**Concerning Operator's License (Driver's License)**  
If your family name starts with any letter from L to X inclusive and you have a License issued to you by any Circuit Court Clerk in the State of Kentucky to operate a motor vehicle, and that license you will expire this July 31, 1953, it is very necessary that you renew your license before July 31, 1953. To do so, you must come into the office and make out a new application bringing your old license with you, and sign the same giving information that has not been heretofore required. The license will then be issued for you for two year period, expiring July 31, 1953 and a fee of \$2.00 will be paid for the license. If you wait until after the 31st of July, 1953 to get your license a penalty of \$1.00 will be added. You can now get your new license at the circuit court Clerk's Office.

## Construction On U. S. Highway 25 Started

### Two contracting firms now busy making new grade and making three-lane over several hills.

Two construction firms are now busy working on U. S. 25 between Mount Vernon and Livingston. The road between Calloway and Livingston is being rerouted. The many curves are being eliminated and three lanes will be built through the hill entering Livingston. Construction on this important highway was begun several weeks ago by the J. C. Coddell Company of Winchester, Ky. A large conduit is being built just outside the city limit where the new highway is to connect with the old one. A big fill is being made at this point. The high hill through which the road is to pass is now being cut into a depth of thirty feet. A big shovel scoops up the rock and loads it into large trucks. These trucks haul the rock a short distance below to make the fill. Mr. Virgil Richardson, the superintendent of the construction, stated that the hill will be completely cut through by the end of this week. The men are at present working 16 hours a day in two shifts.  
Beyond this large cut, another cut will have to be made into the side of the hill. This cut will be at least 45 feet in depth, but will not be as difficult since the dirt can be pushed into the valley below. Here the road takes an easy curve, leading into the valley below. The White Star Service Station, which will be missed by the new route has already made

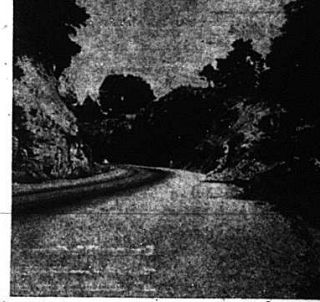


Members of the Coddell Construction crew drilling holes for blasting away the rock near Burr.

provisions to rebuild on the new route, just a short distance to the rear from where the station is now located. Mr. Clifford Bales, owner and operator of the present station, purchased several tracts of land on the new route and plans to build a new service station and restaurant there. It is one of the finest locations we have seen in a long time. It is on top of the hill with a great deal of space for building and parking. The station is to be located on the right side of the highway as one enters Livingston. A short distance from Livingston, several houses have al-

ready been moved back to make room for the road. Here the route leads through a valley and as it leads towards Calloway it makes a gentle turn, and swings into the valley behind Oscars Gift Shop. This will eliminate the sharp curve at Calloway. The ditch behind Oscar's Gift Shop will have to be diverted to the East side of the highway. It is believed that by the middle of July most of the grading will have been completed.

On the north end of the highway near Mount Vernon, grading is being done on the construction of a three-lane high-

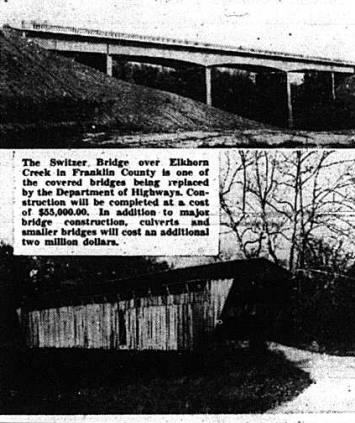

2 cups cooked, cubed veal  
3 slices bread, cut in cubes for 1 tablespoon pickle relish  
2 tablespoons flour  
1/2 cup shredded American cheese  
1 cup milk  
1 tablespoon catsup  
1 teaspoon salt  
Place bread cubes into oven to toast while preheating oven. Place veal into 3-quart casserole. Cover with pickle relish and flour. Top with 1/4 cup shredded cheese. Cover with toasted bread cubes. Combine milk, catsup and salt. Pour over all. Top with remaining cheese. Bake in a moderate (350°) oven for 25 to 30 minutes.

Now that we're going to be in season for fresh berries, toss a few of these on your fruit salads for color and interest. Berries and grapes can be frsted when you want to make salads special by dipping in slightly beaten egg white and then rolling in granulated sugar. Keep the salad plate from looking stale. Greens should never hang over the edge, for example. Mayonnaise for fruit salads can be thinned with leftover fruit juice for canned or citrus fruits. Cream or whipped cream may also be used.

## EASY DOES IT

**SLENDER** food budgets can be stretched and meals made interesting by making plentiful use of the following food-saving tips: -Poultry and meat leftovers should be stored as quickly after their serving as possible to prevent spoilage. When large enough pieces are available, serve sliced or heat in sauce or gravy. -Small chunks and pieces of meat go well in hearty salads, quick steers, hash or spaghetti dishes. -Tag ends of meat and poultry can be utilized in omelets, stuffed peppers or tomato and croquette frits. Use a food grinder to get them easily into small pieces. -Bones and small pieces of meat can always be simmered with green or yellow vegetables, potatoes, noodles, beans or rice to make hearty, nourishing soups. -Save your drippings and refrigerate them. They're tasty to use for sauteing white or sweet potatoes, eggs, French toast, bananas or fish. -Drippings from ham, sausage or bacon are especially tasty when they're used for seasoning green or lima bean dishes, cooked greens, Spanish rice or scalloped potatoes. -Butter and toast them under the broiler. If desired, sprinkle them with celery, caraway or poppy seed or grated cheese before broiling for a most delicious flavor. -Use a combination of leftover fruits and berries as a topping for a bowl of cereal. Leftover canned cereals are good in this way, too.

