

4 Kentucky 4-H'ers Earn High Honors



HIGH HONORS were accorded four Kentucky 4-H'ers for their top records in the 1952 National 4-H Dress, Farm and Home Electric, Safety, Field Crops programs. Each received an educational trip to the 1953 National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, November 30-December 4. Highlights of their club careers are given below.

Edith Sue Terry - Representing Kentucky in the National 4-H Dress Review program will be Edith Sue Terry, 21, Valley Station. Through her 4-H project work, planning and sewing a harmonious ensemble has become a simple matter to Edith Sue. Her good grooming habits improved personality and a considerable savings in dollars have also been gained along the way. For her prize-winning ensemble, Edith wore a two-piece brown costume of matching jacket, a dusty pink short-sleeved, white blouse, brown hat, white gloves stitched in brown, and brown lizard shoes and bag. The skirt of her dressmaker suit has a kick-pleat in the center back, and the perky poodle cloth coat is soft and full. Edith will be the guest of Simplicity Pattern Co. at the Chicago Club Congress.

An outstanding 4-H Field Crops record yielded state honors to Shirley Vaughn, 16, of Campbellsville. Living on the 116-acre farm of her parents, the T. H. Vaughns, she put to good use the skill and know-how gained during two years in field crops. Keeping farm machinery in top-notch condition, careful selection and treatment of seed, and scientific methods of soil conservation, helped her in the growing of her crop. From March 3 when she burned the tobacco bed and sowed it on the 5th until the stripping was begun on October 10th, some 300 man hours were spent on her half-acre tobacco project. This ambitious farmerette ended up with 35 to 40 leaves in a hand, twelve hands on a stick and 204 stripped tubs including the prime tobacco.

All these national 4-H programs are conducted under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

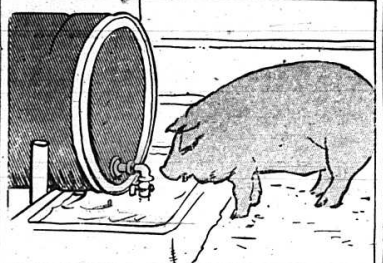

Three Members Of Family Wiped Out In Wreck

Mr. and Mrs. Caleb Todd and son Thurman of near Berea killed in crash.

Last Tuesday the lifeless bodies of three members of one family were carried into the church auditorium at Berea, all the victims of a head-on collision, that happened on a bridge between Jellico, Tenn., and Williamsburg, Ky. On Saturday afternoon, when the car in which the family were returning home, skidded on the icy pavement and crashed into a station wagon that happened to pass at that very moment. Two other persons riding in the station wagon were also killed.

The three members of the family were Mr. Caleb Howard Todd 71, his wife Lizzie Todd, 61, and their son Thurman. Other members of the family riding in the car were Mrs. Thurman Todd and two daughters, Louise 14 and Brenda 6. Mrs. Thurman Todd was at the wheel. Apparently she applied the brakes when the road was icy and caused the car to skid.

The elderly Todd was taken to a hospital in a nearby town while the son Thurman was taken to another one a few miles away after they were admitted. The two other persons killed were Mrs. Robert W. Schenk of Columbus, and Mrs. M. Parker 65 the Schenk family maid. The Schenks were driving to Florida.

Mr. and Mrs. Caleb Todd lived on a farm near Williamsburg Road west of Berea. Mr. Todd had been a mail carrier out of Berea for 30 years. He only retired a year and a half ago.

Thurman Todd was a very successful attorney at Fredericksburg, Va., and for the last few years he was the prosecuting attorney of Knox County at Mt. Vernon, Ohio.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at the First Baptist church in Berea with the Reverend O. B. Mylum officiating. He was assisted by Reverend Willie Rogers of Paint Lick.

Surviving members of the family are one son Willard of Berea, Mrs. Thelma Hume of Richmond.

Berea To Play Mt. Vernon Saturday Night

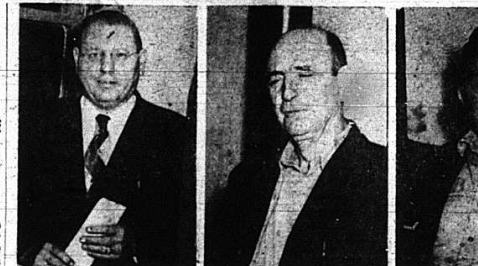

Former Circuit Judge Dies

Judge James S. Sandusky of Somerset was killed instantly at 4:40 o'clock Monday afternoon when his car which he was driving was struck by a southbound Southern Railway locomotive at a crossing in Science Hill, Ky. He was born Sept. 2, 1881 in Wayne county, being the son of Elizabeth Cooper and J. J. Sandusky.

He was married in Wayne county Aug. 4, 1907.

