## Three-Million Dollar Plant May Locate Here

Livingston or Wildie selected as possible sites for huge new industry that uses wood for manufacture of new chemical.

Rockcastle County is being seriously considered as a desirable spot to locate a three-million dollar chemical plant that uses wood from the forest land for the manufacture of a secret chemical. This chemical is now being used for military purposes, but later may become available for civilian use.

An industrial engineer from the state of Kentucky has recently been in Rockcastle County to make a complete survey and find out what we have that would satisfy the requirements of such a plant.

The engineer said that there are four important requirements necessary for such an enterprise. In the first place the site must be near a railroad and a U. S. Highway. There must be plenty of water and there must be a large area of available timber and an area of 25 to 50 acres to build the site. Rockcastle County has all these requirements. We have U. S. 23 and U. S. 150. We have a good railroad. We have 185,000 acres of available timber and we have water.

The industrial engineer suggested that either Livingston or Wildie would make favorable sites. Both are near the U. S. highways and have plenty of water, and are near the forest area.

At least 100 cords of wood would be needed daily, and the present supply in this county would last 12 years. Timber would be cut under careful supervision, especially so on the Cumberland Forest owned by the government. Approximately 100 men would be employed at the mill and innumerable others in the forests and in hauling.

Just how soon this industry plans to make a definite choice is not known but it is believed that material has been gathered to lay before the official. The Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce met last Tuesday evening to discuss the matter and lend any aid possible. It is believed that this county has a very good chance of securing this large and unusual industry, which would add much to the economic health and growth to the entire community.

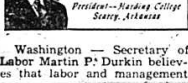

Washington - Secretary of Labor Martin P. Durkin believes that labor and management should not look to the government to resolve their disputes.

Our goal in America," he said to me, "should be greater cooperation between labor and management through free collective bargaining, with government being used only as an aid in mediation and conciliation when all else has failed."

The new Secretary of Labor has a hard-headed conception of what is meant by the terms "cooperation" and "when all else has failed." As a journeyman pipe fitter he came up through the ranks of union labor and for 20 years served as president of the United Association of Journeymen and Apprentices of the Plumbing and Pipe Fitting Industry. In his willingness to go far beyond the point at which so many collective bargaining efforts seem to be the only, last resort."

A Labor Council Since it seems to me to be a plan that could be used in almost any labor-management situation, I asked Mr. Durkin to explain the extra collective bargaining effort made in the plumbing industry. "In the beginning we bargain with employers as any other union," he said. "When some phase of the negotiation breaks down and we hit what seems to be an immovable deadlock, each side then prepares a written statement of its contentions and its arguments, and the whole thing is given over to our labor council. Its decision is accepted as binding by both sides."

"The Labor Council is a group of people, jointly appointed who reside outside the area of the dispute and can weigh the contentions and arguments dispassionately, neutrally, objectively. The significant thing is that often when one side or the other is writing up its statement to be submitted to the Council, it finds its own stand so vulnerable to compromise that it decides to relent - and thus an agreement is reached without use of the Council. This is significant because it shows that when both sides make a truly serious effort at give-and-take bargaining, they can usually get together. There are exceptions of course."

Understanding and Trust The interview with Secretary Durkin was another of the series to acquaint the readers of our column with the background and thinking of the key people in the Eisenhower administration. I told him of the effort being made through the

Harding College Freedom Forum is being about better labor-management relations and asked him in his opinion what further we could do in this vitally important objective. "Of course," he said, "a constant striving for mutual understanding and trust is essential. Great improvement is being made. As a matter of fact, we seldom see newspaper stories reporting on harmonious labor-management relations, yet thousands of industries, big and little, carry on collective bargaining year in and year out without a hitch. The conflicts are dramatized, and yet they affect only a small percentage of the total work force."

Under his administration the Department of Labor will seek to improve its research and statistical facilities serving the public labor and management. It will be operated in the basic social philosophy which governs the Eisenhower administration.

The challenge to us in America today," Secretary Durkin contends, "is to increase our intentions; to stimulate scientific progress and to raise still higher the standards of physical wellbeing. 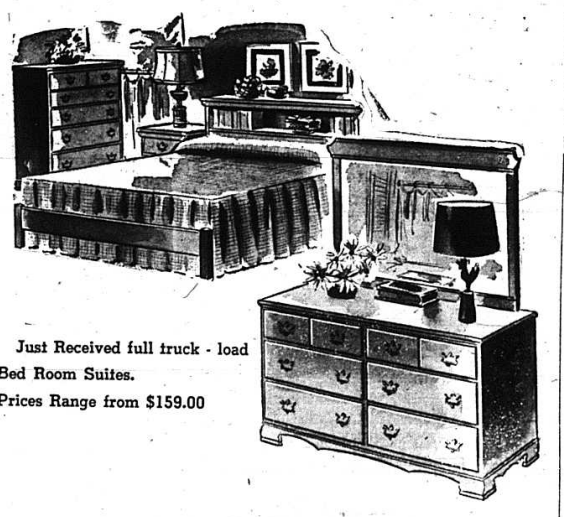

