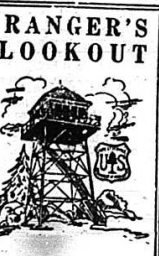

Two Fast Trains To Make Stops At Brush Creek Daily

Passenger trains Nos. 32 and 93 Southland to make regular stops at Orlando after June 1.

The Louisville and Nashville passenger trains Nos. 32 and 93 called the Southland will make regular stops at Brush Creek after June 1, according to a report received at this office from Railroad Commissioner Pleaz M. Mobley. Through the effort of Mr. Mobley the Kentucky Railroad Commission has entered an order that these two trains are to make a regular stop at this station. This is one of the fast trains that runs from Ohio to Florida. It is equipped with pullmans and diner. At present this train only makes a full stop at Corbin 40 miles south of Mount Vernon and at Richmond 35 miles north from here. Persons from Rockcastle, Jackson and Laurel Counties who wanted to travel on this train had to board it either at Corbin or at Richmond.

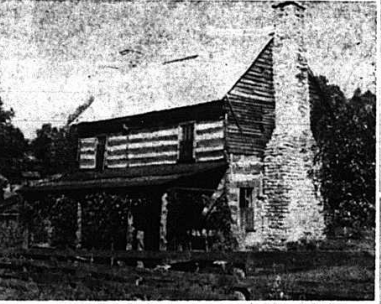
Notes On The Editors Conference

Hospital News

The Hospital Committee, Oscar Hilton, Ernest Bullock and William Stewart were in Louisville on the 29th of April to meet with Mr. Hackney and the architect Mr. McClory regarding the prospects of securing funds from the Federal Government to supplement the bond issue voted by the county last fall. Mr. Hackney is interested in helping the county but made the statement to the committee that an additional sum of \$50,000 must be secured by the county before the Federal Government is ready to help. Mr. Hackney stated that the bond issue of \$100,000 was not large enough to build an adequate hospital even if that sum were matched with an equal amount from the government. At least \$300,000 is necessary to build and equip a hospital with 20 or 25 beds. It is therefore believed that the proposition of an additional bond issue for \$50,000 makes this additional money the Federal Government ready to match the total sum.

Rockcastle County to be Beneficiary of Grant

The recent grant of \$50,000 to Berea College from the Ford Foundation for the purpose of improving rural education in the County and its welfare, affect Rockcastle County also. President Hutchins of Berea College did not mention definitely how many counties were included. The grant is to be administered by Berea College and is to be continued for four years. This sum of \$50,000 will be granted to the college annually.

The program will continue for four years and is directed toward securing able young teachers for isolated schools in co-operating counties. The selected teachers will take part in educational institutes directed toward helping them with their problems. Each teacher will receive a fellowship varying from \$500-1,000 for summer study and travel.

The final list of co-operating counties has not been prepared. Dr. Hutchins said, but Brethitt, Clay, Harlan, Jackson, Lee, Leslie, Letcher, Owsley, Perry, Rockcastle and one or

two other counties may be included. Twenty-four young teachers will be enlisted in the program this year. Supt. Wendell Butler of the State Department of Education has given approval to the project, and will be represented on the advisory committee by Sam Taylor also of the state Department of Education.

Selection of teachers for the program will be made soon. The committee is seeking graduates of four year colleges who are qualified for certification by the state Department of Education. The registrar of Berea has been appointed to receive applications of teachers for the appointments.

Berea College has carried on extension work for several years. The college shared in the original county agent experiment in Pulaski, Leslie and Rockcastle counties.

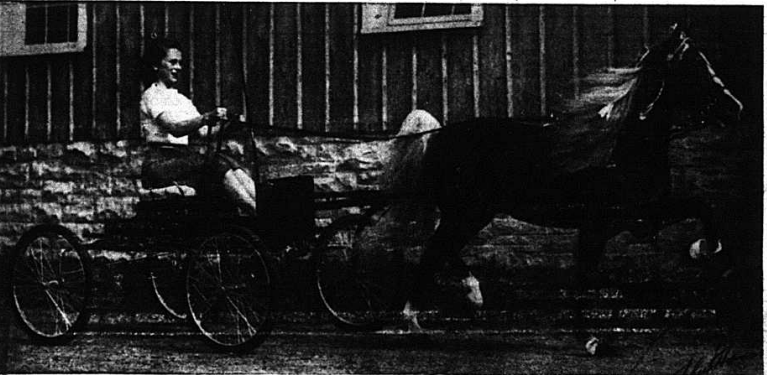
For the past year Prof. W. Wear of Berea College has been giving his full time to Rockcastle County, making a detailed study of the rural schools.

