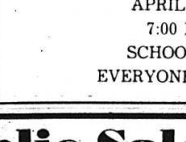

### RANGERS LOOKOUT

Since June last year it seems the weather man can not make up his mind to let it rain enough in this area to put some water back in the ground. During the month of February, Mrs. Jewell Sparks our weather observer recorded only 2.4 inches of rain. February generally produces between 4 and 8 inches of rain. When the month of March came in like a lamb we did not expect much rain but we all hoped the signs would fall. The signs held true for Mrs. Sparks recorded only 2.5 inches of rain during the month. Our total rainfall for the first three months this year has been 10.3 inches. The same period in 1953 produced 17.8 inches of rain.

This whole thing means we are behind in rainfall to the tune of 8 to 10 inches. Farmers and homes whose water supply dried up during the terribly dry fall in 1953 are still carry-

ing water from the creeks for their stock and from the neighbors for drinking water if he is fortunate enough to have a supply.

This lack of rain on the National Forest has meant more forest fires than usual. To date the eight fires we have had to control this spring has cost over \$1100.00 in taxpayer's dollars. Every fire has resulted from sedge grass, brush or tobacco bed burning getting away. In every case except two, the person responsible paid the suppression costs. One of these two cases resulted in a court trial, a conviction and fine by the jury. The other resulted in a jail sentence for the person responsible.

As this is being written our weather station recorded 30 miles per hour winds and burning conditions extreme at 9 o'clock in the morning. A stand-by crew is on the job at the McKee Depot, ready to roll as the first sign of smoke, all National Forest Wardens and crews have been notified of the need to be ready to go in the least possible time.

That means homes and could mean people. Fire fighting crews have to drop back behind ridges, large plowed fields, or very wide natural barriers, to stop fire burning under high wind conditions.

This is the type of material that is needed in this area. Our hardwood that will not make sawlogs has been going to waste. The National Forest will be able to make wood of this kind available for sale.

The Rockcastle District will be holding the regular public auctions of timber sales beginning April 12 at 9:00 A.M. These are held at the McKee Depot. The purpose of the public auction is to give everyone an equal chance to buy timber. These auction sales are held the second Monday of each month.

### County Agent Notes

**Strawberry Marketing Meeting**  
The Strawberry Marketing Meeting held at Mt. Vernon last Thursday was attended by 42 strawberry growers from Summers, from the State College of Agriculture outlined the marketing plan and explained what should be done between now and the opening of the berry market. The growers present placed their order for crates and rubber stamps. The name and address of the grower on the crates. These things should be done as soon as possible so as to be ready when the truck starts hauling berries from Rockcastle Co. to Somerset. The berries will be sold at Somerset. The assemble points for berries to be collected in the county will be at Mt. Vernon High School Building, Brodhead at 2:30, arriving at Quail 3:15, leaving Quail for Somerset at 3:30. All growers who have strawberries to market should be at the above stops at least 30 minutes before the truck leaves. All strawberry growers, including 4-H Club Members, who have not purchased their crates should do so at once. No arrangements were made for growers who were not present at the meeting. Therefore, it is up to each grower to find their crates wherever they can. If they would like to get them from the Strawberry Growers Association they should see Mr. Roy Brown at Quail immediately and put in their order. Mr. Brown is secretary of the Association. If they are not purchased they will cost more when they are ordered.

**T. B. Tests For Dairy Cattle**  
A letter from Dr. L. L. Breck, State Veterinarian, Frankfort, to the County Agent at Mt. Vernon stated that this is the year Rockcastle County dairymen could have their cows tested for tuberculosis free of charge if they would report to the County Agent's office their name, address and number of cows to be tested. This letter further stated that the work would be completed by July 1, 1954.

All dairymen who would like to have their cows tested for tuberculosis should call at the County Agent's office leaving their name, address and the number of cows to be tested as soon as possible. There are over 200 already signed up but we would like to make this 500 within the next few days. As soon as the notice has been received at the County Agent's office, of the exact date to the Veterinarian to be in the county, the dairymen who

are registered in the County Agent's office will be notified.
