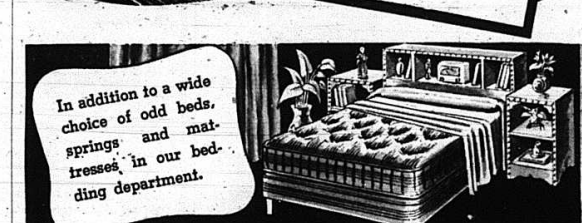
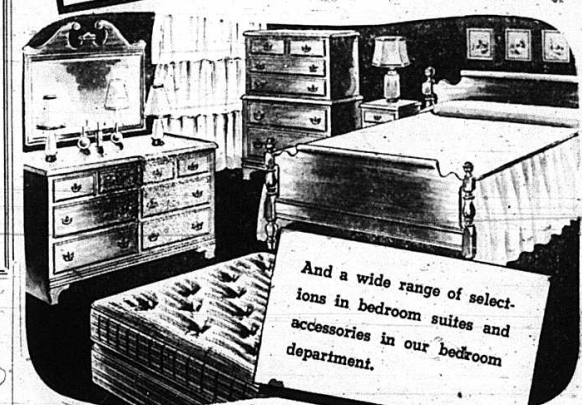

Young Farmers Purchase Registered Guernsey Herd

Kenneth Todd and Elmer Ponder, two young farmers of near the Quail section in Rockcastle County, and Bill Norton, instructor of Agriculture at the Mt. Vernon School, attended the Registered Guernsey Cattle Sale at the Lansdowne Farm in Lansdowne Fellows Beauty, a yearling heifer. Her sire is December 7th and brought back with them eight head of registered Guernsey heifers and calves to be placed on the farms of the two farmers. Mr. Norton stated that the cow Marie Beauty with a milk record of 13,072 pounds of milk and 560 pounds of butter fat as a 3-year-old. Mr. Ponder brought three more heifers from this herd of high producers. Mr. Ponder and Mr. Todd are producing herd that Ponder and Todd purchased their stock of a 2-year old heifer Lansdowne Beauty. "This is the kind of Footprints Sadie, whose dam dairy breeding," says Mr. Ponder. "You need to build a profit with a milk record of 12,467 pounds and 651 pounds of farm. And it is the kind of butter fat as a senior 3-year in the county to put it out old. The sire of this heifer is front in the dairy industry."

Rabies Treatment Administered

Vernon. The head of the carcass sus-

pected of rabies was sent to the laboratory at the University of Kentucky at Lexington and the health officer here received the report that stated: "Examination-positive of rabies." The report goes on to say: "Inasmuch as the examination of the brain indicates that this animal was infected with rabies or hydrophobia, anyone exposed to the saliva through handling or feeding or from having been bitten within a period of ten days prior to the first symptoms, should take the Pasteur or anti-rabic treatment immediately to guard against contracting the disease."

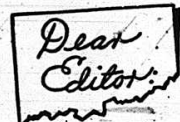

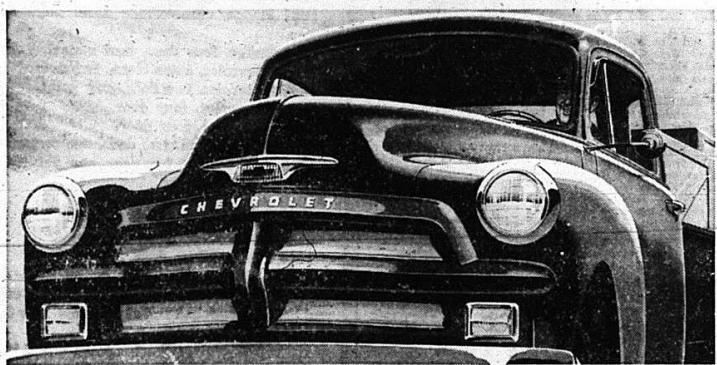

County Agent Notes

Use Of Tobacco Stalks

Tobacco stalks are an important part of the income of tobacco farms. Their main value lies in the great amount of fertilizer nutrients, especially nitrogen and potassium, they contain. A 2000-pound burley crop will yield about 1 ton of stalks which contain about 60 pounds of nitrogen, 8 pounds of phosphorus, and 60 pounds of potash. One ton of stalks contains about the same plant food as 5 to 6 tons of manure.

