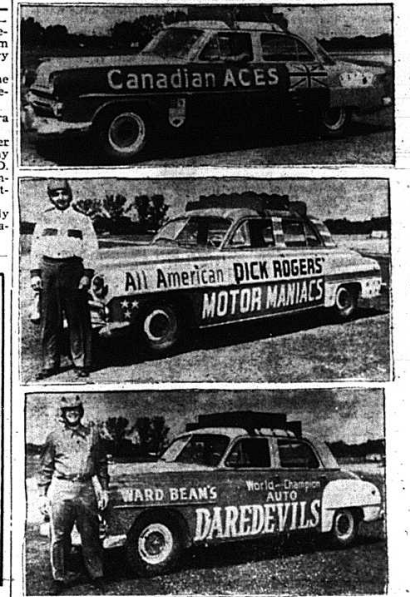

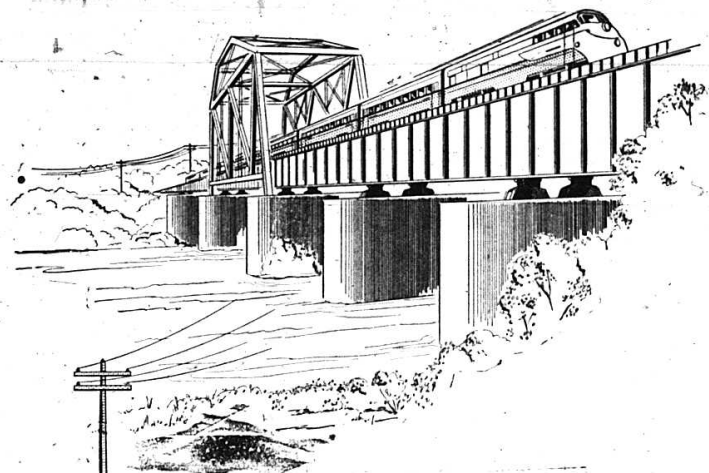

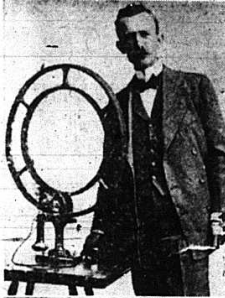

The Bellefonte furnace, above, first in Ashland and Boyd County made an important contribution toward the advancement of the iron industry in the United States. The furnace, set up in 1836, together with the largest blast furnace in the west, built a few years later, gained the area national recognition as an iron center. Kentucky is not primarily known as an oil producing state but the first oil gusher in America was at the Burkesville well in 1892. The first oil well in the state was found in what is now McCrory County in 1818. Below, an oil well of the more modern type in Uniontown.

convicted defendants may be enforced at any time within five years, for both the principal amount of the fine and the costs. Assistant Attorney General M. B. Holfield advised Bullitt Co. Attorney C. Two-year Mayor
Bowling Green's Mayor to be elected by the voters this year will serve only a two-year term instead of the customary four years, it was ruled by Assistant Attorney General Walter C. Herdman who explained the change was due to a change by the 1952 General Assembly changing the classification of the city from third to second class.

Mayors of third class cities were chosen in 1949 for four-year terms, while those in second class cities were last elected in 1951 for four-year terms. When Bowling Green's classification was changed, the term of the old Mayor had to run for four years, and in order to get the city into the proper groove the first Mayor will serve only a two-year term, rather than four years.

May Be Taxed
Non-resident employees of a trucking firm operating within a fourth class city may be subjected to a city license tax for use of streets provided they regularly use those thoroughfares for four years, in order to Walter C. Herdman ruled.


Capital Roundup

The State Department of Highways called for bids to be received June 12 for improvement of 85 miles of road in Bell, Clay, Fayette, Floyd, Kenton, Pendleton, McCracken, Taylor, Warren, Owen, Anderson, Clinton, Cumberland, Harlan, Franklin, Grayson, Perry, Shelby and Simpson counties.

Three judges of the Court of Appeals filed a blistering dissent to a majority opinion of the Court which held that a Circuit Judge might convene a special grand jury without proper notice and cause an inquiry to be made and indictments return.

The minority opinion, awarded by Judge Parker W. Duncan and concurred in by Chief Justice Porter Sims and Judge Bert T. Combs, held to the view that the Court has created, rather than interpreted a statute, and clung to the view that 10-day notice of such special terms must be given. The majority opinion, filed earlier, had held that Claude Beach, convicted Harlan County slayer, had been lawfully accused of crime.

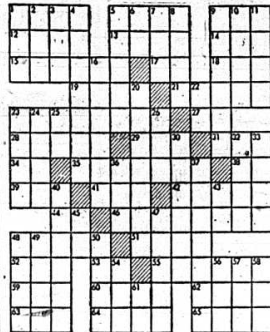

CONGRESSIONAL

How many Congressional investigation witnesses have been cited for contempt of Congress?

From 1940 through 1952, Congress cited 159 persons for contempt. Forty-five of them were convicted, and six other convictions were reversed. Gambler Frank Costello drew the heaviest penalty, 18 months in jail and a \$5,000 fine. There were no contempt citations during the first four months of 1953. But the Senate May 6 cited for contempt Russell W. Duke, former San Francisco publicity man.

Has former Speaker Sam Rayburn been in Congress longer than any other present Member?

No. Sen. Carl Hayden (D-Ariz.) served in the House from April 4, 1911, to March 3, 1927, and in the Senate continuously since 1927. Rayburn (D-Tex.) has served continuously in the House since 1913.

Who has the most seniority in the Senate?

Sen. Walter F. George (D-Ga.) is ranked first by the Senate. He became a Member Nov. 8, 1922. Second ranking Senator in seniority is Carl Hayden (D-Ariz.) with 28 years in the Senate (following about 16 years in the House). The ranking Republican in seniority in the Senate is Styles Bridges (N.H.) whose service commenced Jan. 3, 1937.

What is being done about President Eisenhower's request to let 250,000 immigrants beyond quotas enter the U.S. during the next two years?

The Immigration and Naturalization Subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee decided April 27 to solicit information and opinions by mail on the advisability of admitting the extra immigrants. Hearings on a bill to grant the President's request will be held after replies have been received. Present quotas allow entry of 154,657 yearly.
