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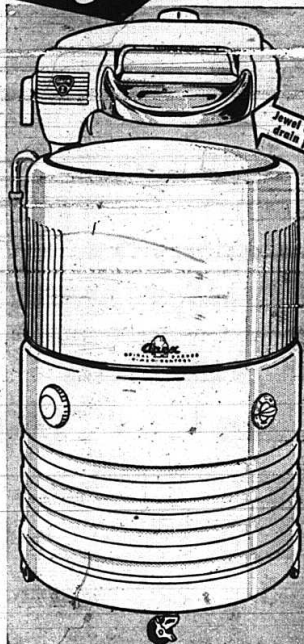

County Agent Notes

Control Wildfire and Angular Leafspot in the Tobacco Plant-Bed.

Plowing under a legume in late summer, treating for weeds in the fall, ditching the bed to keep surface water from flowing over it, plus the use of bluestone-lime will effectively control wildfire and angular leafspot in the plant bed. In the spring as soon as the to-

bacco plants can be seen they should be treated with bluestone-lime, and again 7 to 8 days later. If weeding is necessary, bluestone-lime should be applied immediately after on the same day, that seeding is done.

In using bluestone-lime, treat the bed and at least 3 feet beyond the sides and end of the bed. Most of the failures with bluestone-lime are due to its being used too late. Unless the first application is made before the plants are the size of

a dime, the bluestone-lime application are worthless. To prepare Bluestone-Lime Mixture: (1) Fill a clean 50 gallon barrel or oil drum 3/4 full of water strained through a cloth. (2) In one container thoroughly mix 4 pounds of fresh commercial hydrated lime in 3 or 4 gallons of strained water. (3) In another container dissolve 3 pounds of powdered bluestone in about 4 gallons of water. (4) Pour the lime paste into the barrel of water and stir vigorously. While stirring, add the bluestone solution slowly. (5) Add enough water to make 50 gallons. Add 1/2 pound of 50-percent wettable DDT to control cutworms and flea-beetles. Apply without removing the cotton cover, with an ordinary sprinkling can. Stir each time the sprinkling can is filled. Use 1 quart per square yard. Fifty gallons will treat 140 running feet of bed 9 feet wide, or 100 running feet of bed 12 feet wide, and provide enough material for the plowed area on each side and ends of bed for a distance of 2 to 3 feet.

THE GARDEN

The complaint of gardeners, who say that their vegetables are cheaper bought than grown, might come from their trying to operate on soil not rightly fertilized. Whether or not the investment in labor and cash pays off depends largely on the garden's fertility. When there was plenty of manure, one needed merely to prescribe 10 to 15 tons per acre with 500 to 800 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate added to raise tip-top vegetables. But the use of tractors has made manure so scarce that many gardens go unenriched, even in good seasons. Manure serves the double purpose of providing plant food and of conditioning the soil to make it hold moisture, and to make it easily workable. Commercial fertilizer serves only to furnish plant food. If used alone for only a few seasons, it will cause the soil to tend to run together, ultimately becoming unproductive no matter how well fed with fertilizer, and almost no matter how favorable the season. A porous matter that stable manure used to supply must be prescribed. A good substitute is compost crop or even last year's weeds, that are commonly burned, lawn clippings, tree leaves, or sawdust. Every year, at least part of the garden could be covered with wheat or barley, or even rye, plus some wintergrowing legume, all of which, plowed under,

would make a good substitute for manure. If dressings of superphosphate and muriate of potash were added, depending on what shortages of these plant foods a soil analysis indicated, that garden could become truly fertile. Tree leaves or sawdust can be made to do double duty; first as a mulch for saving winter-stored rainfall and, at the season's end, to be plowed under to become humus. The rotting down of its fibrous matter can be hastened by plowing under with it a chemical nitrogen fertilizer. A good general fertilizing scheme will be the use of 4-12-2 down tree leaves or lawn clippings, and 400 pounds of Calcium cyanamide or 150 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre would be the equivalent of 15 tons of manure. Superphosphate and potash could be added to make the garden truly

fertile. Phosphorus is the plant food that makes fruit and pod vegetables bear abundantly. Potash serves the root crops especially, but helps keep vegetables from growing to tops, as does phosphorus. Vegetables which are most benefited by mulching are tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, pole beans, pole limas and white potatoes. Mulch should be laid when the plants are set, or when beans are 4 inches high. White potatoes should be mulched at planting, or when they are first up. A good general fertilizing scheme will be the use of 4-12-2 down tree leaves or lawn clippings, and 400 pounds of Calcium cyanamide or 150 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre would be the equivalent of 15 tons of manure. truck used as above. If nitrated "mulch matter" was plowed under, 800 pounds per acre of 0-12-12 or 0-14-14 should be used. Broadcast fertilizing is always recommended, because it encourages the wide spreading of the vegetable roots, especially desirable during d r y times. Row fertilizing inhibits root growth. K-U Unit in Operation

The huge \$9,700,000 addition which more than doubles the capacity of Kentucky Utilities Company's Green River Power Station, now at Central City, was in the final stages of completion this week. Judge Robert C. Coleman, chairman of the Kentucky Public Service Commission, formally put the new generating unit in operation.

