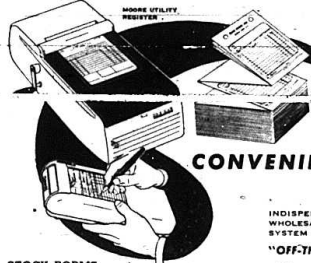

Surplus Food Given To Needy Families in County

Approximately 1,000 persons are being helped in Rockcastle County by donation of Government stored commodities.

Some of the government's stored food, listed as surplus by the War Relocation Authority, was found its way to Rockcastle County last week. Director of the department of Agriculture, Thomas A. Lewis of Frankfort, who is responsible for the distribution of this surplus food for the state of Kentucky, shipped a considerable stock to Mt. Vernon. The shipment included 1000 pounds of creamery butter, 17 cases of powdered milk, 900 pounds of cheddar cheese, and 900 pounds of shortening. Most of this material was temporarily stored in the Mt. Vernon Locker plant. Walter Souder, county judge, with the help of Mr. J. W. Gentry, the department of Economic Security of this county, selected some of the county's most needy families. The various magistrates also assisted in making the survey. Approximately 200 cards were sent out to these families to notify them that surplus food is available and for them on Thursday the first distribution of food was distributed by the committee.

Poultry Enterprise a Very Successful Venture

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Durham are carrying on a big poultry enterprise in Jackson County. Mr. Durham started the poultry business twelve years ago at Horse Lick where he still has 75 acres of land. Since he came to Rockcastle County from Horse Lick in Jackson County, he has expanded his business so that today it is the largest poultry business in the county. Mr. Durham has now underway after twelve years of work with chickens they decided to near the highway 150 on his home here and make this thirty-acre farm. His son, Ted

home. Just about three miles plans to operate this with the west of Mt. Vernon, near Mareburg, they built themselves a large poultry barn. It measures 40 x 100 feet and stands new structure has already been out in gleaming white as the morning sun strikes its sides. Inside that house are 1,000 laying hens, they are White Rocks and every week they fill 10 to 12 cases of precious eggs. These eggs are all sold to a London Hatchery.

Within a few days every one of the laying hens will be sold in a processing house and the least 8,000 baby chicks will be hatched. Imagine the peeping and chirping from that many chicks.

Part of the 1,000 laying White Rocks on the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Durham. Approximately ten to twelve cases of eggs are gathered weekly and sold directly to a London Hatchery. Within a few days all these laying hens will be sold and replaced with 8,000 baby chicks.

Crippled Childrens Final Report

The 1954 Crippled Children Campaign has come to a close. Statewide reports show that funds were collected to assist the children of the medical care they need. The research and rehabilitation programs will be able to proceed in their relentless tasks.

Rockcastle county collected \$247.30 in response to the Easter Seal Letters. \$115.81 was received from the school campaign.

Last year alone our county had fifteen crippled children hospitalized for 560 days. The preceding year a sever of our children received hospital care for a total of 586 days and 49 examinations were given to children from our county at the Cardinal Hill Clinic. Prior to that year 203 Rockcastle County children had been examined by the Commission since it began in 1924.

Next year, let us carry more of our fair share of the expense for the care our children receive. As a final note I want to sincerely thank all of you that worked and gave, every donation no matter what size helps make the counties donation. Joyce R. Henderson, Chm.

Foresters From Tenn. & Ky. Meet at Berea in May

Foresters from Kentucky and Tennessee belonging to the Society of American Foresters will convene at the Boone Tavern Hotel in Berea on May 21 for their annual summer meeting. Each summer foresters of the Kentucky, Tennessee Section meets at the scene of some outstanding forest conservation work. According to Society spokesman, James S. Newman, Berea was elected this year because of the excellent forest management practiced by college forester Sherman Whipple.

A tour of the 5,600 acre college forest will be the feature of the meeting. The visiting foresters will inspect some of the property cut areas where the mature timber has been harvested. One area has had seven different forest products harvested from the same acre including sawlogs, stove bolts, pulpwood, mine props, and tie poles. Whipple's motto is that each tree harvested will be sold and channeled into the market for which it is best suited. Even though all of these products have been cut from the forest, there is plenty of fine growing timber left. In fact one of the aims of cutting timber scientifically is to make the forest produce more and better timber crops in the future.

Other points of interest to be seen by the foresters are young pine plantations set on old fields, the 140 acre watershed which furnished all the water for the city of Berea, and a treating plant to give fence post longer life. Pine, red oak,

and even water birch makes good fence posts when treated with a preservative to protect them from decay.

Fire Losses In County

Fire losses in the state are only by states and the federal government, but by private industry too. In fact more foresters are employed by pulp mills, paper companies, railroads, and lumber companies than by other private industry than by all the various local, state, and federal governments. The Society is to foresters what the Medical Association is to doctors.

