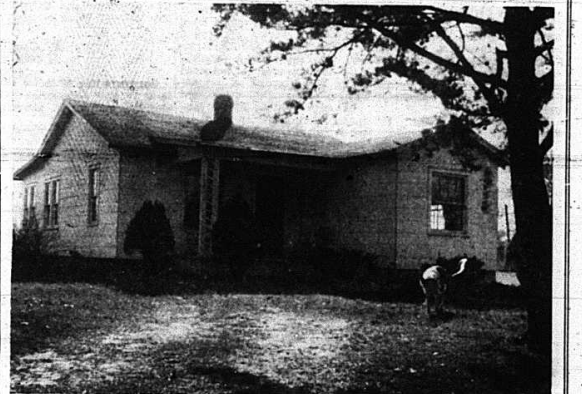

County Election Places All Republicans In Office

Hospital additional bond issue passes by 1947 yes and 538 no.

Hospital additional bond issue passes by 1947 yes and 538 no. The final result of the election last Tuesday resulted in an all-Republican victory for every County Office.

When we reported the election last week we were able to get only thirteen precincts and gave the totals for these precincts, for the County Judge and sheriff. Since these were the most hotly contested offices in the County.

Walter Sowder, jailer incumbent, was elected judge by a vote of 226,000, or a majority of 1075 over the two Democrat candidates. J.H. Wolfe, democrat, received 459 votes, and Amos Owens, a Republican, a plurality received 727 votes. This is quite a record when one realizes that the name had to be written in.

James Lambert, as County representative, had no opposition, received 2171 votes. He will be returned to the state legislature for his second term.

T.J. Nicely received 2166 votes for County Attorney. He had no opposition.

Clarence Carter received 2261 vote for County Clerk. He had no opposition.

Mrs. Lela Payne received 1958 votes for sheriff, short term. She had no opposition.

Dewey Babcock received 2241 votes or a majority of 1148 over his Democrat opponent, George Hurst. Mr. Hurst received 1093 votes.

Lovell Clanton received 2176 votes for jailer. He had no opposition.

S.E. Chandler received 2165 votes for tax commissioner. He had no opposition.

John Scott received 2095 votes for County Surveyor. He had no opposition.

Charles Alfred Mullins received 2149 votes for coroner. He had no opposition.

For magistrate the following was the result: First District, Robert Griffin 578 votes, Second District, Henry Connor 176, Dewey Graves 75, Third District, Urban Hamm 57, Lester Helton 49, Fourth District, J.S. Swinford 416, Fifth District, Matt Jones 429.

The magistrates for the County will be Robert Griffin, Mt. Vernon, Henry Connor, Livingston, Urban Hamm, Brodhead, J.S. Swinford, Conway, and Matt Jones, Orlando.

For Brodhead the following was the result: Police Judge, W.R. Watson 151, J.H. Taylor 87.

Town Trustees: Terrill Chandler 187, Hermon Taylor, Olney Sutton 156, S.J. (Jack) Owens 156, John R. Bishop 14, Delbert Laswell 139, Charlie Carmack 69. (The five highest are elected.)

For Livingston the following was the result: Police Judge, Dewey Bingham 58, J.H. Jones 58, John S. Ballard 18, Freelan Hughes 7.

For Trustees: Clell Pike 80, Calvin Webb 72, Charles E. Jones 73, P.L. Poynter 70, Junior Woodall 60, Gilbert Bales 56, Elmer Halcomb 55, J.S. Carpenter 54, T.J. Wise 48, Leonard B. Francisco 57. The five receiving the highest votes, will serve as Town Councilmen. The hospital bond issue for an additional amount of \$75,000 carried by a total of 1497 yes and 538 no.

Water Situation In Mt. Vernon Not Yet Serious

The water situation in Mt. Vernon has not yet reached the point where it is necessary to curtail any use of it, however Mr. Henry Cox warns that there may have to be some curtailment of water uses for emergency purposes. As of Wednesday of this week the water had dropped about 4 1/2 feet from the spillway, meaning that the reservoir is not being filled by the springs. This is the most serious Mt. Vernon has ever experienced since the reservoir was built in 1936. The water level is now dropping a little less than an inch a day since October 27 when it dropped 13 inches. If there is no rain within the next two weeks it will become necessary to draw water from the city's well. This well is located near the Ralph Griffin home and was used before the present reservoir was built.

The present reservoir is fed by at least 17 springs, large and small. When filled to capacity the lake holds 1,000,000 gallons. At present the daily consumption is 60,000 gallons. The depth of the lake has an average of 8 feet but at the far end where the dirt was removed to make the dam, the depth of the water is many more feet.

If the drought continues too long, rationing may have to be done, Mr. Cox stated.

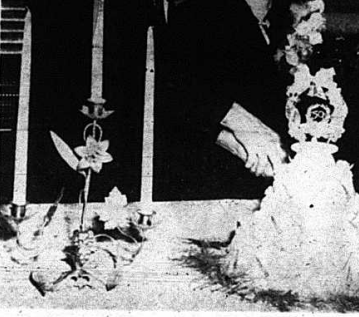

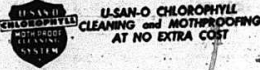

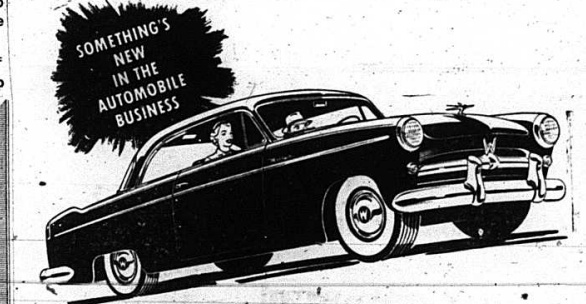

Ways To Use Honey

When you eat honey these days, the U.S. Department of Agriculture points out, you are not only enjoying one of Nature's treats, but you are also helping to assure the country of continued supplies of 50 or more important crops which depend entirely on the honeybee pollination.

If the keeping of bees for this agricultural task is to continue, producers must have a ready market for their honey crop each year.

A new booklet on "Honey-Some Ways to Use It," by food specialists in the Department's Bureau of Human Nutrition

and Home Economics, is off the press, as this year's sizable honey crop comes to markets.

The 16 page booklet gives home makers about 20 selected recipes in which honey is an ingredient, including bread, cakes, cookies, pastries and other desserts, sauces, salad dressings, and sandwich fillings. It gives also suggestions about cooking with honey and serving it uncooked, as well as buying pointers on forms and grades of honey on the market.

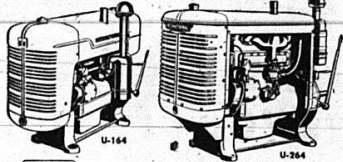

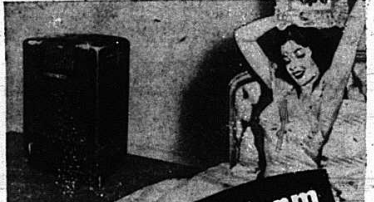
