MEITRIOUSLY achieved records in the 1953 National 4-H and Meat Animal programs have brought state honors to many club members from Kentucky. The winners and some of their major achievements follow:

**Top in Girls' Record**

Her all-around outstanding record in home economics has brought a high honor to Eugena Brown, 17, of Crestwood. She has been named state winner in the 1953 4-H Girls' Record program. Her reward of a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress was provided by Montgomery Ward.

During her seven years in 4-H Club work, she has completed 40 projects. This year her project work included 125 quilts and 100 pounds of frozen food; canning, 398 quarts; housekeeping, 1,235 hours; sewing six garments; food preparation, 160 bakings and 185 meals. She has been a junior recreation leader, and member of the Ballardville 4-H Club, of which Mrs. E. B. Brown is adult leader. She is the daughter of Eugene B. Brown.

**Beautifies Family Home**

For greatly improving her family's homestead surroundings, Annette Allen, 18, of Lexington, has been named State winner in the 1953 4-H Beautification of Home program. Enlarging of her home with the resultant elation of scraps of lumber, nails and other debris, is what inspired Annette to take over the beautification of her home grounds. Existing lawns and flower beds were set in around the house and flower beds arranged. Without any assistance, Annette painted the entire house. She is continuing her plans for beautifying her home and grounds.

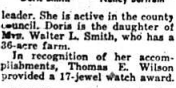

**Gets Frozen Food Award**

A 19-jewel wrist watch was presented Nancy Bertram, 18, of Mt. Vernon, when she was singled out for State honors in the 4-H Frozen Foods program for Club boys and girls. The watch was provided by the International Harvester Co.

In qualifying, she learned skills in preparing and packaging foods, how to use freezing equipment economically and the types of foods best adapted to freezing.

During five years of freezing foods, Nancy has prepared 863 quarts of fruits and vegetables, 1,710 pounds of meats, and 638 packages of baked and cooked products. Exhibiting frozen foods at local and state fairs, she has won numerous blue ribbons. Competing with fresh baked products in a local show, Nancy won first with frozen cakes, rolls and candy. Among her activities are demonstrations on correct freezing techniques, helping friends with foods freezing, and giving her products as gifts to sick neighbors. Nancy's projects include canning, gardening and home improvement.

He stopped and asked himself the question, "Bill Lyle, how big a fool can you be? You know the problem: the plywood won't fit the boat. What are the facts in the case? Immediately he felt better because he had conquered his worry by deciding on a course of action and acting on the decision.

This case made him think of all the times that he had been in similar situations where there were other small things to worry about. Now when he has occasion for worry he simply stops a minute and thinks each little worry through. He gathers the facts, analyzes them and decides on a course of action. Then he follows the course of action he believes to be best.

That simple formula has saved him endless worry.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**

On a cold day, there is nothing quite as good as home-made vegetable soup. Miss Florence Linley of the University of Kentucky observed that long, slow cooking is important in making this kind of soup.

**VEGETABLE SOUP**

- 2 lbs beef, Shank or neck
- 2 c diced potatoes
- 2 c carrots
- 1 c turnips
- 1/2 c celery
- 1 medium sized onion
- 1/2 c green beans
- 1/2 c chopped kale or other greens
- 1 1/2 t salt
- 2 c tomatoes
- 1 c chopped cabbage

Wash meat, cover with cold water and simmer for 2 1/2 hours, or until meat is almost tender.

Add water to make about 6 cups. Add diced or chopped vegetables (except the last two) and simmer another hour. Then add tomatoes and cabbage and cook 10 minutes.

If desired, the meat may be cooked in the pressure saucpan for 30 minutes in 1 1/2 cups of water, then continue with above directions. Serve with croutons (toasted stale bread cut in cubes).

Lunch or supper menu: Vegetable soup with croutons, fruit salad and chocolate pudding with cream.

