Some Data From The State 4-H Club Report of 1953
65,965 boys and girls were enrolled last year in 4-H work. Of this number, 29,242 were boys and 36,722 were girls. This is an average of about 550 club members per county. The above mentioned members started 22,079 projects, and completed 69,929, or approximately 76%. There was less than 1% difference between the number of girls and the number of boys completing the projects. The enrollment last year showed an increase of 1155 over the year before. 4-H WEEK: 1357 Club members, leaders and agents attended 4-H Club Week Camps.

22 District Camps were held with a total attendance of 3,619 club members and 194 volunteer leaders. DISTRICT BEEF CATTLE SHOW: Eight District Beef Cattle Shows were held with 467 Club members, living in 64 counties, showing and selling 567 calves. The average selling price for the shows was \$26.51 per hundred. DISTRICT DAIRY SHOWS: Eight District Dairy Shows were held with 4-H Club members exhibiting 867 animals. JUDGING TEAMS: 24 meat animal judging teams 40 dairy teams, and 15 poultry teams participated in the contests at the state fair. Each champion team represented Kentucky in a National Judging contest. District Tobacco Shows: 19 District Tobacco Shows and Sales were held in Dec. Club members from 90 counties showed and sold 808,313 pounds of tobacco which brought an average of \$57.12 per hundred. National Camp: Kentucky sent her quota to the National Club Camp. National Club Congress: 28 Members attended the National Club Congress held in Chicago last December. This

was the maximum number that Kentucky was permitted to send. Tractor Maintenance: Two schools were held for the training of leaders in tractor maintenance and operation. One school was held in Lexington, and the other in Princeton. Both were held in January. 1241 members received training through county schools. A driving contest was held at the State Fair. Each county in which there was a training school was eligible to send one delegate to the state contest. 35 counties sent delegates to this contest. State Fair: Livestock: 204 dairy animals were exhibited at the state fair. They were of very high quality since they came through the district shows, and only the best animals were taken to the state fair. 69 hogs were shown, the largest number shown for some time, and 15 fat steers were exhibited. Home Economics: 723 canning exhibits from 28 counties were on display. Baked foods were sent in from 26 counties, frozen foods had 381 exhibits. The largest exhibit was clothing, with 845 entries. This was beautifully arranged and attracted a great deal of attention.

Negro 4-H Club Work: According to the 1950 census, less than 3.5% of the rural farm boys and girls of Club age are Negro. This gives a rather limited opportunity for working with them. 6 women and three Negro agents work in 16 counties, which had an enrollment of 2449 members. This makes an average of approximately 272 members per Lincoln Ridge and 4-H Week agent. Two state events for Negroes were held: a camp at State College in Frankfort. Leaders: In order to enlarge and improve club work, it is necessary to have the help and assistance of local 4-H leaders. Last year, 4,078 men and 5,594 women served as local leaders. In addition, there were 378 junior leaders, making a grand total of 10,050. Utopia Club Work: 31 Counties had one or more Utopia clubs last year. These club members take a very active interest in their own farm and home activities, and also give assistance wherever they can for the good of their communities. International Farm Youth Exchange: Last year, 4 girls were delegates to foreign countries, with 5 boys as delegates from

foreign countries to America. The purpose of this program is to create good will between the young people of the United States and those of other countries. Home Furnishings Training School: Home Furnishings School will be held, March 24, 1954, 9:30 A. M. to 2:30 P. M. in the Rockcastle County School Administration Building. Two Rockcastle Schools Win Awards In Contest

New Hope wins first prize and Anglin Falls gets second place.

The Berea Business and Professional Women's Club has announced two prizes in its rural school improvement project. The first prize of \$100.00 goes to the New Hope school in order to have their building wired for electricity and to get their wall fixed. Mrs. Sallie Ann Overbay is the present teacher of the New Hope School.

The second prize of \$50.00 goes to the Anglin Falls school to be used in getting the school ground leveled and, if any money is left over, to buy playground equipment. Mrs. Hett Mullins teaches at this school.

Granting of the two money prizes brought to a close the yearly-competition contest sponsored by the Berea Business and Professional Women's Club which was open to twenty-five of the one and two-room rural schools in the Berea area. Prizes were awarded on the basis of neat and well as suggested plans for using the money for betterment of their school situation. Ten schools in northern Rockcastle and southern Madison Counties entered the contest. Letters were sent from children in all grades as well as by the teachers of the schools. These letters were so appealing and the needs listed were so many that it was a very difficult contest to judge. So many worthwhile projects were suggested and the needs seem so great that club members are planning to provide additional supplies, reference books, maps and hot plates which will be delivered to several of the schools next fall.

The Berea B. & P. W. Club sponsors some worthy projects each year in addition to its regular club and community work and its long-term objective of bettering the status of business and professional women. There are fifty-eight members. Four-Lane Highway

State Highway Commission planning to build a Four-Lane highway between Richmond and Clay's Ferry, a hitch might develop in getting all the rights of way.

The State Highway Commission is planning to build a Four-Lane highway between Richmond and Clay's Ferry, a hitch might develop in getting all the rights of way. The cost will be approximately \$1,400,000.

Highway Engineer Dwight Bray gave these details on the proposed new link in U. S. Highway 25 which, he said, "will be a thoroughly modern four-lane highway with a center island or dividing strip."

The road will extend about 8.6 miles from Richmond's north city limits to the top of the hill just south of the Kentucky River at Clays Ferry. The department is ready to proceed, having the necessary funds available, as soon as all rights of way have been obtained. If there should be no lengthy delays in accomplishing this, it should be possible to start work in the late spring or summer.
