Christian's Fight

Lesson for August 9, 1953

"It's a bonny fight," were the last words of a sermon by Rev. Andrew K. Rule; "don't be weary in well-doing," Reverend gentlemen do not always present Christianity in such vigorous terms. One hears more often something to this effect: "It's a water-tight ark; don't you want to be pulled aboard?" or "It's a wonderful school; don't you want to register?" or "It's a fine laundry; drop in and get clean!" or "It's a great hospital; don't you want some treatment?" Well, of course Christianity can be presented in all these ways. But A. K. Rule being (by way of New Zealand) a Scotsman, he would present Christianity in terms of what Celts dearly love—a fight. This is not an original idea. Paul had it long ago. That Apostle spoke of the Christian life as one that has to be lived in battleground, as we would say. He even spoke of it as a prize-fight ("I Cor. 9"). At the end of his life he referred to all of it as a "good fight."

The Nearest Enemy

God himself is presented in the Bible as a battling God. The Greeks might think of him as serene above the sky, untroubled and untroubled, but the same who wrote the Bible knew God as one who has a fight on his hands and who wages unceasing war on a persistent enemy. Note that the issue is in doubt. The great message of the Bible is that God will win. But meanwhile, the fight is on. The Christian is one who has enemies in the army of God. God's enemies are his enemies. As far as "this world is concerned" (we have no present concern with any other) our enemies, and God's, are all those forces which tear down and destroy God's purposes, everything that tears and destroys humankind. Now the Christian is bound to fight everything in public and in private life which weakens and corrupts man; but the nearest enemy to every Christian is himself. It is not true that a man is his own best friend; but it is true that he is his own worst enemy. A man can do himself more harm than any one else can do him. Many a man has lost the outer battle because he never won the fight with himself.

Fight Against Surrender

There are two opposite sins in which we have to battle with ourselves. These correspond to two kinds of temperament, and yet perhaps no man is entirely free from the need to fight on both these fronts. One is the fight with the drifter in us, the tendency to dream, to drift, to float with the tide, to let other people make all our decisions for us. We are surrounded by a pagan society, and it is not easy to maintain a higher standard. We haven't the energy to "huck" popular opinion. It takes a great deal of energy, it calls for a fighting heart, to make headway against the tide of "everybody says," "everybody does." The Christian who knows the arm which atehed does to personally, the Christian who wants to live a clean life in this or in other ways, will in many places have to be "made of sterner stuff" than most people are. It is the person who has won a victory over himself who is best able to help others.

Fight for Control

There is another kind of inner battle: the fight against our own wills. The other battle was against our lack of will; this is against will itself. We are not born or made in such a way that we can do whatever we feel like doing and always be right. Indeed if we follow our natural inclinations we may end by being wrong more than right. And just as some temperaments lean to laziness and don't-care, so other temperaments lean too far the other way. If some people are like putty, others are like gasoline vapor, likely to explode any minute. If you are like temper, it may be sex, it may be drink, it may be selfishness in any one of its countless forms. We can put it this way. There is in some of us all the time, and in all of us some of the time, the urge to shove every one else and everything else out of the way and make I WANT the rule of action.

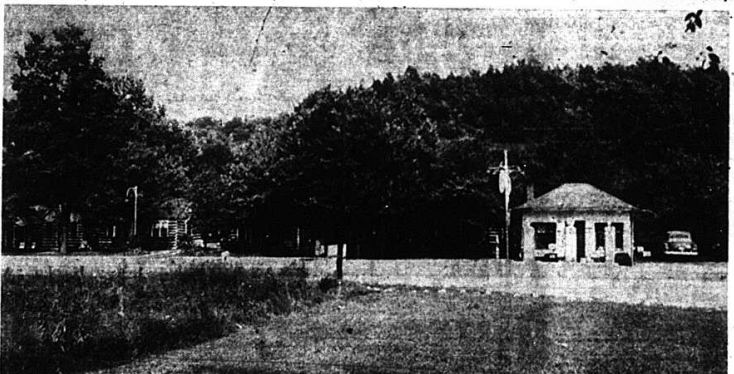

Sowder, Carter, Ballinger Win In Republican Primary Election Aug. 1st

Voting very heavy and result for many candidates too close for comfort.

The primary election last Saturday resulted in a victory for Walter Sowder for county judge with a majority of only 25 votes. His total unofficial vote was 1775 as against 1750 for Boone Saylor. Clarence Carter won the election over his other two opponents. His total vote was 1672 as against 1532 for T. J. Nicoley, clerk incumbent. The other opponent Hubert Vanzant received 303 votes. The other hottest contested race was for sheriff in which Dewey Ballinger won. He received 1397 votes and his closest rival Ivory Anglin 1220. Chas. Carter the other candidate for sheriff received 908 votes.

