Clifford Bales relocates service station and restaurant to New Highway west of city grand opening last week.

Clifford Bales had his grand opening of his new White Star service station and restaurant on the new highway west of Livingston last week, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Although partially hampered by rains on the first two days, the last day was a record breaker and all day long the station and restaurant were busy waiting on customers and visitors. The station was built by building contractor Mr. Crawford of Renfro Valley. The structure is of concrete blocks, painted white. It contains a dining room and lunch counter with modern equipped kitchen. Water is furnished from a spring a short distance away. The spring has been carefully enclosed with a concrete reservoir and water is pumped to the station by an electric jet pump. The rest rooms are large and immaculate. Just a short distance to the rear of the station is a man-made lake, fed by springs. Beyond the little lake is a wooded park. In time Mr. Bales expects to build a rustic bridge across the lake leading into the forest. To the east of the lake Mr. Bales hopes to build a modern motel some time. In a large available space gives ample room for parking cars.

RETURNS HOME

Mrs. Adelaide Jones of Mt. Vernon returned to her home April 25th after fifteen weeks stay at the Broadhead National Laboratory Hospital at Upton, Long Island, N. Y. Mrs. Jones reports that only a limited number of patients were accepted at Broadhead. These patients are a Children's Hospital, patients of various types of high blood pressure, patients with certain types of malignancies or typhoid conditions and patients with special types of high blood pressure. There are sixteen to sixty years of age. No physician at Broadhead has the responsibility of the medical care of these patients. The hospital provides time for the medical staff to engage in extensive laboratory research. This research revolves around efforts to determine the causes of the diseases and the most desirable treatment of these diseases.

County Agent Notes

Tuberculosis Kills
There is a great effort in Kentucky and throughout the United States to reduce the death rate caused by tuberculosis in people and animals. Each year there is a campaign put on to raise funds to fight tuberculosis and reduce the death rate in people. Once every three years Kentucky dairymen have a chance to reduce the death rate of dairy cattle by cooperating with the State and Federal Government in having their dairy animals tested free of charge. This year, 1954, the dairymen or owners in Rockcastle County have the opportunity to have their dairy cows tested to find out whether or not they have tuberculosis. Would you allow your children or anyone else to drink milk from your cows if they had tuberculosis?

Maple Grove School Makes Improvements

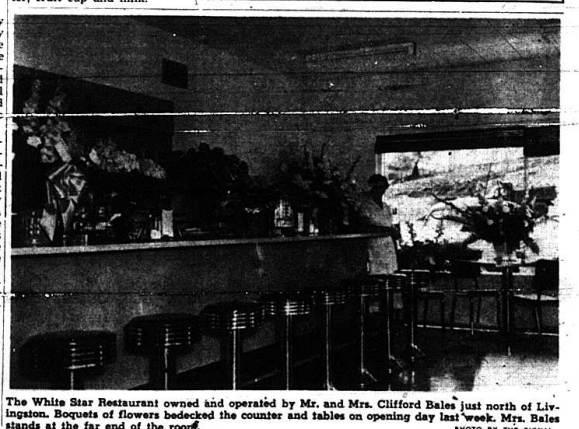


Pupils of the Maple Grove School who cooperated with Miss Elisabeth Haswell, who helped sponsor some important improvements through Save The Children Federation.

RAMBLINGS

President Eisenhower came to Kentucky last week and honored this state by his presence. He was the first President of the 21st century ever seen. Because of a Press pass I was able to get close to the President and had a good view of the stage. I waited for two hours for this chance. Fortunately intermittent clouds gave some shade to those who had to wait, otherwise the heat would have been almost too much. Long before the arrival of the President the grounds were crowded with people waiting to get a glance of the President nearly four o'clock before the party arrived at the campus of Transylvania. The steps of Morrison Hall served as the stage. Still and movie cameras were seen on every hand, and when the President finally arrived the forbidden ground in front of the stage was almost choked with photographers. Police, state patrol and secret service men, marines and army and navy men covered the grounds. I did not see any unusual fanfare when the President finally arrived. He came on to the stage from the building and was led by Dr. Ross. There was cheering and applause, and then Mr. Charles A. Thomas gave a lecture. Then followed an introduction of Sherman Cooper who in turn introduced the President. As a rule the minor personalities get long introductions, while the President gets four words. "The President of the United States," Eisenhower gave me the impression of sincerity, and genuineness. There was a warmth about his personality that was catching. He spoke with only a few notes, remarked how old Transylvania College is and how its founders believed in the spiritual values. He commented several times on Mr. Thomas' importance of those qualities that make for character. He touched briefly on Lincoln, stating how important that country is to the free world.

