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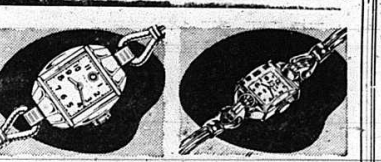

Hospital Bond Issue Passes By Wide Margin So Far

Heavy voting in entire county, Amendment 186 passes by overwhelming majority.

Latest counting of ballots in four precincts would indicate that the bond issue will pass by a wide margin. Mt. Vernon's vote on the issue was 490 yes and 75 no. Also the school amendment of section 186 carried by an overwhelming majority, in this town. The vote was 490 yes and 75 no. On the short ballot the vote was 153 yes and 174 no.

Mayor for Mt. Vernon will be Roy Cummins, mayor incumbent. He had no opposition. He received 167 votes. For councilman the following was the result: Carl Brown 179, Billy McHargue 173, Jack L. Laswell 163, Everett Chasney 162, W.G. Landrum 159, Roy Winstead 158, E.L. Pardue 155, C.B. Nicley 122, Chester Hellmuth 121, Jack St. Clair 106, E.M. Hunt 90, and Bob Childress 82. The 6 candidates with the highest number of votes were elected.

Improve Voltage Regulation

Kentucky Utilities Company has completed work here to give Mt. Vernon better electric service by improving voltage regulation and strengthening the local distribution system. Roy B. Owens, local K.U. manager, said the \$22,000 project included completely rebuilding of the city substation and conversion of the distribution from 2,400 volts to 4,000 volts. Automatic reclosing oil circuit breakers and three new voltage-regulators were installed in the substation. The work also included the installation of new feeder circuit.

Revival at Ottawa

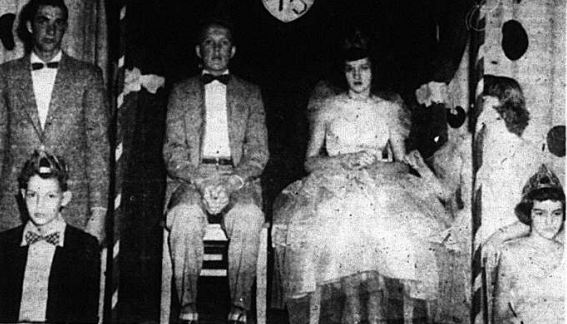

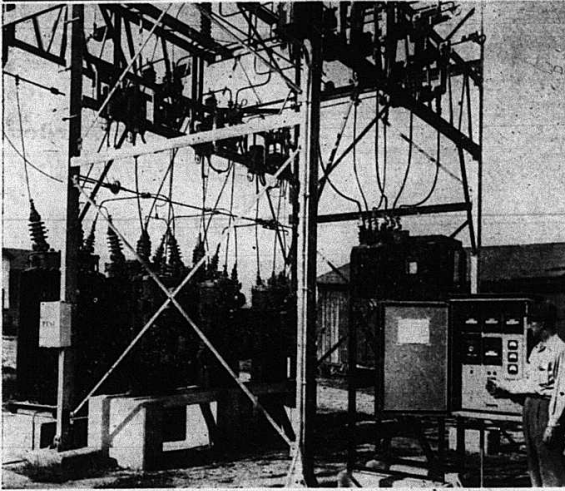

Hanford-Billows Road Being Built
A contract for construction on the Level Green-Hanford-Billows road in Rockcastle County, Ky., has been awarded the Spickard and McClure Construction Co. of Jamestown according to an announcement by William P. Armstrong, Commissioner of Highways.
The company submitted a low bid of \$22,243.35.
The contract calls for 2.1 miles of roadway and a traffic bound limestone from north end of State Maintenance 2.2 miles north of Billows extending north and northwest.

FFA Training Center
The state-wide drive to raise \$250,000 to improve and expand the Future Farmers of America State Leadership Training Center at Hardinsburg will begin November 10 and will continue until Thanksgiving.
An announcement by drive chairman Robert B. Hensley, Louisville attorney and vice-president of the Green River Steel Corporation at Owensboro, states that the drive will officially begin with a kickoff meeting at the F.F.A. center in Hardinsburg, Tuesday, November 10.
F.F.A. bought the 100-acre camp from the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1937. C.C.C. barracks, dining hall and other buildings are still being used. The high-school boys have added more than \$100,000 including a swimming pool and auditorium. But Hensley said, the old C.C.C. buildings are in poor condition and the present facilities are inadequate for F.F.A. needs.
During the past 10 years, the camp has served more than 17,000 boys. Training there is in charge of relations to the farm for more prosperous farming careers, Hensley said.
Some 1,500 Future Farmers and their sponsors, representing all 150 Kentucky counties, will attend the program at Hardinsburg next Tuesday. The program will begin at 10 a.m. with a parade to be led by the 124th Regiment of the National Guard.
