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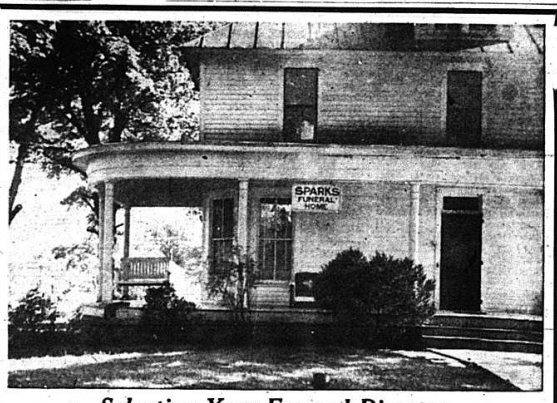

**THE BIBLE SPEAKS**

International Children's Service

**A Man New-Born**

Lesson for April 12, 1953

THE most important convert Christianity ever made was one of the very first ones. He was important not only for his own times but for ours too. His thinking set the pattern for Christians thought ever since. His writings, or rather the truths he brought out in his writings, have been at the heart of most of the revivals from early times to now.

Sometimes the Christian church has gone too far in admiration of this man. Because his conversion was spectacular, some have thought (mistakenly) that all true conversions are spectacular. Because he always thought like a lawyer, some have thought (again mistakenly) that all true Christian thought must be legalistic. In short, some Christians have put this man ahead of Jesus Christ. Such mistakes should not blind us to the man's real and tremendous importance. Those who plan these Dr. Foreman Bible studies have set aside the next three months for a review of this one man's life and some of his writings.

**Outside the City**

His name is Paul, though the church very respectfully usually calls him "Saint" Paul. He was a city-bred, city-bred man. But as Providence would have it, the most important thing that ever happened to him came to pass in the open country, on a windswept road that is still the main highway from the city of Jerusalem to the city of Damascus, in Syria. Born in the city, re-born in the country, his conversion since, the story of his conversion has been often told; indeed in the book of Acts it is told three separate times (chapters 9, 22, 26), once in Luke's words, twice in Paul's. There was no church, no preacher, no personal workers; no hymns were sung, and no meeting at all, no visitation evangelism. It happened like a stroke of lightning. Inside of five minutes or less, Paul for Saul he was then called, had been changed from an anti-Christian to a Christian. Not a man, but a baby Christian. Being new-born into the Christian life is a little like being newborn into the human life; there is a period of babyhood first, when the newborn soul hardly knows what to do and needs much guidance and help. But in those few minutes on the Damascus Road, the whole direction of his life was changed.

**In the City**

Paul's conversion had some unique features, startling and extraordinary. But the story of it in Acts 22 reports two questions that belong in every Christian conversion. "Who are you, Lord?" and "What shall I do, Lord?" A true conversion is a turning toward Christ. Turning away from one's old life is not the whole of it and not the most important part of it. When a driver on a country road realizes he has taken the wrong fork, and turns around to go in the other direction, which is the more important, that he now has his back to the wrong direction or that he has his face in the right direction? Conversion is from, but more importantly, conversion is to. To Christ first of all. True conversion is not produced by coming-face to face with one's better self but with Jesus. And yet, this is only a start. What was that was that was Saul went into Damascus to find out. What was that Ananias came to tell him. Saul needed what all new-born Christians need, a Christian friend, Christian fellowship.

**The New City**

Paul was and remained a city man. Most of the great experiences of his life were connected with cities. But from that day at Damascus to the end of his life, there was one city above all others that claimed Paul's allegiance. It is the City of God, the New City. Conversion can be looked at and described in many ways. But one good way is to compare it to taking out citizenship papers in the Kingdom of Heaven. Paul said once, as Moffatt translates Paul, 3:20, "We are a colony of heaven." That was not a figure of speech with him. Paul would have passed any loyalty test.

**MACEDONIA**

While out for that week-end drive you see where the plow has been busy breaking up the soil. It is time to begin new planting. The person who has a green thumb itching all winter can now get it dirty, for nature is ready to start growing again.

Food and other commercial crops are the main things planted on farm lands, but what is growing on those barren steep hillsides and dry ridge tops. Nature has arranged things so that trees will grow where it doesn't pay to plant farm crops. Those barren spots will grow locust fence posts, Christmas trees, pulp wood, sawlogs and veneer logs. These as you can see all put money in the pocket.

Why not plan to plant two or three thousand trees each year. The seedling trees can be gotten from private tree nurseries, the State Department of Conservation, the Soil Conservation Service or, through the County Farm Bureau, at very reasonable prices.

Maybe a little information on planting trees would be helpful. These should be planted about 6 feet apart each way. That means when you order trees it will require about 1200 to plant an acre of land. For costs of planting, it will be possible for one man to plant an average of 500 trees per day without getting a broken back from planting.

When the trees are received from the nursery, they should be unpacked at once, the bundles opened and the trees spread out in a trench. This trench should be the depth of a shovel. After the trees are all placed against one side of the trench, then cover the roots with dirt and pack it down to keep the roots from drying up.

When taking the trees from the trench to plant, they should

## Opinion of Court Sustains Injunction in Church Case

### Judge Tartar gives friendly advice to church to make organization more effective and permanent.

The opinion of the circuit court sustained the injunction in the case of James Pittman, Milie Swinney and Otis Rash trustees of the Unorganized Free Preachers of a Holiness church of Mount Vernon plaintiffs versus D. O. Brown, Sod Decker and Ledford Helton, defendants. The trial was held last Wednesday in circuit court before Judge Tartar of Somerset. The trial consumed almost the entire day. Many witnesses were heard who testified in the case. J. P. Allen represented the plaintiffs and Mr. Mayberry from London represented the defendants.

The Judge made it clear that his interest does not lie in the creed of the church, that is a matter for the church to decide, but what he wanted to know was how the property was purchased and who were the duly elected officers.

The petition stated that the defendants "unlawfully invaded the church house of worship—and have caused great confusion and disturbance by that they are 'preaching heresy and a strange doctrine.'"

The story is that the Reverend D. O. Brown, an evangelist from London held services in the Mount Vernon church and that the trustees were unwilling to have the church open for these services. The door was locked and later was broken open by the defendant Sod Decker.

In his opinion Judge Tartar made a plea for unity and asked that the "Holiness" Church make plans for a better organization, make a permanent roll and take full minutes of all business proceedings. He stated that the church would have no protection by law so long as there were no written records.

In his opinion the Judge stated that he would like to release the injunction against M. Decker but he could not do so because Decker himself admitted of forcing the lock.

Chief witnesses for the plaintiffs were Mr. Pittman, Bro. George Murphy, Otis Rash, Milie Swinney and Mr. Shivel. For the defendants they were continued on page eight