Stalks should be applied to land with caution, so as to prevent the spread or build up of tobacco diseases in the field. Black shank may be carried through stalks or tobacco trash out of the barn to clean land and cause a further spread of the disease on the farm. Stalks from a crop infected with fusarium wilt, applied back on the tobacco field will usually cause the fungus on Kentucky Mosaic virus will live in stalks spread in the field about a month, therefore it is always advisable to burn stalks from a mosaic infected crop are to be put on tobacco land that they be spread in the early winter. If the crop is free of these diseases, stalks may be used on tobacco land without serious risk of loss; otherwise they should be used on pasture land, spread on cover crops to be turned for use on crops than tobacco, or used on small grains.

Heavy losses of fertility are experienced each year from careless and wasteful practices in handling tobacco stalks. A stalk rack at the end of the stripping bench will save labor. Stalks should be moved from the rack to a wagon and spread as soon as possible.

SECOND: We must get our growers together and get organized at once if we expect to get any this year. Plants are scarce. Come ready to put your order with Mr. Brown. Plants set this spring means a crop of berries in 1955. By the time we grow the berries there will be two good markets to take all we produce.

Be sure and come to this meeting. The county has a chance to be selling \$175,000 of berries to \$200,000 worth of berries in 1955 if we start now to setting plants.

Come to this meeting, bring your neighbors along with you, and hear Mr. Magill discuss the growing and harvesting the crop and Mr. Summers on marketing. Since tobacco stalks are cut why not put the land in strawberries?

ally winter storage buildings should be available for all equipment. Before storing the equipment all badly worn and broken parts should be repaired or replaced. All bearings and other friction points should be greased or oiled as recommended by the manufacturer.

After the tobacco is stripped is a good time to overhaul that engine that gave so much trouble last summer.

Fall Testing Of Soils

The merit of fall testing of soils compared to spring testing is a question often raised in the county. The advantages of fall testing outweigh the disadvantage as much or more testing should be done in the fall as in the spring. A few of the advantages are that farmers have more time to take good samples in the fall, the technician has more time to run them and the county agent has more time to give consideration to the recommendations. A disadvantage is that the soil is sometimes dry that it is difficult to collect the samples, especially if an auger is used. However, this difficulty is easily overcome by using a piece of garboard with a hole in it the same size as the auger that is used. After the trash is removed from the site to be sampled, the garboard is placed over the area and held closely to the ground by standing on it. If the soil is too dry to run them, any soil that falls off the auger will be collected on the garboard.

The availability of the fall test is perhaps as good as that of a spring test. It should be expected that land from which large crops of corn, wheat and soybean crops have been harvested will test lower in some of the plant foods in the fall than in the spring, especially nitrogen, but the difference will be insignificant as far as recommendations are concerned.

Farmers should test their soil before fertilizer materials are bought or contracted. Sometimes a wet spring delays sampling of the soil and this causes a rush in the laboratory technician and the county agent.

Many times farmers buy their fertilizers before having the soil tested and the recommendations they have to be made to fit the fertilizer on hand. Quite often farmers will save money when they buy their fertilizers according to the test.

Shelled nuts keep well in home freezers, provided they are in moisture-vapor resistant containers. This fall's supply of nuts is so abundant that now may be a good time to put a stock in the freezer for future use.

Those who have freezer or locker space may be able to take advantage of the lower prices for a bulk of ten offered for nutmeats sold in quantity.

Nuts may be stored in any type of freezer container desired, but the specialists suggest that it may be most convenient to put them in a "freezer bag" that holds about the quantity to be used at one time.

Plain shelled nuts held at zero F. should keep their flavor for eight months to a year, salted nuts for several months. Salt has been found to hasten the rancidity of fats and oils in food in frozen storage.

The first step is to scrape the hardened wax from the surface of the cloth gently with a dull knife. Then sponge the stain with cleaning fluid, such as carbon tetrachloride, as you would treat any grease spot.

This is easier than the familiar method of laying the stained fabric on a blotter and pressing with a warm iron. If any traces of color are left, they usually can be removed by sponging with a cloth dipped in a mixture of two quarts water to one part rubbing alcohol.

Safety specialists add this caution: When carrying a can of cleaning fluid, even a little, use it outdoors or in a well ventilated room.
