Madison Jury Holds Stivers To Be Insane

James Stivers was declared to be of unsound mind by a jury in Madison Circuit Court Monday morning.

Stivers, an 80-year-old veteran of the Spanish-American war, was charged with shooting and wounding John F. Dean, 72, resident of the Berea Bank and Trust Company on Jan. 5.

Dean was shot at 8:20 a. m.

in front of the bank. Stivers told a jury Monday morning that he regretted his eyesight was so bad that all three of the bullets he fired did not strike Dean. Stivers said he shot Dean because of a note that Dean had written.

A notary public produced two notes given to the Bank by the Stivers, both containing the name of Stivers' wife as well as his. The last note was executed in May, 1949, and according to records Mrs. Stivers died in June 1949. Stivers had claimed that the note was executed after Mrs. Stivers died.

Dean was in court Monday morning and told of the shooting.

Two Richmond doctors who examined Stivers at the Madison county jail last Friday testified that Stivers was of unsound mind and should be sent to the Eastern State hospital.

Stivers said he was "railroaded" to the state hospital in 1909 but did not give the reason.

Mrs. Cecie Tharpe, Madison circuit clerk, read from records that a jury found Stivers of unsound mind on July 9, 1924, and he was sent to Eastern State hospital. She said she had no record of his release.

Ralph Dean, son of John F. Dean signed the lunacy.

Mr. John Dean has recovered sufficiently to be out and was able to testify.

## Soil Conservation News

A group of farmers, veterans on The Farm Training and F. F. A. boys met Tuesday, Feb. 24, to discuss woodland management. Mr. Gene Orin, soil conservation forester, led the discussion. Mr. Orin pointed out to the men the effects of fire and grazing on woodland. The use of chemicals in killing undesirable or cull trees was demonstrated. Amate was used on the largertrees. Two level teaspoonful was put in notches or frills around the base of the tree. The use of 2-3-5T. Diese oil applied with a "cornell" tool was also demonstrated. Everyone present had the opportunity to actually use the equipment. Mr. Orin showed the men how to use a setting bar in setting seedling trees.

Short leaf pine, tulip, locust and walnut trees were set out. Mr. Orin pointed out to the group the importance of killing cull trees on land that was suited to red cedar and where plenty of young trees were coming up but were being crowded out by large scrub trees. The statement made by Mr. Orin that more returns could be made for the money spent in making a cutting or killing of undesirable trees so that these adapted could grow, than for money spent on any other crop including tobacco, caused the men to show a lot of interest in this kind of work.

### REVIOL CONTINUES

Evangelist D. O. Brown of London, Ky., will continue the revival meeting at West Main Old Holiness Church. Every one welcome.

At least three cases have been treated for mad dog and fox bites and all persons owning dogs or pet cats are asked to take every precaution against this dreaded disease. Last Monday morning three persons who were bitten by a red fox were taken to the office of Dr. Walker Owens and for the purpose of diagnosis and treatment. All three cases were in widely scattered parts of the county. In the Red Hill section of the county, not far from Livingston, a red fox attacked a young boy by the name of Fred Tankersley Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Tankersley. The fox came into the Tankersley's yard where he attacked the boy, bit him on the feet and legs. The lad attempted to brush off the fox but could not. The father was nearby and was able to kill the fox with a rifle. The head of the fox was sent to the laboratory at the University of Kentucky at Lexington and declared positive, meaning that the fox had rabies.

Two other cases were reported last Monday. Clarence Burdette of the Disputata region was bitten by a mad dog. The third case was that of Taft Balfour of Level Green. In all three cases, the animals were declared positive.

Last Monday Dr. Owens gave each one of the victims the Pasteur treatment for rabies as a protection against hydrophobia. Each patient will have to take 14 shots for 14 days. This makes five cases of rabies reported in the county this year and the chances are that a mad dog or fox can do great deal of damage, not only to human beings, but to livestock as well. The livestock in turn can spread the disease to other animals or individuals.

Prevention measures are being taken by the county health officer by asking that every person owning a dog or cat that they be immunized against the disease. Clinics will be set up next in Brodhead, Livingston and Mount Vernon where persons can get their animals vaccinated. At Brodhead it will be on Wednesday and Mount Vernon on Thursday. The time will be from 10 o'clock in the morning until two in the afternoon. The place at Brodhead will be at Lawson's Mill, at Livingston at Bales Garage and at Mount Vernon at the courthouse. The charge for the vaccine is \$1.00 per animal.