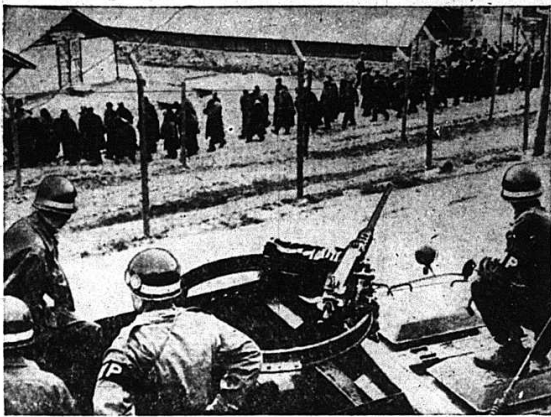

## Interesting Letter Received From Former County Agent

The Recorder is in receipt of a letter from William Davis, former County Agent of Boone County, who is now stationed with the U. S. Agricultural Department in Karachi, Pakistan. The letter follows:  
"Guess you fellows thought I would never write. I have been on the go a large part of the time since my arrival.  
"I was very pleasantly surprised with Karachi. It's really a very nice town and one can buy most everything needed. Items imported from the U. S. or England are pretty high but local goods are cheap, so it balances out pretty well.  
"My family arrived on October 18, and we had a grand reunion. I was certainly glad to see all the family. Peggy got off the plane calling for her daddy. I just saw her for a few seconds and then she had to go thru customs with her mother. The folks had a grand trip and enjoyed their day and a half layover in London. A friend of Ann Campbell's met them in London and took them to see

hold on to. Again we were successful in crossing, but scared to death. After a short rest we climbed to a plateau about 300 feet above the river. Here my buddy, a flatlander from Texas, gave out. I went on the way to the top. The assistant who was guiding. The trail led across the plateau, around the side of another mountain and down to a dry river bed. We walked along the river bed for about one-fourth mile and then began to climb to the village of Poi. I could look 500 feet straight up.

"When I finally reached the top I was in a h— of a shape. My head hurt, my heart was thumping my side hurt and I was out of breath. In other words I was in a h— of a shape."  
I talked with the leader of the village about agricultural problems for about two hours and had dinner with him. When I started back he brought a saddle horse for me to ride to the swinging bridge. The horse was down. The mountain another way, but it was just as steep. It was the first time I ever saw a crupper on a saddle to keep it from sliding over the horse's head. Why have probably seen cowboys ride horses down steep banks in the movies. Well, that's the way the horse went down that d— mountain. Every time he went around a curve in the trail he would look back and see himself just by looking between his ears. I figured the horse didn't want to fall any more than I did so I started the reins loose and hung on. When I got back to the bridge my host said he had an easy way for his guests to cross. He had a crane on a pulley on a cable. I was supposed to sit in the crate and be pulled across. I told him I would rather walk the swinging bridge, but he wouldn't consider it, so I doubled my long legs up and got in the crate. Two men pulled me across and I was right. I should have walked! What a h— of an experience. The rest of the trip was uneventful but nerve racking. I found out from my host at the village that I was the first American to visit his village. I can understand why none other had ever been there.

"About two weeks ago I went to India to study the village development project, they are working on. We have started a similar project here and needed some ideas.  
"I went to Hyderabad State and spent three days with the U. S. Extension Advisor who is in charge of the U. S. team there. Hyderabad City is the capital of the state and the fifth largest city in the world. It is called the Nizam, as he is called at one time had 300 wives. He's getting old now and has cut down to 90 wives.  
"India, like Pakistan, is not the land of snakes and tigers as many people think. I saw some beautiful country around Hyderabad and New Delhi. The government buildings in Delhi are as beautiful as any I have seen. I hope to get back to Delhi some day to take a few color pictures. I didn't have time on my last visit.  
"I have rambled considerably

"We are starting a Village Agriculture and Industrial Development program here in Pakistan. As the name implies it is aimed at improving the total aspect of village life. As yet the program is in the planning stage but we hope to be in full swing shortly. The first item is the training of the village workers who will correspond to our County Agents. However, in this program their job will not only include agriculture but many other programs such as health, communication, education, cottage industries, etc. Six training institutes will be set up for this purpose (three in West Pakistan and three in East Pakistan). It's a big job but we expect to see results in the not too distant future.