Capable of generating 80,000 kilowatts of electricity, Green River's third coal-fired steam turbo-generator began regular operation in what is now the largest plant in the KU system, serving more than 204,000 customers in 75 Kentucky counties. The plant's other two units have a capacity of 660,000 kilowatts each.

Addition of the new unit pushes the plant's maximum daily coal consumption to more than 1500 tons. All of this coal comes from Western Kentucky mines, many of them in Muhlenberg County where the plant is located.

Equal in height to a 12-story building, the boiler of the new unit has a capacity of 660,000 pounds of steam at 900 degrees Fahrenheit per hour.

The structure for the new addition was started in February, 1952. During the peak construction period, approximately 2,200 construction workers were employed.

The K. U. system now has a generating capability of 430,500 kilowatts. Its three largest plants are the Green River, Tyrone and Pineville stations.

Attention Korean Veterans Have Your Discharge Recorded

You should have your discharge recorded in the office of your county clerk, (free of charge) in order that you may obtain certified copies when needed in support of a claim for Veterans benefits.

Cut-Off Date For Training

The cut-off date for training under Public Law 450 for Korean Veterans discharged prior to August 20, 1952 will occur August 20, 1954. At that time a veteran must have actually been in training or else be in training on that date. Veterans discharged after August 20, 1952 must apply for training within two years from discharge date.

Three States Are Paying Bonus For Korean Veterans

Massachusetts: \$100.00 for ninety day state service; \$200.00 for more than six months service; \$300.00 for foreign service.

VERMONT: Paid only to enlisted men and women. \$100.00 a month (\$120.00 maximum) for service between June 27, 1950 and July 20, 1953 inclusive.

MICHIGAN: Survivors Only: \$500.00 when veteran died in service or of service-connected disease since June 27, 1950.

WAREHOUSE CONSTRUCTION STARTED

The large warehouse which Mr. Jim Winslow is building here in Mt. Vernon is under way. About 8,000 cement building blocks are being hauled on the ground, and heaps of sand and crushed stone are waiting to be mixed into cement for the foundation. The trench for the foundation has been dug and now the forms are being made ready.

The building is 100 feet wide and almost 200 feet long. It will have supporting posts for the roof and skylights will be installed to furnish light during the day. Mr. Winslow hopes to have the building under roof before many weeks.

102,000 People On State Relief Rolls

More than 102,000 persons in thirty Kentucky counties are now receiving relief aid, Ben S. Adams, Commissioner of Agriculture revealed today.

This assistance is being extended to Kentucky's needy families through the State Agriculture Department's Division of Commodities Distributing co-operating with welfare agencies in the various counties. The Division of Commodities is allocated certain quantities of commodity credit Corporation surpluses of cheeses, butter, dried milk, canned beef and gravy, dried beans and potatoes. This surplus is turned over to the various welfare agencies in the various counties to be distributed to the needy.

Levis disclosed that the Commodities Division has to date approved and shipped 25 carloads of the following commodities: cheddar cheese, creamery butter, processed beef, hot fat dry milk solids, canned beef and gravy, and shortened. These commodities are in order of four carloads of cranberry sauce, schools and institutions is expected to arrive by April 15th.

He added that the Commodities Division is distributing dried beans to institutions and welfare recipients at the rate of 100 lbs. per person per month. The C. C. C. is now allocating from the 1953 potato crop for distribution to the various welfare recipients. Rate of distribution in Kentucky is 3 lbs. per month for each school child, and 12 lbs. per month for each person in state institutions and welfare recipients. This is the first time C. C. C. potatoes have been distributed by the Commodities Division since June, 1951.

Miss Dailey was thrown out of the car when the accident happened. Sparks ambulance took Miss Dailey to the Berea College hospital for treatment.

He was moved by ambulance to the Gibson Hospital in Richmond and examined by Dr. Shelby Carr, the contract surgeon for the depot, and was then moved to the Berea College Hospital in Berea. Immediate steps were taken to make x-rays. The extent of the injury has not yet been determined.

No Place to Hide from H-Bomb

If a hydrogen bomb fell on Cincinnati or any other American city, there would be no place to hide and no time to run.

The awesome power of a full-scale hydrogen blast was demonstrated through films released Thursday. If it had hit the Public Landing instead of the getch Island, here's what would have happened:

An area six miles in diameter would have been annihilated. This circle of destruction would go downriver to a point opposite Ludlow, Ky., extend to Brighton, wreck the University of Cincinnati and extend to Myrtle Avenue in Walnut Hills. The bomb would have done
