The Public Service Commission of Frankfort has rendered its opinion regarding the case of the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co. in its application to convert the present system to a dial one. The opinion was received by the president of the Rural Co-op Telephone Company, Mr. Bradley Sayre. The full statement from the Commission is printed herewith.

A meeting of the Public Service Commission was held this date. Present: Chairman Robert M. Coleman and Commissioners Cass R. Walden and H. Clay Kauffman.

In the matter of Case No. 2152 Application of Mt. Vernon Telephone Company for a certificate of convenience and necessity authorizing it to convert its existing telephone system in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, from magneto to common battery dial operation; and to construct certain additional telephone lines within said county.

ORDER On May 27, 1952, the Public Service Commission entered an Order in the above styled matter denying the Applicant, Mt. Vernon Telephone Company, a certificate of convenience and necessity to convert its system to common battery dial operation and also denying it a certificate of convenience and necessity to construct any additional telephone lines in the territory which it reports to serve. On June 16, 1952, the Applicant filed a Petition for Rehearing and the Commission entered the Petition on July 3 granting the Petition. In that Order the Commission provided that:

"Nothing contained herein shall prevent the Commission from denying the application if after its investigation it finds the situation is substantially the same as that which existed on the 27th day of May, 1952, the date of its earlier Order in this proceeding."

Subsequent to the entry of the Order on June 3, 1952, hearings were held and the Applicant was given every opportunity to show willingness and ability to provide adequate telephone service in the area which it purports to serve.

After an examination of the record herein the Commission finds that the present situation is substantially the same as that which existed on the 27th day of May, 1952.

Q—With the 1953 mid-term Congressional elections coming up, I've been wondering: How have the "ins" and the "outs" fared in recent off-year elections?

A—Since 1932, the minority party has gained Congressional seats in every mid-term election except 1934. In 1934, the Republicans lost 11 seats in the Senate and 14 in the House. In the six elections, the minority has gained an average of five Senators and more than 41 Representatives. The most recent mid-term test, in 1950, resulted in a Republican gain of five Senators and 23 Representatives.

Q—Are cabinet officials entitled to vacations?

A—They are under present law, but Congress has passed two versions of a bill to abolish annual leave for these and other high federal officials, in order to prevent them from collecting lump sum payments for unused leave. They would continue to take time off under a sort of honor system, but would always remain technically on duty.

Q—How much of a bonus do doctors get when drafted?

A—Doctors who are drafted receive no bonus. Those who volunteer and accept commissions, however, receive \$100 a month above regular pay. Very few doctors have been drafted; faced with induction under the doctors' draft law, most of them volunteer and accept commissions. The Senate included the bonus in an extension of the law passed May 28, after the House version passed May 12, had omitted it.

Q—What sort of agency is the Women's Bureau, for which the House voted \$260,000 May 26?

A—The Women's Bureau, part of the Labor Department, began as the Woman-in-Industry Service in 1918. It studies the entire field of female workers, engaging in research, writing reports and offering policy and program recommendations. Operating as a watch-dog agency, its interests range from wages, working health, to a woman's financial responsibility for family support.

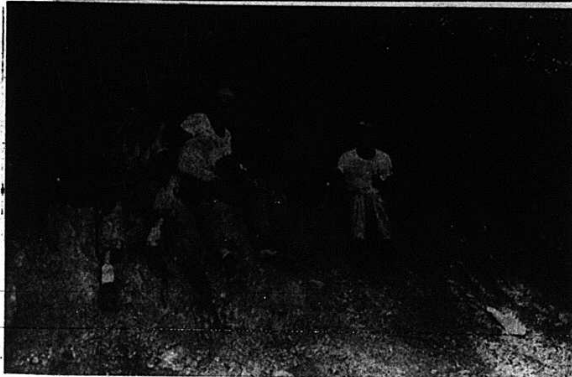

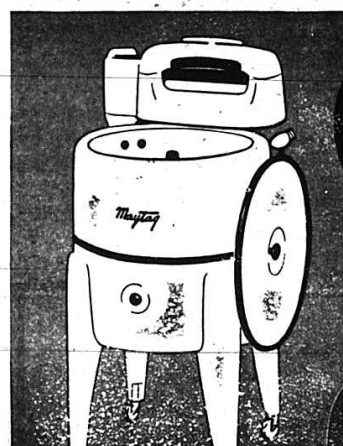

If this combination is used, the correct dosage is one half pint of 23 per cent Aldrin emulsion concentrate and 3 cts of 50 per cent DDT emulsion concentrate in enough water per acre to treat an acre. With a tractor mounted weed type sprayer 5 or more gallons of water per acre may be required with airplane application slightly less, but 2 gallons per acre will be necessary.

European Cornborer and grasshopper control on corn

According to Dr. W. A. Price, head of the Entomology department at the University of Kentucky, European cornborers and grasshoppers are attacking corn in some areas of the state.
The cornborer usually attacks corn at about 35 inches high. It does not bother small corn to any degree.
Eggs are laid by a pale yellowish brown moth on the underside of the corn blade near the midriff. Each moth may lay 500 to 800 eggs in clusters of 40 to 60 eggs.
The eggs hatch in about a week and the tiny worms start feeding immediately on the corn blades, young shoots, especially in the top of the corn. They bore through the leaves and feed on the top of the corn. The rough clumps of dirt, it may be necessary to run a drag of the corn until about one-half inch in length.
At the half grown stage they burrow into first stalks, tunnel down and in the pith, sapping the plant food and moisture and causing the stalk to lodge. Where injury is sufficient to warrant treatment it may be desirable to apply DDT for

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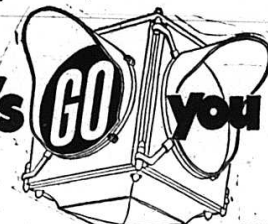