## COUNTY AGENTS NOTES

Blue mold has been reported in a number of tobacco beds in different sections of the county. These cases are being investigated at the present time. Blue Mold is in Tennessee and it wouldn't take long to reach Kentucky. In fact, its thought to be in Kentucky now and is being investigated by College of Agriculture.

In order to be safe it seems wise for the tobacco growers to be ready to use preventive measures in case the Blue Mold crosses the Tennessee Line. Scores of farmers in the county have already started treating their plant beds with fermate. Its better to spray or dust before Blue Mold strikes than to wait until its found in the tobacco bed. The following preventive measures are recommended by Russell Hunt, tobacco specialist.  
Blue Mold may break out in second year plant beds this year. Whether it spreads and becomes general will depend on

## When to spray or dust

For new beds, begin when the disease is first reported in the neighborhood or in the county to the south. Then apply twice a week and after every rain until setting is completed.  
For second-year beds, begin when plants are the size of a dollar. Apply twice a week and after every rain until setting is complete.

## Spray

3 level tablespoons Fermate 1 gallon water, or one half pound Fermate 25 gallons water. If Parzate or Dithane Z-78 is used at a slightly lower rate. Caution: Do not use material diluted for dusting in the preparation of spray. Do not use a spray that has had 2-4-D in it previously.  
Apply 4 to 6 gallons of spray to 100 feet of bed 9 feet wide or to 75 feet of bed 12 feet wide

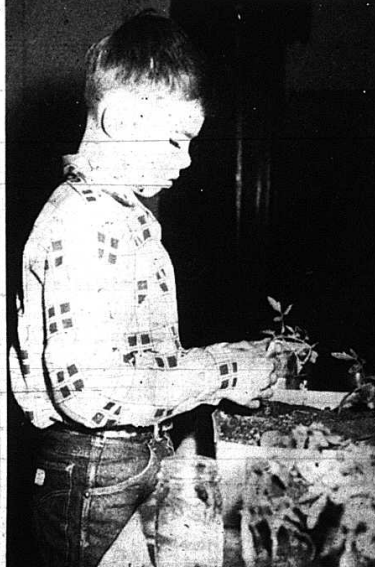
depending on the size of the plant-bed season. Certainly planters should be prepared to combat the disease the day a warning is given that it is likely to develop. Fermate gives excellent control, and Dithane Z-78 and the similar material Parzate has also been found to be effective. For a bed 12 feet wide and 100 feet long, land one half to two pounds of the material should be enough for the season if used as a spray while if it is planned to dust, about 20 pounds of diluted (fermate or Dithane Z-78 or similar materials) should be sufficient. But spray or dust materials now. If they are not used they will keep if stored in a dry place. Dithane Z-78 and Parzate have proved effective in control of tomato and potato late blight, the diseases that have been so destructive the past few years.

## How to recognize Blue Mold

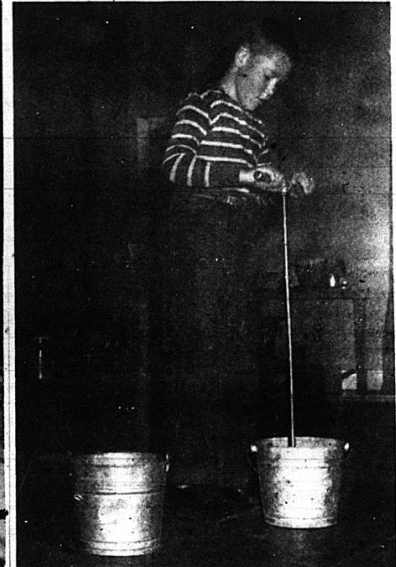
Blue mold may be confused with wildfire and fertilizer injury. To prevent fertilizer injury, don't use over 40 pounds of fertilizer on a steamed bed 12 by 100 feet, and not over 20 pounds of 20 per cent superphosphate on a burned bed the same size. To prevent wildfire apply bluestone lime when plants are just up and again 10 days later. If these are done the indications of blue mold are small circular areas of yellow plants in the bed during dry weather, or large dead or yellow growth of the fungus can be found on the underside of the leaves.

## Equipment Needed

For spraying, large areas of bed a power sprayer is desirable. For smaller areas a wheel barrow sprayer or a 3 or 4 gallon pressure sprayer is suitable. For dusting, a good hand rotary duster is satisfactory.  
Caution: Avoid breathing spray drift or dust, as it is irritating. Fermate is inflammable and explosive; don't mix or handle it near flame or sparks.
