REA'S OWN REPORT SHOWS POWER COSTS MORE WHEN GENERATED BY SUPER CO-OPS THAN WHEN PURCHASED



Average cost of all REA-generated power in U. S. is 37 per cent higher than cost from Kentucky Utilities Company, 70 per cent higher than rates under 5-year contract that has been available to all Kentucky RECCs for more than three years.

The REA's 14th Annual Report of Energy Purchased by REA Borrowers shows that the 10 super co-ops which now generate power for resale to member RECCs charged their member co-ops 13.03 mills (one and three-tenths cents) per kilowatt hour. In Kentucky, 16 RECCs which purchased power from Kentucky Utilities Company under one-year contracts paid an average of only 9.48 mills

(about ninety-five one-hundredths of one cent.) REA-generated power averaged 37 per cent higher. Two Kentucky co-operatives which purchased power from KU under 5-year contracts which have been available to ALL Kentucky RECCs for more than three years paid an average of only 7.67 mills (about three-quarters of one cent.) REA-generated power averaged 70 per cent higher.

Table comparing generated power sold vs purchased power: All U. S. Super Co-ops, 16 Kentucky RECCs (1-year contracts), 2 Kentucky RECCs (5-year contracts).

The annual savings to the 16 RECCs, and to their rural members, had they been purchasing power from Kentucky Utilities Company under 5-year contracts would have amounted to \$337,900, or more than one million dollars in the three years the 5-year contract has been available to the RECCs.

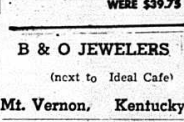

## Rural Schools Begin Year's Work Monday

Turn over of teachers small. Many return to same school. A few school have no teachers.

The rural schools of Rockcastle County began their year work last Monday. At least seventy-four schools opened the first day. Approximately three schools as yet had no teachers.

With a few days training in a special workshop held last week at Brodhead, the teachers were better prepared to start their year than ever before. Some of the teachers did college work during the summer and received special training in teaching.

Just how many pupils will attend the first day of school were unable to learn, but indications are for a pretty crowded schedule for most of the teachers.

Of particular interest will be the school at Sand Hill, where a special teacher has been provided by Ford Foundation. Sand Hill is a remote community west of Livingston. Only a jeep can make the trip to that school unless one prefers walking. Miss Brogan of Union College will be the teacher.

The schools that do not have teachers provided as yet are Buffalo, Piney, and Sinks.

## Death Takes Elmer Bodle Thompson

Elmer Bodle Thompson, well known resident of this community and a public official in one capacity or another all his life, passed away last week, Tuesday Aug. 11, after a lingering illness, at his home in Mt. Vernon. He was 67 years of age.

At an early age he united with the Church of Christ at Level Green.

Following his graduation from Transylvania College, at Lexington, he soon went into the service of his country in World War I. In his capacity of a soldier, he was ranking as a Captain when the war closed. Soon afterwards he became associated in the legal section of the Internal Revenue Department in Washington, D. C. For about twenty years he was thus engaged, but due to poor health, he resigned his position and returned to Mt. Vernon, where he made his home with his sister, Mrs. Bray and her family.

Bodle served two terms as State Representative from Rockcastle County and also was County Attorney one term. At the time of his death he had about twenty years of experience in his profession.

On July 5, 1930 he was united in marriage to Bess Meyer who now resides in Los Angeles, Calif.

Survivors are one brother, Maurice of Willalla; three sisters, Mrs. Jalia Bray of Mt. Vernon, Mrs. Fannie Price of Indianapolis and Mrs. Flossie Riddle of Denterville, Ind., also a number of nieces, nephews and other relatives.

## Lewis Ballinger Burns To Death In Texas

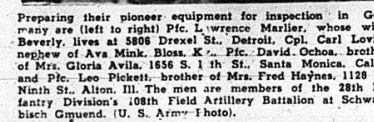
Body brought to Johnetta last week for services and burial

Lewis Ballinger, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Ballinger of Orlando met with a tragic death last week Tuesday when the car in which he was riding with four other occupants crashed, head on with a loaded canned goods truck near Carbondale, Texas. Both vehicles went up in flames with the occupants in the car trapped beneath the wreckage. One of the occupants, a girl, has not yet been identified. Four other occupants of the car were burned to death beneath the wreckage. One was thrown clear of the wreckage. The victim was taken to a morgue in Texarkana where they were identified. Twenty-four hours after the accident the family of Lewis Ballinger of Orlando were notified of the tragedy. The county committee must approve all applications for FHA credit before loans can be made. When a real estate loan is being considered to buy, enlarge, or develop a farm, or to improve housing and farm buildings, the committee also determines how much the farm is worth as security for the loan.

Advice of the committee is sought on good farm management and on the refinancing of FHA loans when borrowers build up enough equity in the property to get credit from local banks or other lenders. Winn added, Farmers who can't get private credit are not eligible for loans from the agency. Mr. Dennis Gatliff is chairman of the committee.

## It Pays to Fertilize Fall Seeded Wheat

says the committee. "Top yields per acre are just not possible on most farms without the use of plant food."

Farmers aiming at high yields per acre are advised by the committee to contact their fertilizer dealers now to make arrangements for delivery when it is advisable.

"That's the surest way to get the exact grade and amount of plant food you want," says the committee. Waiting until the last minute is hazardous. Farmers who remember the scramble for scarce supplies in last spring's rush period will see the wisdom of ordering early for this fall's needs."

The committee points out that manufacturers report that it is most possible to produce and deliver all the fertilizer farmers can profitably use on wheat in a four-week period this fall. The movement of fertilizer will have to be stretched over a longer period, starting in August and September.

It will pay farmers to fertilize the wheat they seed this fall, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

Well fed wheat will deliver more bushels per acre next year," says a statement made public by the committee.

"Higher yields will mean lower production costs and more net profit per acre."

Midwestern agronomists estimate that wheat yields per acre could be at least doubled in most states, says the committee, by better management practices, including the use of fertilizer.

"These agronomists point out that it is profitable to use anywhere from 300 to 500 pounds of fertilizer per acre on wheat."

## Plant Food Produces Three-to-One Return in Higher Crop Value

DR. GARTH VOLK, chairman of Ohio State University's agronomy department, reports that every dollar a farmer invests in fertilizer returns him \$3 in increased crop value from higher yields.

"That's a good trade," he said. "It gives you a \$3 profit for every dollar you spend. I'd like to deal with a banker that basis."

Volk reports that last year Ohio farmers bought about \$50 million worth of fertilizer. He estimates that this outlay returned \$150 million to the state's farmers.

"Now you subtract \$50 million from that total," he said, "and it gives Ohio farmers a \$100 million net profit just for the simple operation of applying fertilizer to their land."

Volk summed up the value of plant food when he said: "A farmer cannot afford not to use fertilizer to obtain high crop yields these days."