53 Have Emergency Teaching Certificates

A report on the school teachers in the state of Kentucky shows that 53 teachers in Rockcastle County have emergency teaching certificates. The study, issued by the State Department of Education Division of Teacher Education and Certification, shows that 17.7 per cent of the public school teachers in Kentucky have less than standard certificates. The figure is an improvement over a year ago when there were 2,971 emergency teachers.

The study shows that of the state total of emergency certificates in use this year, 2,455 were issued to teachers in elementary schools, and that 17.7 per cent of Kentucky's elementary school teachers are emergency teachers. At the high school level there are 348 emergency teachers, 5.6 per cent of the total. The combined percentage for all teachers in Kentucky is 14.05.

Driving Through Water is Not the Time to Make a "Big Splash"

Although today's automobile has progressed far beyond the point where a severe spring rain will stall the engine, it still is not an amphibious vehicle. Failure of the engine to bring you through normal flood waters, which might cover highways, can be attributed mostly to water on the ignition system caused by splashing. Today's engines are better equipped to combat excessive moisture and driving through water, by the use of such things as improved rubber housings on the spark plug terminals. These pictures show the splash effect when a car "plows" into a seven-inch depth on a flooded highway. At 20 m.p.h., the water shoots high, completely drenching the

underneath part of the car. At 3 m.p.h., the forward motion of the car creates a small wave running ahead of the front bumper, with control of the vehicle greatly improved.

When you encounter an inundated highway, slow your car down and approach with caution. As a safety tip, on driving through flooded areas, remember to try out your brakes at slow speed immediately after reaching dry ground. When wet brakes do not respond to pedal action, hold brake-pedal down moderately with left foot, while right foot feeds enough power to carry car forward and dry out brakes. This action, over a few hundred yards, should restore your brakes to safe driving condition.

SPRINGTIME IS CLEAN-UP TIME

When listing the numerous chores of spring house cleaning it is wise to remember that the control of many communicable diseases goes hand in hand with good sanitation, comments Mr. Robert D. Hays, sanitarian for the Rockcastle County Health Department. Beat-up and battered garbage cans are a health hazard and should be replaced because spilled garbage attracts rats. Garbage containers should be cleaned once a week, not just every spring. Uncovered garbage cans are breeding places for flies, so tight covers are es-

sential.

Dad should provide screens for all the windows and should mend torn-places in old screens so that a major entrance for flies and mosquitoes will be eliminated. Outbuildings need to be inspected for old trash and debris, too, for rubbish heaps are ideal for rodents and insects which harbor dangerous, preventable diseases. An insanitary privy is an open invitation to family illness, added Mr. Hays.

Clean homes are problems of every family, but environmental sanitation is the responsibility of every family in the community.

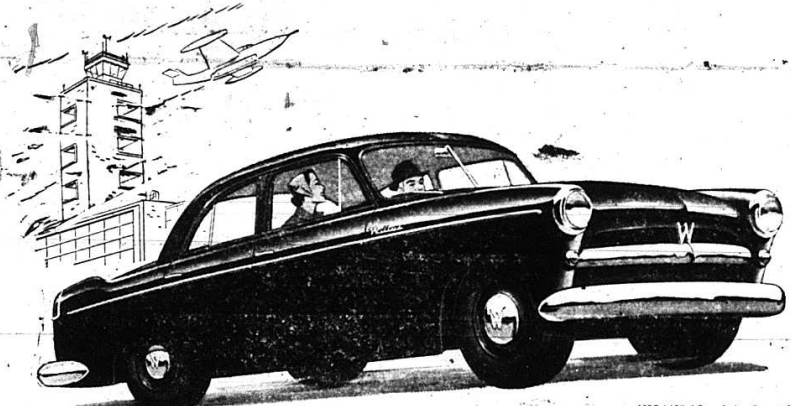