### Recipe of the Week

**Blue Cheese Dressing** (Makes 1 cup)  
1 small clove garlic, sliced  
1 tablespoon minced onion  
1/2 cup salad oil  
1/2 cup of lemon juice or vinegar  
2 ounces blue cheese  
1 teaspoon paprika  
1 teaspoon sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
Add onion and garlic to oil; let stand for an hour. Remove from oil and discard garlic. Cream blue cheese to a paste, adding oil gradually, stirring constantly to keep the mixture as smooth as possible. Add remaining ingredients and beat or shake in a tightly covered jar until well blended. Serve on salad greens or vegetable salad.

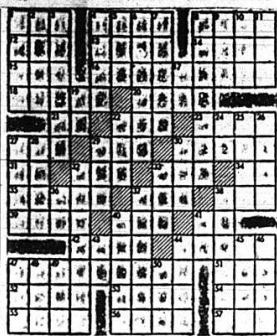

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Soil Conservation News

The heavy rainfall late last week has slowed down haymaking in the county. A lot of hay was saved however, before the rains came. Prova Ambury got 19 acres of Alfalfa into the barn without getting it rained on. Ed Sowder and Earl Roberts both cut and baled some fine alfalfa and orchard grass hay.

Roy Brown cut the first cutting of sericea on Henry Brown farm. Letcher Norton got his oats baled and in the dry but still has sericea to cut.

When Robert Reynolds, Area Conservationist and the local soil conservation service technician visited the new seedlings of sericea on Bradley Saylor and Guy Roberts, the sericea was coming up in almost perfect stand. Mr. Reynolds' com-

ment was that he had never seen better distribution of plants.

Both fields of 12 acres each were seeded with a brilliant culti-packer seeded. Mr. Roberts field had washed some, where the tractor tracts went up and down the slope.

Coy Baldwin is stopping the water from washing his tobacco field by constructing a diversion ditch above the field. The diversion will carry the water into natural draws at the ends of the field.

As we drive along the road we see many cultivated fields that are marked by tills and gullies caused by the recent rains. Some of these fields are too steep for row crops and should be in hay or pasture. On some fields a diversion or terraces will control the run off water and help to stop the erosion. The Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District helps farmers plan and apply practices needed for conservation farming.

CONGRESSIONAL

Q—Besides trying to prevent delivery of strategic goods to Iron Curtain countries, are we doing anything to keep this material here where we can use it?

A—Yes. The Export Control Act gives the Secretary of Commerce power to prevent scarce defense materials from leaving the country. The Senate and House have voted to extend the Act, scheduled to expire June 30, 1953, for another year.

Q—Can information obtained in telephone wire tapping be used as evidence in Federal courts?

A—Such evidence is not admissible in Federal courts, but a House Judiciary Subcommittee is considering bills to permit limited court use of wire-tap evidence in national security cases.

Q—Can't Congress do something about states which refuse to recognize divorcees granted in other parts of the nation?

A—The Senate May 8 passed and sent to the House a bill by Sen. Pat McCarran (D. Nev.) to require all 48 states to recognize the legality of divorces which are decreed in any state.

Q—How much does the United States pay in United Nations "dues"?

A—During fiscal 1953, the U. S. paid \$15,000,000 toward the U.N.'s present budget. The House May 8 passed and sent to the Senate a fiscal 1954 appropriation bill for the State, Justice and Commerce Departments which provides \$15,000,000 for the U.N. assessment. The U. N. assesses percentages of the total, and Congress appropriates the dollar equivalent. The U. S. share is gradually being reduced to one-third. In addition to dues, the U. S. makes other dollar contributions to the U. N. and other international organizations.

# MURDER BY INCHES

SAM had to break in the door to reach the body of Mrs. Ambros Creighton. With the door locked from the inside and the only other exit from the room two windows overlooking a sheer drop of 60 feet to the Pacific below, it could only be suicide. 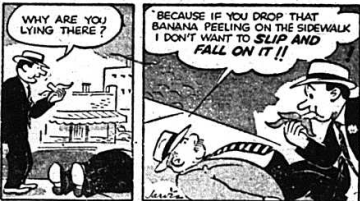

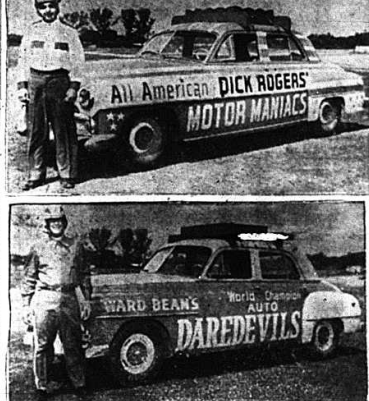
