#### County Agent Notes

#### Annual Spring Field Day at Lexington

The annual Spring Field Day is to be held at the Experiment Station on Friday, May 21, beginning at 9:00 A. M. C. S. T. Farmers from all sections of the state are invited to attend and see experiment work being done on wheat, corn, sorghum, legumes, pasture crops, grasses, feeding, pasture utilization and livestock breeding. Two groups will be held simultaneously during the forenoon, one on North Farm where the crops work will be shown and the other on the South Farm where the livestock work will be on exhibit. The two groups will exchange places for the afternoon tours. Groups from counties with names beginning from "A" through "H" should assemble at the Stock Judging Pavilion which is reached through the North Farm entrance on the afternoon. Groups from "I" through "L" should assemble at the Dairy Center which is reached through the South Farm entrance on the afternoon.

Groups which expect the crop work in the morning will be shown the livestock work in the afternoon and vice versa. Lunch will be available at each assembly point. It is hoped that we will have a good delegation from the county to attend.

Foresters to tour Berea College  
Foresters from Kentucky and Tennessee belonging to the Society of American Foresters will spend the week at the Boone Tavern Hotel in Berea on May 21 for their annual summer meeting. The meeting will be held at the hotel on the afternoon of May 21. A tour of the 8,600 acre college forest will be the feature of the meeting and the visiting foresters will inspect some of the properly cut areas where forest products have been harvested.

One area has had seven different forest products harvested from the same area including sawlogs, stove bolts, pulpwood, mine props, and tie poles. Whipple's motto is that each tree harvested will be sold and channeled into the market for which it is best suited. Even though all of those products have been cut from the forest, there is plenty of fine growing timber left. In fact one of the aims of cutting timber scientifically is to produce more and better timber crops in the future.

Other points of interest to be seen by the foresters are young pine plantations set on old fields with long life pines, red oak, and even water birch makes good fence posts when treated with a preservative to protect them from decay.

The college forest lands are an outstanding example of what all land owners could gain by applying good forestry on their timber lands. The spokesman added that a large number of "tree farmers" are needed in the mountain states, and that the management of the college forest land at Berea should serve as an excellent guide for this area.

The Society of American Foresters is a national organization of professional foresters with over 9,000 members. Its members are employed in not only by states and the federal government, but by private industry too. In fact more foresters are employed by pulp and paper companies, railroads, and lumber companies and other private industry than by all the various local, state and federal governments. The Society is to foresters what the Medical Association is to doctors.

The Richmond Street has a thirteen foot wooden poles and Main Street has six aluminum poles. These aluminum poles are 22 feet high and have a diameter of 7 inches and taper to approximately 4 inches at the top. The poles on Main Street are set on solid concrete foundations which had to be built up level with the sidewalk. Four heavy bolts anchor the poles. The city has purchased the aluminum poles at a cost of about \$100 each. They will remain the property of the utility except for the poles that have a light measurement of 6,000 lumens. These are located on Main Street. The balance of the lights located on Richmond Street have 4,000 lumen capacity.

At about 2:30 P. M. the Commanding Officer will welcome the visitors, after which they will enter depot buses for a guided tour of the installation. Each bus will be provided with a guide who is well informed on mission and history of the depot. He will give a lecture on the tour and be able to answer most questions that might arise. 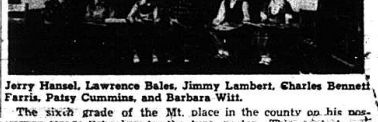
Harrison credited Spence with the improvement of hay, corn and tobacco crops in this region and expressed the group's gratitude for Spence's continued efforts to improve agriculture.

Back in the Middle Ages, privileged and titled lords carved up the countryside into vast estates on which they lived amidst regal splendor in huge castles generally known as manor houses.

Today, the University of Kentucky has its manor house, right on the campus. But before the casual visitor goes looking for a medieval castle tucked away in a far corner of the grounds, it should be explained that "Kentucky Manor" is merely the name given to one of the two houses occupied by members of the U. K. football team.

The players themselves and virtually everyone who in-

spects the pair of two-story, brick structures considers them the nearest thing to castles on the campus and with out a parallel anywhere in the nation when it comes to housing for athletes. Part of a subject of six fraternity houses built by the University, the two football houses are located on the University farm adjacent to Cooperstown, veterans' housing project, and the team's new Ross Street practice field.

