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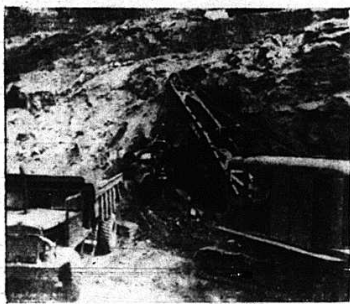

RAMBLINGS

A truce has been signed between the Red Forces and the United Nations command. Fire in Korea has ceased. Both sides agreed to stop the war. A Buffer zone of two and a half miles has been established between the two lines. Each army is to withdraw a certain number of miles leaving a strip of "no man's land" between the two forces.

The news of the truce signed has been received with very little acclaim. Many believed that it was just another hoax. It took such a long time to come to an agreement. Months have passed since the first talk started about such a truce. Now that it has actually been signed, people take the news with some skepticism.

The Korean War itself has been a very peculiar one. It was limited. The army was permitted to enter Manchuria from whence all the supplies and soldiers came. Except for the Chinese and Russian help the war would have been over in a short while. Whether this method of carrying on a war will be justified, history only will tell.

Measuring the Korean War by the cost in material and lives, it was a costly one to us. Far more than any had expected. It has brought this country an economic situation that is perplexing. To many it has brought a good living and better income, but at the cost of the taxpayer. It is not a healthy income. It was brought on by huge manufacturing of armaments, and not solely by peaceful production.

It has been an unattractive income that will eventually break down, and the high cost of living will have to level-down, perhaps at the financial sacrifice of many many individuals. I hope that time will not be soon.

The Primary election will soon be at hand, and a thing of the past. It was my first experience with a large county-wide election, except for the school election last fall. I found the experiences very interesting. The mood, the sentiment, the hopes and wishes as well as some of the more or less derogatory statements by the candidates proved to be a very exciting study of human actions, and reactions.

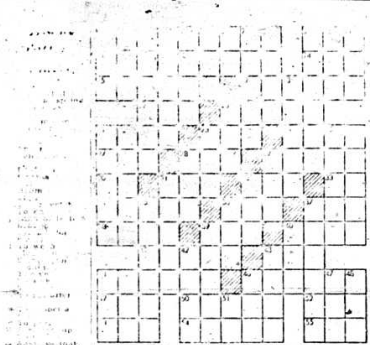

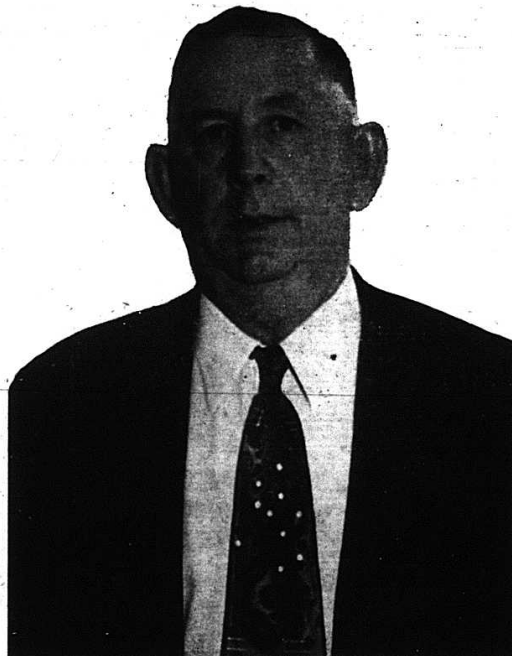
