Statement by Senator John Sherman Cooper Regarding The Amendment To Section 186:

"I intend to vote for and support Amendment No. 1. I know that proposals to amend the Constitution of Kentucky are always carefully weighed, which is proper. It has always been my belief that Kentucky's progress depends in greatest measure upon its educational progress. In fact the basis of free government is education. I shall vote for and support the Amendment to Section 186 because I do not see any early opportunity for substantial educational advancement in Kentucky except through this Amendment."

To The Voters Of Rockcastle County

Kentucky Constitution section 186 provides for the distribution of all school funds on a census pupil basis, with the exception of 25% which may be distributed on the basis of need. It is highly desirable that all money for education be used on the basis of need rather than according to this section of the constitution.

Under the present system, the distribution of funds is as follows: \$40 per pupil for the lowest district; \$55 per pupil for the average district and \$140 per pupil for the highest district.

If a \$10,000.00 appropriation were added to the common school fund, the present school census allotment would be: \$55. per pupil for the lowest district; \$76 per pupil for the average district and \$193 per pupil for the highest district. Rockcastle is in the low bracket and more appropriation would give this county very little more money, but will add greatly to school districts where there are so many students getting educated by church groups rather than by public funds.

The school plan which will be submitted to the Legislature this coming session, if this section of the Constitution is amended, will be designed to assist just such districts as this one. Here in this County we can not afford to not support Amendment 1.

In a statement released this week, Sen. Earle Clements gave his reasons for supporting the Amendment to Section 186 of the State Constitution.

Among reasons given were "Great inequalities" made mandatory by present methods of school distribution. Inequalities "Grow Greater with each increase" in the school fund.

"Section 186," he said, "Places a premium on non-attendance, or it may be a premium on future illiteracy." Although there are other supporting reasons for the Amendment of Section 186, he said, "The fact that it will continue to be a barrier to an equalized program which is the only guarantee to our elimination of illiteracy, justifies fully every Kentuckian's support of the Amendment."

"This Amendment, if passed, will assure a sound foundation upon which education can build more rapidly in Kentucky," he concluded.

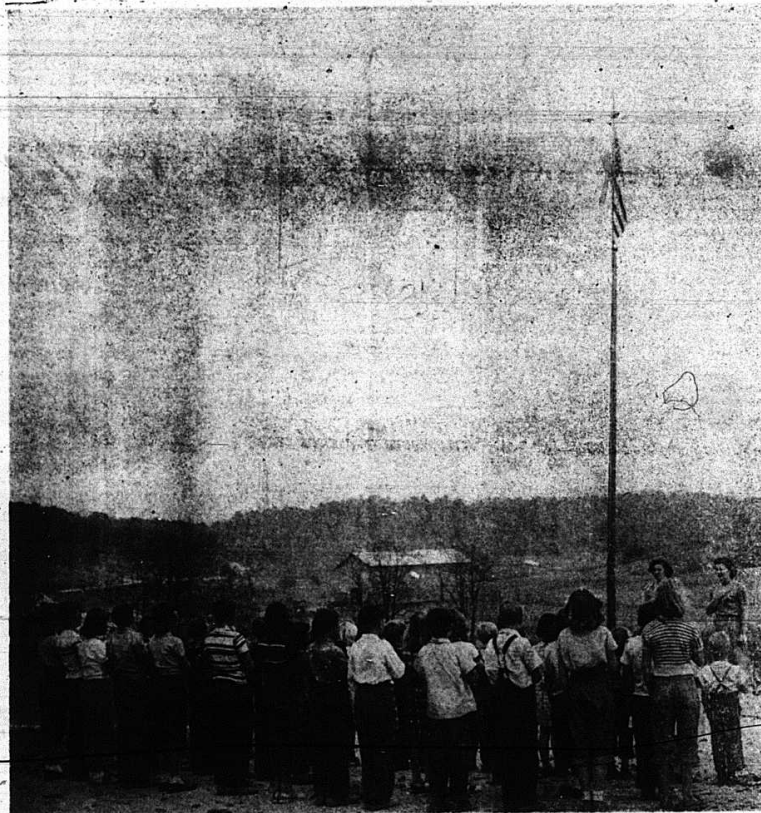
Kentucky is one of the very few states that does not have the minimum foundation educational program, in fact it is the only one. The reason for not having it is because of Section 186 in our Constitution.

Until the money in Kentucky that is allotted to the Counties is on a fair and equal distribution basis, we cannot expect to have a good sound educational program. Clauses contained in our constitution, like 186, is the reason for Kentucky's ranking so very, very high in the illiteracy group. During World War 2, Kentucky had more men rejected from Military service than any other state in the nation because of mental and educational deficiencies. In order to correct these deficiencies, it is going to be necessary to have Amendment 186 changed. We have the privilege of doing this November 3.

To repeal Section 186 in our State Constitution is being endorsed by practically all the different kinds of organizations and by leaders from both political parties, representing the thinking of thousands of Kentuckians who feel that for the betterment of the state as a whole, the weakness in our educational program should be corrected.

The other 47 states do not now have a stumbling block in their educational system as does Kentucky's 186. We can have a much better school system on the same amount of money if it is equally distributed.

By voting YES November 3, on the proposed school amendment 186, we may have the same adequate educational opportunities for our children throughout Kentucky and also throughout the nation. VOTE YES.

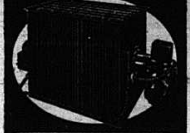

Kentucky Farmers Get More Land Bank Loans

Kentucky farmers have borrowed 17 percent more money from the Federal Land Bank during the month of 1953 than they did in the correspond ing period one year ago. These figures were revealed by Mr. M.S. Kennedy, president of the bank, in his report at the annual shareholders' conference held in Louisville, Kentucky October 20-21. Some 200 farmer-directors of national farm loan associations in Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee were in attendance.

