County Master Farm Home-maker Nominee named

A committee selected a Master Farm Home-maker Nominee for South Madison and Rockcastle County last Monday. They had six club nominees to consider. Below is a brief report of each. These reports were taken from the recommendations sent in by their club:

Th. Master Farm Home-maker Nominee is Mrs. H. H. Harrison, who belongs to the Silver Creek Homemakers Club. She has been a member of that club 26 years and is a charter member. She and Mr. Harrison live on a farm about two miles from Berea. They have reared four sons who are all married and away from home.

The oldest, Phillip, is manager of Southern States Cooperative Store in Berea, two next oldest John and Roger are partners in a trucking line and Joe, the youngest, is an automobile dealer.

Mrs. Harrison is an outstanding mother has reared her sons to be leading citizens. She is a good homemaker, does much of her own work besides raising chickens and turkeys for market. She is a helpful companion and a good neighbor.

The other nominees for the delegates were: Mrs. William Payne, United Neighbors Club, Wadd. Ky. She has been a homemaker only one year.

She was instrumental last year in getting a new club started in her community.

There are five children in their family ranging from seven to twenty-two. Three are away from home, but none married. The oldest is a teacher, the next two oldest have employment in manufacturing concerns in Ohio.

Mr. and Mrs. Payne live on a farm, on which they are continually making improvements. Their income comes from the farm. She is very active in church, and community activities. She works with red cross county educational improvements and Homemakers club.

Mrs. Burdette Brown, Quail Club, Ottawa, Ky. Mr. and Mrs. Brown live on a farm with their entire income coming from it. They have reared four children, three daughters and a son. The daughters are older and are married. The son is in high school. Mrs. Brown is a good wife, mother and homemaker. She and her family are leading citizens in the community.

Mrs. Brown has belonged to Homemakers Club for 17 years.

Mrs. C. G. Baker, Scaffold Cane Club Rt. 2, Berea, was another nominee. She has belonged to the club 17 years. (Mrs. Baker was a charter member of the Whites Station Club, then moved and dropped out for many years until another club was organized near her.)

Both their children have been away from home for many years. One is deceased, Mr. and Mrs. Baker are older and are not able to carry on as much work in the farm as they once were. She is an inspirat-

ion to her club and still assists the 4-H club leaders in the community.