Lovell Clontz won the jailers race by a large majority and S. E. Chandler won by a scant 6 votes. For coroner Charles Mullins also won by a big majority receiving a total of 1347 votes. John Scott won the race for surveyor by 445 Magistrates elected are as follows: first district, Hobart Griffin; second district, Henry Cromer; third district, Lester Helton; fourth district, S. Swinford; fifth district Matt Jones. In the Democratic Primary for Magistrate in the third district, Urban Hamm won over Stevens.

The counting of the votes lasted until late Tuesday night. The court room was filled all day continuously while the Annual Homecoming Festival counting was going on. On Saturday night the room was packed with persons who wanted to know how the voting was going. Up to the very last minute no one was for sure what the final result would be so close was the race.

T. J. Nicoley, the present incumbent clerk of the county since 1922 was one of the surprising upsets of the primary. Although Mr. Nicoley has been in the clerk's office for many years, his unstinted and devoted service to the public has won for him a successful and deserved praise of all the constituents within the county. No man has ever served his office with more dignity, devotion to the public welfare than Mr. Nicoley. He deserves the highest praise and honor this county can give such a public servant. He will retire at the end of this year, conscious of the loyalty of the citizens of this county as well as his many Republican friends within the state. Mr. Nicoley's record in public office began in 1906 as deputy sheriff. In 1910 he became sheriff and in 1914 he was made circuit court clerk and in 1922 became county clerk. His public service for almost half a century in the same county is a record equalled by few men. The Signal is attempting to give the complete tabulation of the voting of last Saturday. So let us not constantly pray for good fortune, but rather let us work and pray for the strength to meet whatever the day has in store whether it be joy or sorrow let us learn to endure them both—always remembering that circumstances are sometimes beyond our control, but behavior never it.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

Scripture: Colossians 1:1-27. Devotional Reading: Psalm 67.

Christ Above All

Lesson for August 16, 1933

THE reader who goes to Sunday school will have noticed that the quarterly never print in the Scripture that is listed in this column. The reason is, the interdenominational committee preparing these lessons selects more Scripture than any quarterly is going to have room to print. This is in the hope that the student will not be content with reading about the bits from the Bible at second-hand, but will go on to read more fully in the Bible itself. This particular column is Dr. Foreman free to use the whole passages selected, not simply the verses reprinted in most quarters.

Christ Pre-eminent

It ought to go without saying that Christ is pre-eminent, that is to say above all, for the Christian. It does not go without saying, because Christians incline to forget it, or more actively, they forget him. Paul uses the word "pre-eminent" only once in Colossians 1, but he uses many other ways of declaring that Christ is above all. In Christ we have forgiveness of sins, in him all the fullness of God dwells, he is the head of the church. The Christian has been transferred to Christ's Kingdom, through Christ all men may be reconciled to one another, in Christ are "hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge"; the Christian is to be "filled with the knowledge of his will." The Christian receives him, is rooted in him, built up in him, grows to maturity in him; he is the Christian's hope of glory. All this is "in the book"; but is it in life? Does Christ actually loom as large in the life of Christians as he does in the plan of God.

You Received Christ

of it. The first thing to do, if you want to develop your prayer life is to set aside a definite time every day for it. Make it a "must," not a "whiffing you'd do" if you have time for it. When prayer is something done only "if" there is time, then there never is time, and there seldom is prayer.

In Season, Out of Season

The mature Christian will pray at regular times, but he also cultivates the habit of praying at irregular times. Do you have a regular time for looking at your watch? Perhaps so; you look at it when you wake up in the morning, you look at it at breakfast time, and so on. But no one who wears a watch looks at it only at regular hours as if it were a medicine. You look at it and on all through the day, for any number of reasons. So the Christian acquires the habit of looking to God off and on all through the day, also for a number of reasons. When a happy thing happens, the Christian breathes a prayer of thanksgiving. It does not have to be long to be real. When something seems too much to stand, the Christian just says "God, help me, and there, to help him. When he hears about some one in trouble, he does not content himself with saying "Too bad." If there is anything he can do about it, he will do it. But the Christian does not stop there. In the very midst of helping another, he will offer a prayer to God for him. This is most important perhaps when the other person is clear out of reach, when nothing we ourselves can say or do will help him at all.

Praying Like A Christian

A person might pray every day and often and yet not pray like a Christian. For a Christian's prayers are not the "gimme" kind. It is not that we should never pray for ourselves. A study of the Lord's Prayer will show that some of the petitions are for ourselves. But for what? For purity of life and for forgiveness, for daily bread—that is, for necessities, not for luxuries. It is a good thing once in a while to ask one's self: How many other persons could join me in this prayer? Am I praying for something that is going to make trouble for other people? Am I praying for something which if I get it will have to be taken away from others who need it just as much as I do? Unselfish praying and unselfish living go together. Christ himself said "Give their sakes" as he said. Prayer in his name is prayer in his spirit.