## SCHOOL TERMS CUT IN 21 COUNTIES

The State Board of Education has given its consent to 21 county school districts to operate less than nine-month elementary school terms, and to 10 of them to conduct high school terms of less than the minimum period.

The board action, announced through the Department of Education, was based upon budgets of school districts which showed it impossible to operate the nine-month terms without reduction in the salary of teachers. In all cases the maximum pay of \$150 on the \$100 valuation is being imposed.

- Director Robert R. Martin, of the state division of Local School District Finance, wrote the state board that he had studied the general budgets submitted and "it is my conclusion that the boards of education of affected districts do not have sufficient revenue to maintain nine-month terms."

**WILDLIFE OFFICIAL GIVEN TOP HONORS**

Edward Adams, educational director of the State Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, will receive an award of \$500 in Washington, D. C. Jan. 7 for outstanding work in conservation.

The award, to be made by the Nash Motor Company, is in recognition of Adams' work with Junior Conservation Clubs. collections of \$2,050,751.44 for the State Road Fund during the last fiscal year, an increase of \$51,410.40 over the preceding year, it was reported today by State Auditor T. Herbert Tinsley.

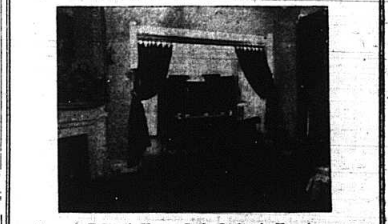

Two things have to be said in this regard. One is that this is hardly a case of physical force. There were many money-changers and any number of them were present. Jesus was no Samson or Goliath. If there had been any show of force, His resistance how much would a corded whip have done? No, the ship was a symbol, not a weapon. The other thing to be said is that the power of love is not always gentle. Love can be stern and it was love for God and reverence for his house and worship, that roused Jesus to drive out the men who were desecrating the holy place.

TWO 4-H Club members in Kentucky have been named by and a girl state winners in the 1953 Leadership program, for outstanding leadership in club and community projects. They are Howard R. Ragland, 21, of Hodgenville, and Lois Allen, 18, of Sobers. In his eleven years in 4-H activities, Howard has been a delegate in the 1948 National 4-H Congress, delegate to the 1951 National 4-H state 4-H president in 1952 and state achievement winner in 1952. He also has been county council president and president, secretary, treasurer, junior leader and leader of his own club. He is a junior leader of another club. Howard has given 42 talks on 4-H work at meetings and on radio broadcasts, and has written five news stories. Power of Personality

How would P. T. Forsyth was a known man.

Authority of God

Who said with truth that Jesus came down here at the Temple with the authority of God? He did not say, "You must move because Jesus says so." He said, "You must move because I say so." He simply said, "Take these things away. You must not make my Father's house a house of trade." He said that, and you know from sources outside the Bible just that that money-changers and the temple rackets was all. It was not honest business as all. When a Jew would come to the Temple wishing to offer a sacrifice, these people, who had a monopoly in that business, would sell him one of their animals, at an outrageous price. The priests in would accept no others, so between the cattle-sellers and the priests the sacrificer had no choice but to buy what they said for the price they demanded. Then the Temple authorities would not accept offerings in any but local money, and the money-changers (also tied up with the priests) would charge terrific rates for exchanging coin of the realm into local shekels. The sacrificer, who had a monopoly, running a bad business, with a bad conscience, spoke in the name of the authority of God. He was the authority of God. No wonder the rackets were scattered.

We Too

Bad men do not always run. They sometimes fight. Bad business has been set up in the liquor traffic have hard consciences. Still it is true now as it was long ago, that evil practices have been set up. It is true that some one person has the courage to confront them in the name of God and right. One man, John Woodman, an obscure working man, was the personal weight that worked into the consciences of the money-changers. He was a society, convincing men that the slavery business was wrong. One man, again and again, has been the spark that has set fire to ancient rubbish and lighted the night with the flame of God.
