Open Up Large Strip Mine South of Mount Vernon

Parrish Brothers Lease The Lambert and Turner Land for Mine Operations.

A large coal tippie has been built near the place where the lime and cement quarry used to be located about seven miles out of Mount Vernon on what is now known as the Lambert and Turner acres. The tippie has just been completed and is to begin operation today. The coal will be dug from the land leased from Lambert and Turner. A large diesel shovel has already cleared away the top soil along the edge of the mountain for a considerable distance. The coal vein is approximately 34 inches in depth. The coal will be strip mined by means of a shovel and then hauled for a short distance over the new road carved out of the mountain side and thence on highway 150 to a large tippie. Here the coal will be graded into four different sizes. The first bin will hold the coal dust the second the small nut coal and the third still a larger and the fourth hopper will receive the large block. The screening mechanism was built of perforated sheet metal with different size holes and each section is operated by means of a gasoline engine equipped with pistons on rods that vibrates the hanging screens. A hopper beneath each screen catches the screened coal. Near the tippie is a large scale for weighing the coal.

Man Succumbs While In Pond

A resident of Berea, route 1, died shortly after 1 P. M. Sunday while wading in a farm pond. He was identified as John Smith Johnson, 31, who was employed with post engineers, Blue Grass Ordnance Depot. After lunch Sunday, Johnson and his wife, Mrs. Eula Bicknell Johnson, and his eight year old brother-in-law, James Leslie Bicknell went to a pond on Albert Bicknell's farm about a mile north of Berea. Turpin, the coroner, said the boy told him Johnson waded into the pond then stepped into a hole where the water was about 10 feet deep.

Grasps Log

The boy said his sister could not swim but shoved a log out to her husband. Johnson flung an arm over the log but did not raise his head out of the water. Turpin quoted the boy as saying:

"A near-by filling station operator, Ronald Scribner, was summoned. He swam out to Johnson and brought him ashore. Turpin said Scribner said he found Johnson's head under water though one arm was locked around the log. Johnson, a World War II veteran and a native of Madison County, also is survived by his mother, Mrs. Grace Johnson; Berea; a brother Fred Johnson; Berea; six sisters, Mrs. John Webb, Berea; and Mrs. Dula Boebinger, Mrs. Doris McTee, Mrs. Katherine Grob, Mrs. Mary Ann Kuhn and Mrs. Avis Strait, all of Cincinnati, and the paternal grandmother Mrs. Rose Johnson, Berea.

Robert Lee McFerron Dies At Age 81

In the midst of our joys and sorrows and many activities, let us pause for a moment and pay tribute to our beloved father, brother, friend and neighbor, Robert Lee McFerron who departed this life, Sunday, June 20, 1953, at the age of 81 years, 3 months and 29 days, just six weeks after the passing of his wife, Vinnie McFerron, which was on Mother's Day and his passing being on Father's Day.

He was the son of Alfred Houston and Susan Thompson McFerron and had lived all of his life in Rockcastle County. At the age of 12 years McFerron was baptized in the Christian Church as his father, becoming a member of the Presbyterian Church and believed not so much in the Church but in "doing unto others as you would have them do unto you" and to live to meet the Master.

He was known to his friends and neighbors as "Uncle" and he was well liked by the people of this county as a public official, having served a term as Deputy Sheriff in 1920, he was elected Sheriff, and in 1920, he was elected by the people of Rockcastle and Laurel counties to serve a term in the state Legislature.

On August 25, 1908 he became a member of, Ashland Lodge No. 657, Free and Accepted Masons, and enjoyed the Masonic work.