Representing the Pioneer National Farm Loan Association at the conference were: Geo. H. Roberts, Brodhead, Kentucky and R.L. Rankin, Rt.2, Lancaster, Kentucky.
Federal Land Bank loans totaling \$16,145,400 were made in the first nine months of this year, Mr. Kenney reported. At this rate the bank's business for 1953 will exceed any of its 36 years of operation except 1922 and 1934. Reasons given for the increase were the 4 percent interest rate maintained by the bank in the face of generally rising interest rates and the pinch farmers are feeling between lower commodity prices and higher operating costs.

In a few months the important highways in Kentucky will have large outdoor signs warning motorists to drive carefully. At least 150 such signs will be placed at strategic points where drivers can easily see and read them. These signs are a donation from the Kentucky Outback Sign Association of which David Craig of Mount Vernon is the president. It was at the suggestion of Mr. Craig that these signs be placed on the highways and practically all the member organizations of the state are cooperating in this worthy project. The signs will appear in December warning motorists of slippery pavements. These signs are 8x21 feet in dimensions and will be placed on a board twelve feet in width and twenty-five feet in length. The sign will have a border around the sign. Governor Wetherby's name will be imprinted. The second sign will appear a little later and will have the picture of a motor cycle cup and helmet with the words: "The Life He Saves Maybe yours."

On another page you will find an advertisement in the support of the Constitutional Amendment of Section 186. In the center of that advertisement is a group picture of children standing at salute to the flag of the United States. The pupils are from the school where Mrs. Vera Scott and Mrs. G. Cummins are teachers. They are doing a superb job. It is the children like this who will soon be our adult citizens who must carry on the affairs of the state and community. They are the future. They will make good citizens. They are loyal, patriotic, sincere. It is that kind of material with which we are working and whom we are desperately trying to help through a change in our school program.

I will recommend to the Legislature that present method of distributing funds be continued if the appropriation to common schools is the same for next biennium as it is for the current two years. If the appropriation is more, I will recommend that the additional money be placed in the equalization fund for distribution according to sound financial principles.

Under this method, no district may have more, the Governor explained.

Wetherby said he had "great confidence" in the members of the General Assembly and called on the public to trust them with determining an equitable method of sharing the school funds.

The Governor also came out strongly last week for the Constitutional amendment that will appear on the ballot Nov. 3. The "short ballot" amendment, as the measure is called, would provide for only five officials elected statewide and would give the General Assembly the authority to determine how the state secretary of state, commissioner of Agriculture and superintendent of public instruction are selected.

Greater Care Urged In Issuing Licenses

The State Department of Motor Transportation today appealed to circuit court clerks for co-operation in connection with the issuance of drivers' and chauffeurs' badges to operators of four-horse motor vehicles.

George M. Catlett, council secretary of the department, pointed out that there have been scattered scales of chauffeurs' badges to persons under age "with the result that such drivers are licensed and sent forth on the highways to illegally transport persons and valuable property."


The law provides that a person must be at least 18 years old before he may legally drive a truck or other vehicle hauling property, and must be 21 before he may drive a bus, taxi cab or vehicle transporting

God-Planned Homes

Lesson for November 1, 1953

NO Christian home can be found between the covers of the Bible. Naturally there were no Christians before Christ, and the New Testament books were all written so early in our era that what we know as a Christian home could not exist. The "family" that was brought up in a Jewish home. Timothy had a Jewish mother but a Greek father, and the "family" that was in his mother and grandmother was not, probably, the faith of Christians. Nobody named in the Bible was married to a Christian church by a Christian minister. We have to say, if we stick to the facts of history, that Christians home is something that developed out of the Christian faith which the Bible inspires and instructs. It is something that the Bible directly describes.

Love In The Home

The Christian home is not something so radically different from other kinds that it can't be recognized. Among the most primitive races there are homes of a sort. Always there is a married pair, father and mother, and children. Always there is less under their care. Father and mother, aided often by other members of the tribe, teach the young who they are expected to know. So much is universal. Dr. Foreman

Now in the Christian home, one gets a radically different picture. The less developed types; training in religion. This we have inherited from the Hebrew long before us. According to the economy of the law of God was to be known by the parents and taught by them to their children. This is simply the Ten Commandments, but the whole management of life under the will of God. Now it should go without saying that if parents try to teach their children, it is their own doing right themselves, failure is certain. Some of the most important matters can be taught only by example. To take one illustration: parents should be the best persons to tell their children what Christian marriage is and how to achieve success in it. But if parents live in constant strife or even break up altogether, then what? A recent study was made of 12,000 young people. It was discovered that in the homes where they came from, where the parents were both Roman Catholics, 64 per cent of the homes had broken up; where both were Protestants, 48 per cent had broken up; where the parents were of different religions, 15.2 per cent had broken up; and where there was no religion at all, 16.7 per cent of the homes were broken. What of those unsuccessful husbands and wives who are now just young ages will have much more effect on their children than any good advice.

Love In The Home

A good home is much more than a place where everyone behaves correctly and lives just as the model penitentiary and the model home is that in one, the good behavior is compulsory. In the home, wherever, to have its perfect work must not be considered. If every member of a home really set out to be the kind of person Paul described in 1 Cor. 13 of Eph. 5, breakups would be seldom indeed. Love ought not to be left to mothers alone!

God's Planning

A Christian home is one where God's plan of love is followed. But God never does for us what we can do for ourselves. We have to plan for our homes just as we do for anything else that we want to succeed. This should begin early, too, like all good planning.
