County Agent Notes Burley Tobacco Varieties for 1954 Burley tobacco has taken another cut in acreage, 8 percent this time. The reason is the low nicotine content of the crops produced the past few years. With each cut, fertilization rates have increased, and the net result has been larger yields of less desirable tobacco. With a gradual increase in nicotine content, the amount of tobacco that goes into cigarettes decreases. The use of burley tobacco has not kept up with the increased use of cigarettes. Until the nicotine content of burley tobacco is greatly reduced, the use of burley tobacco in cigarettes will continue to decrease. Nicotine content can be reduced by cultural practices and by selection of proper varieties. Over a period of years, Ky. 41a and Ky 35 have consistently proved to be the lowest in nicotine. Using Ky 41a as the standard, the nicotine content is higher, but all of the other Kentucky varieties and burley 1 and 2 are from 10 to 40 percent higher than Ky 41a. Ky 16 ranges from 13 to 19 percent higher in nicotine than Ky 41a. While Ky 16 is a somewhat easier variety to handle in the field, Ky 41a will ordinarily produce as good a yield of better quality tobacco for cigarette purposes than Ky 16. White Ky 16 has been a popular variety; growers who can see into the future should use the lower nicotine varieties. While we have never attempted to influence the nicotine content of the variety he should produce, the nicotine problem has become so acute that growers should be urged the coming season to produce a variety of 41a or Ky 35 as they can find

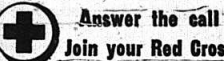
