County Health News

Cruising through Kentucky hills these days one sees many rabbits scurrying across the rural roads and into the trees—a reminder, to hunters that the season begins November 20 and runs through January 18.

Hayes, Sanitarian for the Rockcastle County Health Department, recently issued a warning reminder about tularemia or "rabbit fever."

"Hunters may well heed a Hunter Beware sign," said Mr. Hayes. "Most hunters think only in terms of the sign to keep off private property if they are not invited, but there is also an important, non-official sign reading 'Beware of Tularemia.'"

Rabbit fever is definitely one of the dangers of the hunting season. Eighteen cases were reported in 1952 in Kentucky. One fatality resulted.

Mr. Hayes said that small cards listing precautions to tularemia will be available from the county clerk's office when hunting licenses are issued for this year's season. It would be wise to post this information on the family bulletin board too, so that all will heed the message.

Hunting Season Open

Kentucky's principal hunting season for quail and rabbits opened on November 20 and continue through January 18 amid reports that the supply of these two species this year is at great or greater than for the past several seasons. From throughout Kentucky, the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, has received encouraging reports on the game prospects from its Conservation Officers with some sections claiming more game than in previous years and others reporting an equal amount.

The quail and rabbit season will be preceded by the beginning of the waterfowl shooting period at noon on November 17. That season will close on January 10 with shooting hours after the opening day from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. The limit for ducks per day is four which may not include more than one woodcock with a possession limit after two or more days of hunting of eight. The daily and possession limit for geese is five which may not include more than two Canada or whitefronted geese. A woodcock season, from November 20 through December 29, and a jacksnipe season opening on November 20 and extending through December 31, also has been provided this year with a limit of four woodcock per day and a possession limit of eight. The daily and possession limit of snipe is eight.

A ruffed grouse season will extend through the hunting period for rabbits and quail with a bag limit of two and a possession limit of four. The bag limit for rabbits is eight per day or a possession limit of 16 after two or more days of hunting, and the quail limit is 10 with a possession limit of 20. A state hunting license is required for all hunting and a federal duck stamp for the hunting of waterfowl must be obtained. Since 25 days of the squirrel season was lost due to the forest fire menace those 25 days will be given back to the hunters starting with the opening of the rabbit and quail season on November 20 and extending through December 15.

Woman Shot In Bedroom Of Restaurant

Coroner's jury gives verdict that death was due to wounds caused by gun in hands of unknown person

Mrs. Ben Hastay 41, was found dead on the floor of the bedroom of Ben Hastay's Restaurant located about 1/4 mile east of Mt. Vernon on U. S. 25 last Saturday forenoon. She was shot in the head just above her left eye with a .38 Special pistol, belonging to Mr. Hastay. In an interview with Mr. Hastay he stated that his wife had come home from London where they have been making their temporary home recently. Mr. Hastay had been here since Wednesday when his wife came here carrying with some members of the family Saturday morning. She had been in the house for about twenty minutes when Mr. Hastay heard the shot from the pistol. He was standing near the ice-cream dispenser at the time of the shooting. When he went into the room he found his wife lying on the floor, with her coat still on, the pistol lying on the floor.

Mr. Hastay attempted to flag some tourist and succeeded to make a hurried trip to the undertaker Mr. Cox to report the tragedy. Another stranger passing by sent word to the sheriff Deputy Wellington.

When Mr. Ballinger, Cox and Mr. Hastay entered the room they found Mrs. Hastay there. Coroner Livesay was notified who immediately summoned a jury to give a verdict. The verdict was that Mrs. Hastay died from the wound made by a gun in the hands of an unknown person. Whether the wound was self-inflicted or made by some one else is to be determined later by a grand jury that is to meet Wednesday.

The body of Mrs. Hastay was taken to the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. Charlie Sturgill about 4 miles south west of London. The funeral and burial was to be there. Mrs. Hastay was the former Mrs. Dillon and was married to Mr. Hastay a little over a year ago. Mrs. Hastay had seven children by a previous marriage.

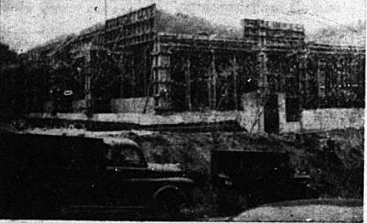