Telephone Hearing Held At Frankfort April 29th

A group of citizens from this county went to Frankfort last week, Thursday, to attend a hearing regarding the present telephone system in Rockcastle County with a request that the Public Service Commission should be authorized to take over the telephone system. The testimony that lasted all day will be taken under consideration by the Public Service Commission. Mr. Dees also made a request that a permit be granted him to convert the present system into a dial system within a period of a year or so and that he will extend his lines from the P. S. C. as to what decision they will give to the requests.

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KEEP IMPROVED PASTURE PRODUCTIVE

Under the Agricultural Conservation Program the term 'Improved Pasture has acquired a fairly definite meaning. The old sod must be torn-up with a field cultivator, hog barrow, spring tooth harrow or plow. A method that leaves the old sod as a mulch on the surface is most acceptable.

After the seedbed has been well prepared the soil must be adequately limed and fertilized. Though the amounts may vary the need is practically universal. The initial liming is meant to give the seedling a good chance. It may not be fairly heavy if the soil is very acid or has not had an application recently. Two tons per acre or more may be needed depending on the soil and the type of limestone. Fertilizer needs are variable. 300 to 500 lbs. per acre is a common application depending on fertilizer analysis, type of soil and type of forage being needed.

Recommended forage mixtures will vary with latitude and soil preference. One high producing mixture generally used is ladino clover and orchard grass. Alfalfa and bromes grass of selected and resistant strains is a popular pair. To find out which is best suited to specific conditions a county agent of county ASC Committee should be consulted.

After establishment a good pasture must not be forgotten. Regrowth of how good an initial stand may have been achieved, it will be of little worth unless it is well managed after establishment. A careful grazing schedule must be set up. This is particularly true with ladino clover—orchard grass. These high producers are also big feeders. 500 lbs. per acre of 0-20-20 every spring may be enough in some areas, others will need application in the fall. A ton or more of limestone every 3 to 4 years is usually enough to control acidity and keep the calcium level up. Dolomitic limestone will provide magnesium.

Improved pastures with good seedings will last longer, more dollars per acre will be realized and the farmer and his cows will be better satisfied.

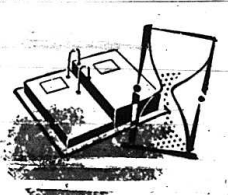


THE BIBLE SPEAKS

Challenge to Evil

Lesson for May 9, 1954



IF YOU have never read the story of Elijah and the prophets of Baal you have missed one of the most dramatic stories in the world's literature. And yet how often you take it, you may be left with the feeling that this tale does not belong in the twentieth century. Nobody lives or died any more, and miracles like fire from heaven that will in one instant burn up animals, wood, and stones and deep trenches full of water—a wonder that even the wisest of men do not believe in any more. But this is more than a wonder tale out of the far past. Like all of Dr. Foreman's sermons, it has something to say to us today as to men of all times and places.

When Evil Are Idols

Every age has its Baals. Idols are not always made of stone or wood. They may not be in any physical shape at all, and still may be an idea—a spirit of the times. It can be a desire or a dream. All idols are bad because they are always in place of the true God. But the worst idols are evil which are so popular that they are popular for a goal. The Baal against whom Elijah fought his brave battle single-handed was the god of the royal family, and it was so nearly the god of all the nation that Elijah had the impression that he might have been able to see the boldness of this great evil.

It was not a theological heresy, Baal was not simply a wrong name for God. Baalism involved crimes in Baal's name no true worshipper of Baal could take part or kind of heart. Baalism was worse than a national religion; it was a national passion. The very name of Baal meant national death. Elijah knew it, but nobody else knew it, and so when he attacked Baal the authorities raged, but it was as a bad character. So, far from thanking him for challenging a great evil, he was run out of the country like an ordinary criminal.


Why Reformers Are Hated

You can divide all citizens into two kinds: One whether realizing it or not takes for his motto "Whatever is right." The other kind sees that some things that are right must be. And a few of this other kind begin to agitate and talk about changes that must be made. They are sometimes called reformers, but they are usually called worse names. One hundred years ago and more there was a book written by a man named Helier, which pointed out in detail the bad economic effects of slavery. He was called a crank and his book was not answered. It was a legal offense to own a copy of it. Helier himself was attacked in newspapers and in pulpits. For he had dared to challenge the Baal of slavery. In those days in the north as well as in the south, to be an abolitionist was to be treated as a crackpot or a liar, or worse. Nowaday's two of our Baals are war and the liquor traffic. What happens to persons who say a word against that great temple of the Pentagon? What happens to people who come out with the truth about the effects of liquor and propose even to limit liquor advertising? They too are called crackpots, liars and worse.

The Tide of Tomorrow

Elijah was mightily discouraged at one time. It looked as if the whole country was against him. God had to explain to him that there were seven thousand good people still in his country, even if he was the only man who is always that way. For one reason was that God is for him and against Goliath. Those who are against God, no matter how popular they may be, are pushing against the tides of the universe; the Eliahs, ridiculed and outlasted though they be, who challenge the destroyers of man, in the name of God, know that God is last always.