On January 25, 1908 he was united in marriage to Miss Vinnie Adams, and to this union nine children were born, three of whom died in infancy, and a son, Sgt. Gus McFerron was killed in 1945 in the Philippine Islands. His survivors are three daughters, Mrs. Fannie Mullins of Mt. Vernon, Mrs. Ruth Leach of Louisville and Mrs. Sue Abney of Berea; two sons, William McFerron of Lexington and Lt. Com. John A. McFerron of Adak, Alaska; eight grandchildren, Alfreda and Donna McFerron, Linda and Carol Abney, Bobby, Joyce Frances and Janis McFerron; five sisters, Mrs. Fannie Childers, Mrs. Georgia Bryant and Mrs. Mattie Cox, all of Mt. Vernon, Mrs. Christine Delano of Chula Vista, California, Mrs. Rose Mize of Swannano, N. C. Four brothers, Fred and Ray McFerron of Cleveland, Ohio, John McFerron of Fort Myers, Florida and Henry McFerron of La Grange, Ky., and a host of relatives and friends who mourn his passing.

He was a loyal friend, a devoted brother and a loving father, and because of his long and useful life among us, many happy memories remain for his friends and loved ones to cherish throughout the years. Services were held at 2:00 P. M., Wednesday, June 24, 1953, at Cox Funeral Home. Interment was in Elmwood Cemetery with Bro. Lawrence Adams and Howard Ray officiating. Masonic Services were held at the grave. Cox Funeral Home had charge of the arrangements.

Teenager wreck car and escape

Billy Proctor, the teen-ager who was arrested at the Youth Authority at Louisville for the thefts that he did here in Mt. Vernon a little over a month ago, made his escape from Louisville in company with another boy whose home is claimed to be in Harlan, last Tuesday. The boys arrived at Lexington they stole a car and drove it to Berea and into Rockcastle County. Early Wednesday morning they were seen driving through Conaway on their way north. They had an old Plymouth Sedan, 1941 model. At a culvert just north of Boone Gap the boys had a wreck. They landed into the ditch and damaged the car. Apparently the boys were not driving through Conaway and made their escape. The accident happened at one o'clock Wednesday morning. The driver, a Berea boy, happened to pass by the accident and reported the wreck. Arnold Brock policeman from Berea was notified and the boys were arrested at the escape of Proctor from the Youth Center. He later was apprehended at the home of his sister in Berea and placed in the Madison County jail at Richmond.

The story is of interest to the readers of the Signal only because the boy made the thefts in Mt. Vernon and Renfro Valley on the evening of May 15. At that time he and his companion Duell Eades also of Berea, broke into four business places in one night. The places were Clontz restaurant, David McCauley's filling station, Renfro Valley Store and Southern States Cooperative.

The boys were apprehended by Dewey Ballinger in the home of Jess Proctor at Wildie. The boys at that time were playing with the weapons they had taken from the Renfro Valley Store. They were tried before Judge Williams in court, and sent to the Youth Authority at Louisville for observation and examination. Proctor made his escape there Tuesday with the boy from Harlan. Upon questioning he refused to give the name of his accomplice.

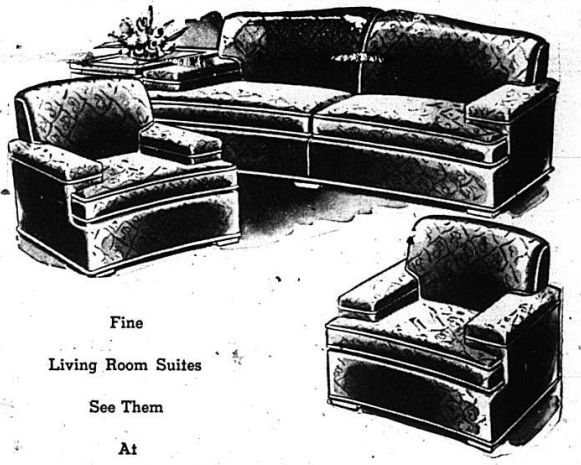

Two frame residences, one for a physicians and the other for nurses, are also on the property.

An average of 60 babies are delivered at the Oneida hospital monthly. There is no other facility in this section, where the birth rate is the highest in the state and physicians are few. In order to obtain as soon as possible the best plan for continuance of this seriously needed community service, Mr. Dixon urged that interested groups contact him immediately.
