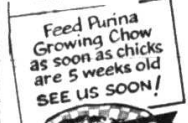

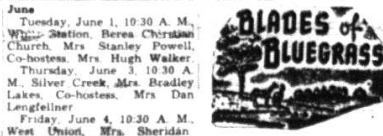
Brighten the Laundry

This is commencement time throughout the land. From the tiniest hamlet to great metropolitan centers boys and girls are closing the door on their high school or college days, getting ready to 'commence' a different kind of life. In 1882 when the first commencement exercises were held on the present campus of the University of Kentucky, only six students were in the graduating class. By 1954, a well over 800 degrees will be awarded by the University on June 4, and by then Dr. Herman Lee Donovan may have signed the 14,000th diploma since he became president 13 years ago. This is more diplomas than all of the other presidents of the University signed since the school was established in 1880.

Just 70 years ago, in 1884, the Normal Department granted a diploma to Leonora Hoening of Lexington, thereby causing her to be termed by the

local press "The First School... Maiden Graduated by Kentucky State College."

Through the years the University has held commencement exercises in several places, some quite odd. At one time they were conducted in a tent on the campus. Later the Lexington Opera House was the site of graduation proceedings. They were held in Memorial Hall and Alumni Gym. Then for a number of years when no campus building could take care of the crowds, they were staged in the football stadium. The uncertainty of the weather during this period caused President Donovan to remark that "On an average of once every three years we launched a class instead of graduating one."

Since 1950, when Memorial Coliseum, which can accommodate 15,000, was completed, commencement has been held there. Two Kentucky sons who have gained international fame will be given honorary degrees at the June commencement. They are Stephen T. Rapier, a native of Knob Creek in Larue Co., and Joseph M. Hatfield, who grew up in Union County. Mr. Rapier is the head of an electrical manufacturing export firm in New York City and Mr. Hatfield, also of New York, is senior partner in one of the largest law firms in the world.

For two who have gone far in their respective fields, they must be modest gentlemen indeed. A picture of each was needed for handling news about the event, but neither was able to produce one immediately. "I am sorry to say that I do not have a photograph of

myself," Mr. Hatfield wrote, and Mr. Rapier said, "Living up to a good reputation, they say, is about as difficult as living down a bad one. I shall do my best." And, later, "Photograph requested is enclosed. Mrs. Rapier thinks it is horrible. Frankly, I think it is pretty good for a man who has been traveling 102 countries since 1910, and is now reaching for three more and ten."

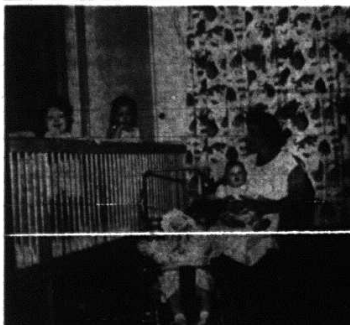

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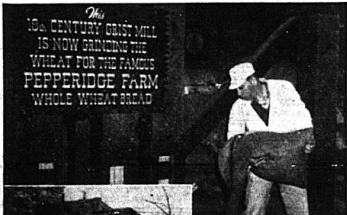
