life in the news paper business, starting as an apprentice printer 63 years ago. He also had served in the State House of Representatives.

He had operated the Harlan Enterprise as a weekly newspaper for six years before converting it to a daily in August, 1928. Nine years later he sold the paper and moved to Lexington, but came out of retirement in 1924 to become editor and publisher of the weekly Paris Enterprise. It later was changed to a daily.

Exhibits to Feature Farm, Home Convention

Exhibits of equipment and demonstrations dealing with many phases of farm activities will be a feature of the 41st annual Farm and Home Convention at the University of Kentucky at Lexington Feb. 3-6. Implement dealers, building equipment associations and irrigation equipment companies will cooperate in the displays.
Included in the special exhibit will be irrigation equipment, seeding and fertilizing machinery, metal building materials, farm building material and equipment for the care of bees.
Demonstrations will deal with soils, fertilizer seed crops, feeds, insects, fruits, vegetables, fire protection for forests, livestock poultry and marketing.
The Kentucky Geological Survey will have a special exhibit to which visitors may take rock and mineral specimens for identification. They should be brought to the person bringing them and should be delivered in person.
The convention will start Tuesday morning, Feb. 3, with a general session for all men and women in the Memorial Coliseum. After that day, women will meet in Memorial Coliseum, men in the Agricultural Building. 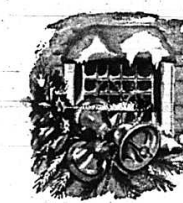