He was elected County Clerk of Georgetown in 1905 appointed postmaster at Monticello in 1910; he was elected county judge of Wayne county in 1914 and re-elected for a 4 year term in 1922. He was elected Wayne County attorney in 1926. Two years later he was elected commonwealth's attorney in the district composed of Wayne, Pulaski, Clinton and Rockcastle counties. He was elected Circuit Judge of the 23rd Judicial District in 1934 and re-elected in 1940.

Judge Sandusky had made his home in Somerset for the past 23 years, coming here from Monticello.

He was a member of the Somerset Baptist Church.

Surviving are three daughters, Miss Evelyn Sandusky, Kingsport, Tenn., Mrs. Donald Massey, Somerset, Mrs. Melvin Massey, Georgetown, Ky.; one son, Bill Sandusky, Somerset, two sisters, Dr. Sarah Eads and Mrs. M. Berea Banker Wounded By Assailant

John F. Dean, president of the Berea Bank and Trust Company was seriously injured when he was shot by 80-year-old man Jim Stivers of Richmond, Va., Monday morning at about 8:15 o'clock. Stivers had taken the early morning Greyhound bus from Richmond to Berea, arriving at Berea at about 7 o'clock. Almost blind and unable to recognize a person he groped his way to the window of the bank only a short distance away, waited for Mr. Dean. When several persons approached him in the lobby he asked them who they were and in that manner he hoped to be able to identify the banker. When Dean arrived at the bank he greeted Stivers with a "good morning." Thereupon Stivers told him that he had some business to do and Dean asked him to come inside the bank where it is warmer. "That would be better" he said.

As Dean attempted to unlock the door of the bank, Stivers handed him a bunch of papers purported to be some old notes. It was then that Stivers pulled out the pistol and fired at Dean at close range. Apparently the first shot fell Dean. A second and a third shot went wild and hit the woodwork of the entrance hallway. Cecil Jackson, one of the K-Taxi drivers was standing near by and immediately tackled the old man and wrestled the pistol from him. Dean staggered into the doorway of the Carleton Restaurant next to the bank, where several persons gathered. He was called for an ambulance to take him to the hospital. It was found that the bullet entered the left side of Dean's chest, pierced part of the liver and made two holes in his large intestine. The bullet had passed through the abdomen and was stopped just below the surface of the

skin on the opposite side.

Blood plasma was given Mr. Dean and the last report is quite favorable and the doctors believe that he will recover.

There were several witnesses to the shooting including some of the taxi-drivers and some painters who were working just outside the stairway of the bank building.

Stivers told police at Richmond that he had canceled notes from the bank and returning them to the bank for some unknown reason. Upon examination of the papers that Stivers delivered to Dean that morning it was learned that there was one small note signed by Stivers back in 1949 and was held by the late J. D. Clarkston. The other papers were mortgages signed by James Stivers and Mrs. Stivers. Neither of the papers had anything to do with the Berea Bank and Trust Co. and officials are at a loss why Stivers should have perpetrated the act. All that the bank officials have done for Stivers was to cash his pension checks that he received monthly from the government. Stivers was a Spanish War veteran.

Stivers is now in the Richmond jail and a warrant charging Stivers with malicious shooting with intent to kill will be placed against him.

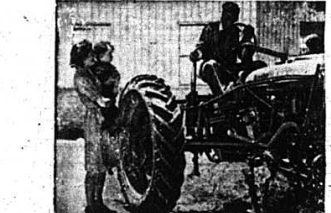

Farmers Income May Drop



The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that almost everybody will be making more money than the farmer when 1952 results are added up. Expenditures by consumers, business and government will exceed a year ago. The farmer will wind up with 3% to 5% less net income due to the price-cost squeeze on agriculture. "Farmers' production expenses will probably reach an all-time high record, according to available estimates with higher wage scales for help, higher feed costs and higher machinery costs," says C. R. Schoby, president of the American Dairy Association. "Farm machinery prices in many cases are now 165% higher than 1952-53" he added, "and efficient farming requires a lot more equipment than 20 years ago. A farmer starting out today can easily invest \$5,000 to \$8,000 in machinery which is out of the question for many young couples. "But with high labor costs new machinery is a necessity if the dairy farm operator is to succeed. It is estimated that new machinery makes it possible to care for as much as 75% more crops and livestock than in the horse and milk-

Confess-Follow

Lesson for January 11, 1953

ANOTHER of those Bible words which are easy to misunderstand, is the word "confess". Ordinarily we connect this word in our minds with a court of law, or with some wrong that has been done.

But there is another meaning of these words "confess" and "confession" which is quite different. It does not always mean to admit.

The expression is often used, referring to Peter's reply to Christ: "You are the Christ," and it has come to be known as "Peter's confession".

Christ Never Outranked There is something else tied up in this idea of "confessing Christ." It has to do with the fact that Christ Peter's confession, according to Matthew, was "You are the Christ of God."

More than 1800 Christians But there is still another word the church has always used. Because Jesus used it, follow Confession alone is not enough. It may take courage to confess Christ. It takes sincerity and also stick-to-it-ness to follow him.
