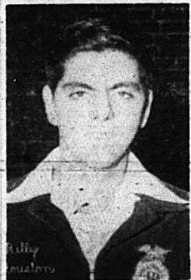

Business Firm Makes Survey For Building Site

Livingston is being carefully surveyed for possible site of large chemical plant.

Three expert engineers and industrialists were in Mt. Vernon last week for the purpose of making a careful survey regarding building a large chemical plant in this county. The men were T.N. Peck and John McWilliams, both engineers from the state of Pennsylvania for the Wood Chemical Company, New York City. The other member of the party was William Carter, industrial agent for the Louisville and New Orleans Railroad. Accompanying the three men were O. V. Hinton, J.H. Wolfe, E.E. Bullock and Dr. R. G. Webb. The men made a survey of various places including Wildie and Livingston. The former was ruled out for the lack of sufficient water. However, at Livingston the engineers apparently found what they were looking for: timber, good highway, gas, railroad, and a plentiful supply of labor and coal. All these items were requisites before a plant site could be considered. The L.N. Railroad offered its facilities of large switch yard at Livingston, plus the use of the two water storage tanks located there, but which are no longer used. At this site there is a large spring which is called "boils". Sufficient water flows from this spring, even in dry weather, to supply the water needed for the manufacturing of the chemicals. It is believed that the spring is the outlet of the flow of water that comes from the "Sinks" about four miles up stream.

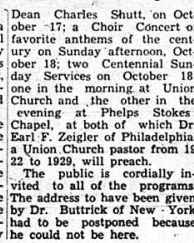

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

International Student Devotional Series

Scripture: Matthew 5:1-16; John 14:1-12; 1 Corinthians 13:1-13; Hebrews 11:1-12; James 1:2-8; Devotional Reading: Isaiah 61:1-9

The Shining Light

Lesson for October 18, 1953

ARE we agreed that Christians ought to plan ahead for a better world? Are we agreed that the foundation of a better world is Jesus Christ and Christian principles? Then we can go on with the real question, a very practical one: What exactly can God's "new men" do to leave this world better than they found it? Obviously, we shall never see an ideal world this side of heaven; granted, we shall be imperfect persons as long as we live in this world. It is imperative—more than that, it is imperative, a "Must," for Christians to work and plan in the direction of the world of God's ideal.

Salt And Light

The first thing we can do, Jesus said, is to be something, just as he was to his disciples—and to us—in terms of salt and light. Now salt and light do not do anything, or rather, what they do depends entirely on their being what they are. If salt is salt, it will change its mind and decide to be pepper or a sand, or a cork, or anything else it would want it. If Dr. Foreman an electric light could change itself into a doorknob, it would cause no end of trouble. The salt doesn't rush around doing something, it just is salt, the light is light. Salt and light are alike in this: there is no real substitute for either one. So there is no substitute for real Christians in this world. They are alike also in that they do whatever good they do, by contact. Salt in a shaker, light in a steel box, are of no use. So the Christian, who is light in the world must not shrink from contact with it.

Furthermore, salt and light are alike also in that they must not be over-prominent. No one cares for over-salted food or glaring lights. So a Christian who is like a Pharisee, wearing his virtues on his chest like a string of beads, is a nuisance to all concerned. But still it is true that the first and most constant service which every Christian can render in this confused sad world, is simply to be as good a Christian, as faithful a representative and as true a witness of Jesus Christ as he possibly be.

Helping Others

Another thing that God's new men can do, a thing which can remake the world and in many respects has been re-making it—a thing that sounds simple but which calls for a great deal of thought and planning, is this: just helping other people.

The New Testament makes it quite clear that an unhelpful Christian is hardly a real Christian at all. Naturally, not all Christians have the same opportunities. A little girl just entering the first grade can help her classmates and her teacher; but the teacher, who is a good one, can help all the class even more. The principal of the school, by selecting good teachers, can help the whole school system. A boy on a farm in Missouri does not have the same opportunity to be helpful that he would have if he had been appointed Secretary of State. But a Christian, whether his zone of operations is a farm or the world, can always find ways of "going about doing good" as the Master did.

Winning Others

There is one thing that most Christians do not do, which—if they only went at it with an enthusiasm—would spread their light farther than any other one thing. Soil Fertility and Food Value

The need for lime in restoring the productivity of the soil has long been recognized by soil technicians and farmers, but technicians fairly recently concluded that the nutritional value of the food has a definite relationship to the mineral content of the land on which the crop was grown. This need is the most predominant in the heavy rainfall area, which in this country is the eastern half of the United States plus the States bordering on the Pacific ocean. Lime replaces the calcium and magnesium, and to a lesser extent the minor elements, that are lost through leaching, which increases the amount of rainfall and intensity of cropping the soil. The rainwater carries away the calcium and magnesium and replaces these alkaline elements in the soil with acid hydrogen. This reduction changes the chemical composition of the soil and reduces the solubility of many elements, thereby reducing the nutritional value of the crops grown on it. The agronomists in one of our leading eastern States have concluded that the soil exchange complex should be maintained in the following ratio in terms of equivalents: hydrogen 20, calcium 65, magnesium 10, and potassium 5. A marked departure from these equivalents may result in a deficiency of some element which may cause nutritional disturbances to the consumer.

It is apparent from this that the amount of calcium needed in the soil is very high. That lost through leaching or taken up by crops can be replaced easily and most inexpensively by the addition of finely ground liming materials, which generally analyze from 75% to 100% of calcium carbonate equivalent.

The consumer does not get all of his mineral requirements from the soil. The human body consists of about 8.75% calcium on a dry weight basis or about 20 times the amount found in corn plants. Hence it is evident that neither corn nor other crops can supply humans or animals with their total mineral requirements. Animal feeds are fortified with minerals and these are passed on to humans in the form of better quality meats, milk, eggs, etc. Humans also resort to a variety of vitamin pills to meet their bodily requirements of minerals. To reduce the addition of mineral supplements in animal and human diets, it is evident that feed and food must be grown on mineral rich soil. It is to the interest and benefit of all to see that farmers either through adequate income and education or incentive payments maintain the fertility and productivity of their soil.

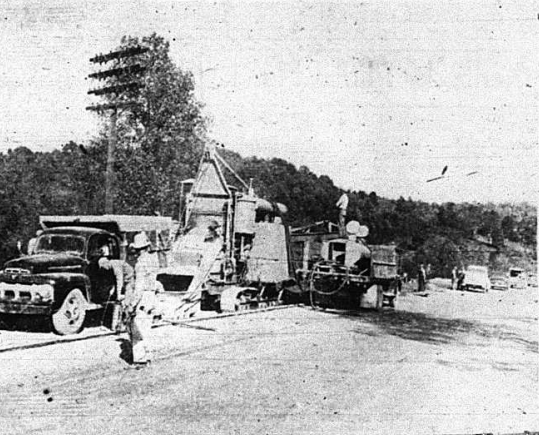
