### ANNOUNCEMENT OF DEWEY BALLINGER FOR SHERIFF

Mrs. Payne the wife and widow of the late Arthur Payne was rightfully placed in her husband's place as Sheriff. She and I get along wonderfully. However all of the out-side work is still on my shoulders. In planning this campaign I have selected to run with me, and if I am elected your Sheriff, Mr. Sam Hoskins of Broodhead, and Mr. T. J. Parsons of Wildie, who will be my deputies.

I picked on these men because I know their temperaments and character and patience. Let me say this to you, I have noticed in my duties as an officer with the right to make arrests, that the major part of arrests made, is persons drunk or drinking, and much patience must be had with such persons. Drunken persons are an object of pity, and the poor fellows don't know what they are doing. And just thing about a hot-headed officer, taking the life of a fine young man because he called him a bad name or made like he was going to put up a fight. I have said and I still say, that I would rather see my boy in the jail house, put up by a sane minded officer, than go to the grave yard and gaze upon a sacred spot where he slept, cold in death shot down by some crazy officer. Since I have been an officer I have had to strike one man, and that was in a self-defense. I have destroyed 83 state visited your church, patrolled the highways, served every warrant and process put in my hands they could be found. I have kept myself away from places that were not fit for a man to be, especially a married man with a family. An officer should be an example for others to go by.

Don't get me wrong now. I'm not asking help out of sympathy on the work that I have done, because I fully believe each of you are entitled to the full protection the law gives you, and that is exactly what I have done and promise to do it right on with the help of Almighty God and my good deputies. Sure, I think you should give me consideration because you know what I have done, and it is a good way to judge what a person will do in the future. It's like an old saying I heard one time, "Is he worthy of this distinction and qualified?" Has he worked in the past, and proven himself? The answer, is "He Has." So dear voter come to our rescue on August-1, 1953, cast your vote for DEWEY BALLINGER which means a vote for Sam Hoskins and T. J. Parsons, men that will do their best to make our good County a good safe place to live in.

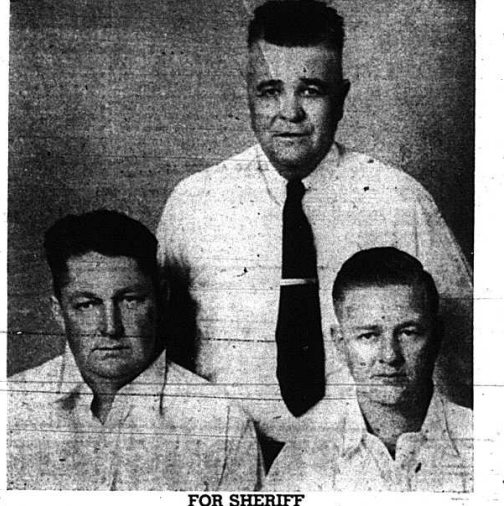
This good Christian wife and mother will be sadly missed by the loved ones left behind but she leaves for them many pleasant memories which will live forever.

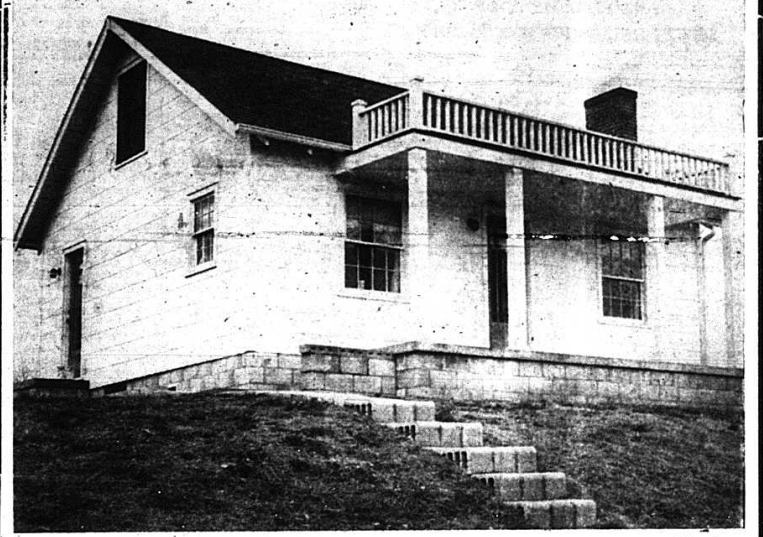

Southern Bell Gals Hickman Fulton Go-Ahead  
Frankfort, Ky., July 16, 1952  
The State Public Service

Commission today refused to let the H-F-C Rural Telephone Cooperative Corporation set up a telephone system in Clinton and expand its service into outlying areas of Fulton and Hickman counties.  
The commission authorized the Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Company to go ahead with its plans to serve the two counties. It directed Southern Bell to report every six months on progress of the expansion projects.  
In denying the petition, the commission said the area which the co-op proposed to serve already was being served in part by Southern Bell which protested against the co-op's petition.

**Small Firms' Purchase Sought**  
State law prohibits a co-operative from serving an area already being served by another company, and specifies the co-op can't serve an area when the original company is ready, willing, and able to serve it.  
The Co-op sought to buy six

small near-by telephone companies and convert their facilities for its own use. It also sought authority to borrow \$225,000 from the Federal Government to finance the project.  
In its petition, the co-op said it was necessary to set up a system in Clinton in order to reach outlying areas in Fulton and Hickman counties.

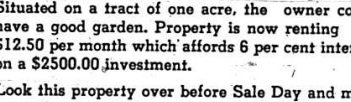
