Our Living Lord

Lessons for April 4, 1953

WHAT does Easter mean? It is a question we may well ask ourselves each year. The visitor from Mars might be hard time answering the question for himself. He would see Easter sales advertised in the department stores and he might think Easter was a name for a special kind of bargain. Or he would hear about an Easter parade, or he would conclude that Easter is a time mainly for showing off new clothes. Or on a college campus he would hear about the Easter vacation, and he might suppose that it is just a name for a holiday from work. Then he might come to a flock of children hugging for Easter eggs, and he would suppose that Easter meant "gaily colored."

As a matter of fact, even if he went to church, he might get strange ideas about what Easter means.

Springtime And Roses

To hear some people talk—yes, and even some sermons—one might fancy that Easter is a festival, a reminder of the time when the sun is shining, the days grow longer, the nights shorter; flowers begin to scatter over the hill-sides, the grass Dr. Foreman grows greener every week.

In the far northern states there are heavy thaws, more snow melts than falls. In the far southern states "warm weather" has already come, the flowers are in bloom, visitors from the north are coming down to look at the famous gardens in Charleston and Mobile and other places.

Is Easter just a way of celebrating springtime in church? The birds, the roses, the Easter music—are they all the signs of spring? Is Easter a symbol of the resurrection of dead nature, is Easter a sign that nature never really dies, that warmth follows cold, that when winter comes, spring is not far behind?

No, this is not it. For it was all then when the last winter comes, when the snow melts, when the grass grows cold—or perishes in collision with some flaming sun—then what becomes of spring? No, all springs will end some time when the world ends. Easter celebrates something that will outlast all the springs of this world.

Life After Death

Listen again to the talk in church, to other sermons, be much closer to the Easter truth than all the talk of springtime and roses. You will hear much said about immortality, about life beyond this life, about the "beautiful life of somewhere." Easter, it is said, is to remind us that we are immortal souls; that we are immortal life is another one, that no soul ever dies.

Well, it does remind us of this. But suppose that were all? The mere belief in immortality is not by itself religious. Look nearly everybody around you who will be living tomorrow. Does that make everybody religious? You know it doesn't.

Now suppose everybody believed he would be living, somewhere, somehow, a thousand years from now; would that make everybody religious? Of course not. Suppose it is true that no soul ever dies? That may well be a horrible thought. There may be (and most Christian churches believe that there are) persons who since gone from this world to hell, who cannot die but who wish very much that they could.

Immortality, Christians believe, is a fact; but believing in that fact alone, all by itself, is not necessarily religious and it may be no comfort at all. Easter must mean more than this!

Lord of Life And Death

The real meaning of Easter cannot be expressed by any sentence that leaves Jesus Christ out. Easter celebrates this: He is risen, Christ is risen indeed. He is, of course, much more than that once upon a time there was a man who lived and came back to life after being dead some 36 hours.

What we Christians mean by it is that the same person who was Teacher and Master and Saviour and King is the Lord of life, of life itself.

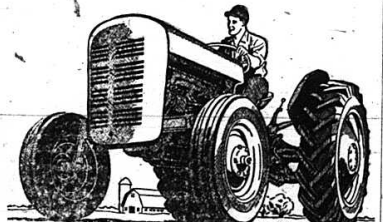

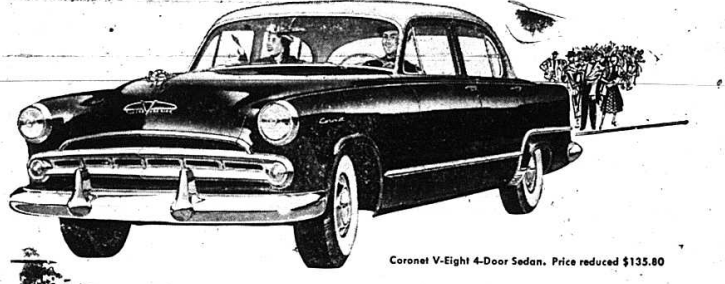

The University of Kentucky's fifth annual Kentucky Highway Conference will be conducted at the University of Kentucky, Lexington, Kentucky, during the week of April 14-15. The event will be held in conjunction with the UK College of Engineering and the Kentucky Department of Highway. Chief purpose of the conference is to bring together state, county and city engineers, highway contractors and others interested in the design, construction and maintenance of State and national highways.

still in that those who take a momentary community should put something back. McKay's civic work led to his being elected mayor. He next was elected to the state legislature. When World War II started he cut short any further political career and although handling his military obligations he remained in service until the Japanese had capitulated. Back in the States he resumed his citizenship once more, he was stunned one day in 1947 when the Governor, the Senate President and the House Speaker all were killed in an airplane accident. A few days later the Oregon Republicans tossed in McKay's hat for governor. He was elected. In 1950, he was re-elected to a four-year term with the biggest vote any Oregon gubernatorial candidate ever received. He left the governorship to join President Eisenhower's team.

At 59, Douglas McKay feels that the Interior Secretaryship now gives him an opportunity to do something for the "public good" of what America has given him. Two actions as Governor of Oregon characterized his public sentiment philosophy. He closed Oregon Indian reservation schools, and brought the Indian youngsters into the public schools and lawfully repealed all state laws discriminating against Indians. And when a vast acreage of public lands was donated and left barren, he organized a great locally financed and locally managed reforestation program. He replaced helicopters, instead of relying on the federal government to do it.

At the Interior Secretary he wants gradually to end the government's jurisdiction over the Indians, give them full citizenship responsibilities and when they become self-reliant, Paternalism for anyone, he thinks is destructive. He believes in private enterprise, he said at the close of the interview "But it must earn its way. For instance, at the University of Kentucky, we are offering our government. It holds great promise for the future. At the proper time, I believe the government should be transferred to private industry, but not as a gift. There are on the other hand, some individual projects which seem to be of public ownership and in such cases I think public ownership and private ownership can and must work side by side.

Institute speakers will include Dr. Howard W. Beers, head of the departments of Sociology and Political Science at the University of Kentucky; Dr. Samuel W. Blizard, Pennsylvania State College economist and sociologist; Harper Gotton executive vice president of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce and Sam Ezelle, Kentucky secretary of the American Federation of Labor.

Of its 201 men, only 28 survived. Most of his right arm was terribly shattered, was given a lifetime of physical pain being handicapped.