To those who sought any dramatic show were disillusioned. To those who looked for something substantial, hopeful and genuine, they found it.

I noticed a rather interesting article in this morning's paper that told the story about Mulheim County where the citizens have an annual county-wide clean-up on both sides. In one big sweep the citizens of that county pick up all the rubbish. They call it "Operation Litterbug." Twenty-two trucks were used all day long and tons of rubbish were collected even on a rainy day. Six hundred persons participated. I imagine a great many counties could follow suit.

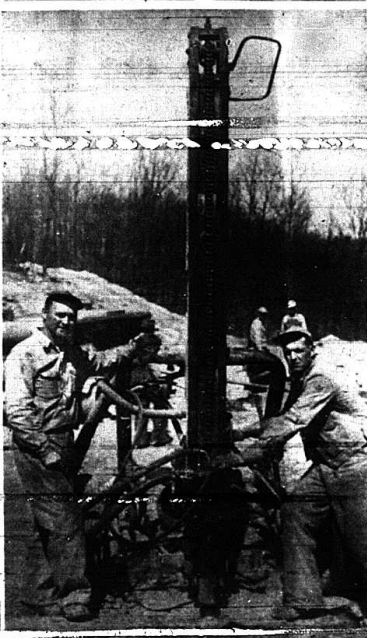

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

Scripture: 1 Kings 17:25-32; 18:1-20; 22:1-28; Psalm 113:2.

Leader Who Failed

Lesson for May 2, 1954

IT IS said that at the time of the French Revolution there was one day a tremendous uproar in the streets of Paris, and an elderly man, who had been a leader with the news, inquired what it was. "It sounds like a revolt," said he. "Not a revolt, Sir," was the reply. "A revolution." A revolt is a revolution that doesn't succeed. A revolution is a revolt that succeeds. Yet the success of a revolution is not to be measured by the number of what it accomplishes there and then. It is to be measured by any other sort. What Dr. Foreman happens to do is to tell the story of the prophet Ahijah who had approved and authorized?

Success in the First Chapter

If Jeroboam had had any ghost writers and if they had written up the story of his political coup, they could have made sound like a tremendous success. Jeroboam himself was young, able, and firm in his convictions. He was a good organizer and he was a popular man. As a labor leader under King Solomon he knew how to deal with people and as a political exile in Egypt for many years, he had not learned about the ins and outs of international politics was probably not worth learning. He had succeeded in drawing out of the original united Kingdom of Solomon ten out of the twelve tribes.

Failure in the Last Chapter

When Jeroboam was a young man, his father, King Solomon, had a prophet Ahijah who had once been his friend. Ahijah could surely tell him whether the child would be a success or a failure. Ahijah's door met with no welcome. Quite the contrary, the old prophet cursed King Jeroboam and all his house. The revolution which had begun with the blessing of God upon it, ended by inciting the wrath of God. The king who had begun with such overwhelming success ended as a failure. The revolution of the twelve tribes had proved to be a failure. It was not that there was anything sinful in the idea itself, but that the revolution had been in Jeroboam's hands not a means of helping the people but of doing their harm.

Who Made Israel to Sin

More than one writer in later times used the same standard formula for this Jeroboam. He is called "Jeroboam the son of Nebat who made Israel to sin." That is a terrible tag to hang on a man, that he is the cause of a nation's sin. But it was true of this man. What in particular had Jeroboam done as King of Israel, to make Israel sin? His great sin was two, but they were part of the same policy. It will be remembered that this was shortly after the time of Solomon and the great temple which Solomon built was still the center of the religious life of all the twelve tribes. When Jeroboam engineered his revolution, he felt it to be a dangerous thing for the temple to be in the hands of the Kingdom of Judah up there in Jerusalem. So he organized two other religious centers, at convenient intervals in the north and south. Dan in the north, and in these newly appointed "shrine cities" he set up gold-plated calves and other animals as the gods of his people. In two ways among others, this was ruinous to right religion, and led to the decay of the nation.

God Is Not Mocked

First this involved the sin of making religion a department of the government. As King, Jeroboam attempted to dictate and only too successfully where and how his people should worship. The priests in his shrine cities were political appointees. Religion was subsidized by the state. But worse than that Jeroboam lied the people down to a crude and cheap kind of religion. For the great invisible God of heaven and earth sees in his shrine cities where Jeroboam substituted gold-plated statues of bulls and he-goats, debased religion. He debased his people. Cheap and bad religion will ruin a nation faster than fire or famine.