Known as "Kentucky Manor" and "Kitten Lodge," the homes are appropriately named since the varsity players are housed in the manor and the freshmen (nicknamed Kittens) occupy the other. Each house is completely furnished in the most modern fashion, including leather-covered overstuffed furniture, television sets, study tables and chairs, game tables, dining facilities, comfortable beds, steam heat and plenty of hot water.

Each house has a completely equipped kitchen in both houses desired for athletes in training. An intercommunications system connects the two floors.

An all-student government exists in each house and each also has its own house-mother on the premises, as do fraternities and sororities. Mayfield's Herb Hunt is president of Kitten Manor and Ken Lutz, Louisville sophomore, currently acts in the same capacity for Kitten Lodge. Air-America guard Ray Correll of Somerset also serves as advisor to the occupants of the freshman house.

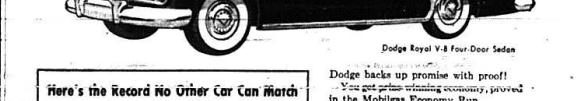

KENTUCKY TURNPIKE RT. ANNOUNCED

The location of the Kentucky Turnpike, from Louisville to Elizabethtown, has been determined by final field surveys and construction of right-of-way, which has already been started, will be carried to an early completion. The announcement was made by Commissioner William F. Cur-

lin. Surveys show the turnpike will be 40 miles from its northern end, in South Louisville, to Elizabethtown.

A traffic interchange will lead off the Henry Watterson road west of the intersection of the expressway and Preston Street. The turnpike will parallel Preston Street Road to a point near Grade Lane. From Grade Lane to the knob section north of Shepherdsville, it will be approximately half-way between Ky. 61 and the Louisville area. The road road tracks.

The first toll collection plaza will be located about three-quarters of a mile east of Shepherdsville where the turnpike intersects Ky. 44. A gas and restaurant facilities is provided just north of the toll plaza. South of Shepherdsville, the turnpike will follow a route east 78 and roughly parallel to U. S. 31 and N. 100 as far as U. S. 62 near Elizabethtown. It will join U. S. 31-W just south of Elizabethtown, near the junction of Ky. 61. A second service area is planned near Lebanon Junction and Rolling Fork River. The second toll plaza will be located

ed near the south end of the turnpike. There will be major traffic interchanges at each end of the project and at the intersections with U. S. 62 and Ky. 44. Traffic at other points will be carried over or under the turnpike by grade separation structures. Curlin said that work on obtaining rights-of-way is progressing throughout the length of the route and that the drafting of construction plans is under way. The turnpike is expected to be ready for traffic about 18 months after construction starts.

Lundy Backed In Race For Congress

William R. Lundy, president of the Pineville Chamber of Commerce and one-time candidate for lieutenant governor on the Republican ticket, may be called upon to seek the Republican nomination for Representative in the U. S. Congress of the Eighth District in the coming August primary. Political leaders in various parts of the District have been conferring on the possibility of getting Lundy into the race but so far he has not declared his intentions.

Lundy has been very active in civic and community affairs and is Past President of the Pineville Rotary Club. For a number of years he has been actively engaged in a campaign of bringing new industries to Southeastern Kentucky which would give employment for the people. He organized the Cumberland Valley Hospital Association, which pioneered Hospital Surgical and Medical Care in Kentucky, he is still President of the company. Lundy declined comment on his intentions when told of the movement under way by some of the most powerful leaders, but he might have a statement later.

He declared their intentions of making the race in August but succeed James S. Golden, who announced that he would not seek the post again.

Handy Jim's FIX-UP TIPS for farm and home

Scottie for House Number A TIME TRIED method of displaying a house number in an attractive manner is illustrated. Either the Scottie-dog cutout or some other animal will serve the purpose. Set in a parkway, on the lawn, at the curb, the jaunty puppy, with its sparkling eyes, will prove to be an attractive addition. Scottie is 15 inches long and his height is 11 1/2 inches. Cut him from two pieces of Masonite 3/16"



Tempered Preswood, holding the panels, screen sides together, with C-clamps and following a pattern with a coping, keyhole or band saw. Slightly round the edges with a file or sandblock. Paint Reflector-type bolts used for car licenses serve as eyes and reflect the light from passing cars. The numbers are sawed from the Tempered Preswood and glued to each side of the cutout. Two wooden stakes, shaped from 1 by 2-inch lumber, are laid between the two cutouts and fastened with screws applied through holes drilled in the hardwood. Paint Scottie in appropriate colors, first using a primer. Push the stakes into the ground and your new house number will be in service. All the materials needed are available at 15 major yards.
