JUNE Health authorities unanimously acclaim the common fly to be a first class carrier of diseases; dairy cattle management experts estimate that the fly causes 10 to 15 per cent decrease in milk production during summer months. The creameryman cannot make legal butter from cream containing flies or any trace of their body parts.

With these things in mind the cream producer must carefully plan and adopt a system of practices that will control this pest and public enemy Number One to the fullest extent. The danger of flies can be effectively by regular and periodic spraying (use approved sprays) of cows, barn, and milk house. eradicate breeding places of

flies by frequently removing manure, garbage, etc. Control measures cannot be over-emphasized. Use these measures to avoid possible fly-borne disease of the family, low milk production, and economic loss through rejection of cream of any grade, safe. Keep cream clean, cool, covered and market at least twice weekly.

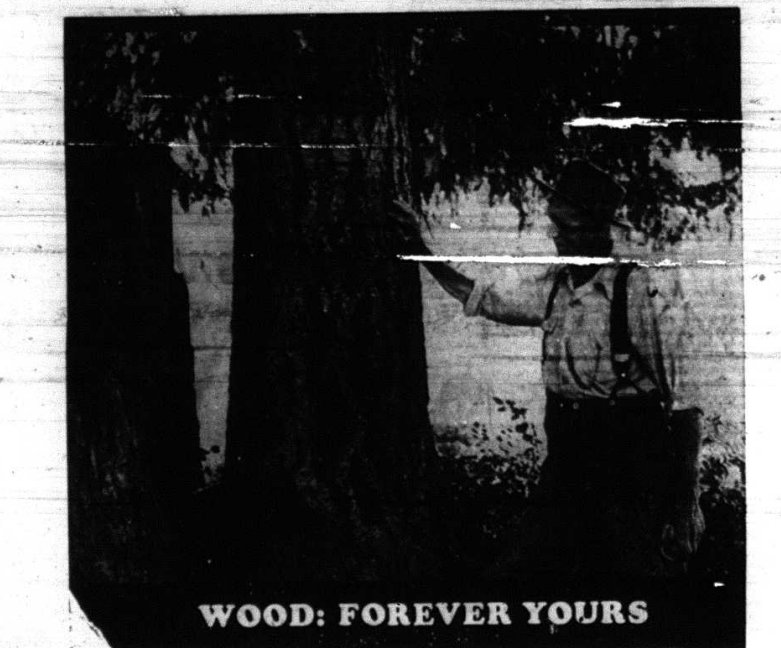

County Agent Notes CLIP PASTURES NOW We have reached the stage on the season when livestock are doing selective grazing. By this we mean they are eating pasture down short in spots, while other spots of the grasses and clovers are getting ahead of the livestock and rapidly approaching the stage when they will be going into maturity. Such pasture should be clipped immediately before seed is produced by the plants that are now being grazed. If this is done now the crop which is clipped will be ready to hay if there is enough to pay to take it off. If there is not enough growth to make hay of the clippings, it may be left on the ground. By clipping at this time the pastures can be kept in a platable and nutritious stage and the livestock will be able to graze over the entire area of the pasture. If the fields are not clipped the mature plants will in some cases take up half of the area of the pasture, reducing the grazing portion by that much. A pasture that has been clipped off and kept in a good, platable state

ORDINANCE NO. 341 THE CITY COUNCIL OF MT. VERNON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

THAT, there be and there is hereby levied, a tax of 5c per hundred dollar valuation, on all taxable property and franchises situated in said city, the proceeds from which levy shall be used for all general expenses and purposes of said City, and shall be deposited in the Bank of Mount Vernon, in what is known as the CENTRAL FUND. There is further levied a tax of 5c on each hundred dollar valuation, situated in said City, the proceeds therefrom shall be appropriated to the BOND SINKING FUND and said funds shall be used for no other purpose. There is further levied against all male voters between the ages of twenty one and sixty five years, living in

said City, a poll tax of \$1.50. All levies herein mentioned are for the taxable year 1954 and shall be subject to 2% discount if paid before November 1st, 1954. All unpaid taxes on and after January 1st, 1955, shall be subject to a penalty of 6%. All taxes herein mentioned were due September 14, 1954.

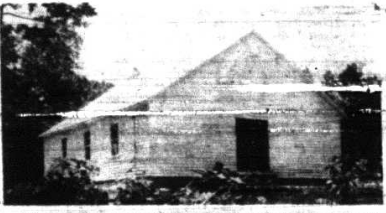

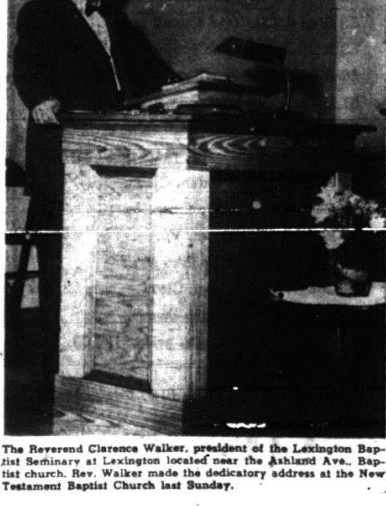

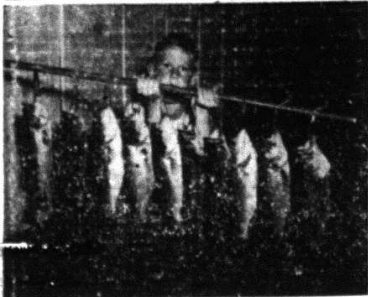
