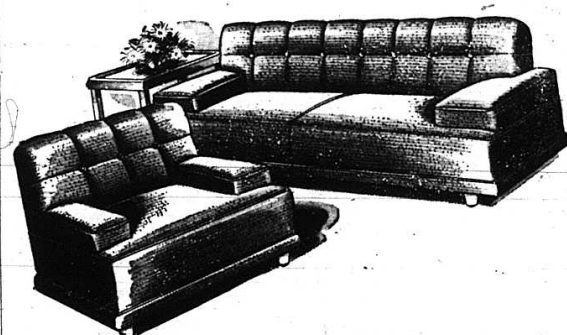

PFC Paul Blanton of Brodhead First U. S. Soldier to be Exchanged Monday

Orville R. Mullins, formerly from Rockcastle Co. was the other Kentuckian to be listed on exchange list.

Word of Paul O. Blanton's release from the Communist prison came to the members of his family in a very startling manner. A small radio, operated by a battery, sounded the first message that the family had of their son's release. The father, Matt Blanton had been listening to the radio for news. He had just heard Murrow's news broadcast and then an announcement was made of the exchange of prisoners. The father of the boy listened and the first name mentioned was that of his own son. It was such glad news and when the reporter asked them what they thought, they answered "We are thankful to God that he is coming back to the United States. We want to thank God all the credit for his safety."

The announcement reached the Blantons at about 7:15 p. m. Monday evening. The father called again at the home for further information. Just then, at about 8:30 p. m. the telegram from Army Headquarters arrived. It read as follows:

April 21, Louisville
To Matt Blanton c/o Carle Blanton Rt. 2 Brodhead, Ky.
The Secretary of the Army has asked me to inform you that your son Pfc. Paul O. Blanton has been released by communist forces to the United Nations custody under the agreement to exchange sick and wounded personnel.

You will be notified by telegram the earliest possible moment of his physical condition and date of expected evacuation to the United States.
W. E. Berkin, Major General U. S. A.
The Adjutant General of the Army.

Another Kentuckian released at the same time was Sgt. Orville R. Mullins, Covington, but formerly from Johnetta in Rock

castle County. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Mullins. They had moved to Covington about eight years ago. Paul Blanton was captured by the Red Army some time early in April 1953. The first word of his capture was received by his parents on April 25. The telegram only stated that he was missing in action. Later the parents learned of his capture and received letters from him "apparently" written in the enemy prison camp. These letters came through about once a month. The parents permitted the reporter to read one of these letters. The one written on Dec. 2, 1952, read in part as follows, after giving the usual greeting and well wishes: "The Chinese here made it possible this Christmas to celebrate in the happiest way. They are going to serve us M. Monday evening. Bread, pork, beef, cantines, cigarettes, apples, oranges, and also musical entertainment. There will be a few presents given away by the Chinese to help set off the Christmas spirit."

Many of the letters were written in a style similar to this one. The last letter received by the parents was dated Dec. 18, just before Paul's birthday. Paul was born in Walling Creek, Kentucky where his father was a miner. The family later moved to Shakesbury, W. Va.
