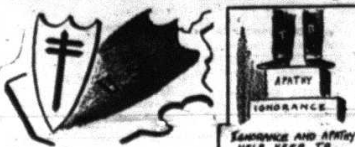

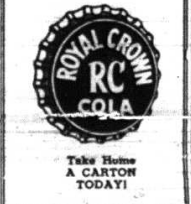

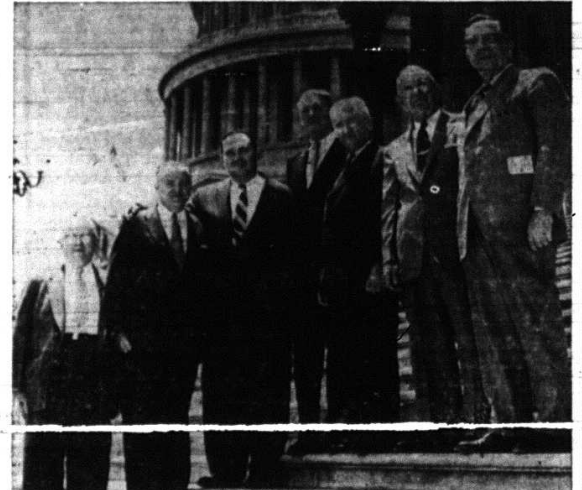

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC PARTICULARLY TO OWNERS OF ALL MOTOR VEHICLES

I wish to inform the public that a law relating to the issuance of licenses on all motor vehicles in the State of Kentucky, which was passed by the General Assembly, became effective June 15, 1954. From that date I must obey the provisions of that law. WHAT THE LAW PROVIDES The law requires that any person applying for a license receipt and plate must submit to the County Clerk to whom the application is made a tax receipt or other evidence showing that he has paid in full all taxes on personal property for the year preceding the one in which the license is issued. For Example, most people will get their personal property taxes between September 15, 1954, and January 1, 1955. Persons who apply for licenses on automobiles between June 17, 1954, and January 1, 1955, may not have their 1953 tax receipt in order for the automobile license to be issued to them. IF YOU HAVE NO TAX RECEIPT If you have not retained your 1952 tax receipt, or at the time you apply for automobile or truck license you do not have the tax receipt in your possession for the next preceding year here is what you may do in order to get a motor vehicle license. You must go to the office of the Sheriff of the county and get from him a signed statement of the personal property taxes collected through his office have been paid. ALSO: if you reside in an incorporated city or town, you must get from the city clerk of such city or town a similar statement that all personal property taxes owed such city or town for the next preceding year have been fully paid. This statement or these statements must be presented by the applicant to the County Clerk's office before license is issued. IF YOU OWED NO PERSONAL PROPERTY TAXES If you owned no personal property taxes for the year preceding the one in which you apply for motor vehicle license, you must in order to have such license issued by our office, bring to this office a statement by the Tax Commissioner of this county that you were not liable for the payment of any personal property taxes for the preceding year.

PERSONS WHO PURCHASE VEHICLES IN COUNTIES OTHER THAN WHERE THEY RESIDE Persons who purchase vehicles in one county and who reside in another county are required to register their vehicles in the motor vehicle county except when the vehicle is principally operated in another county. THIS IS EXPLANATION FOR YOUR BENEFIT This complete explanation of the provisions of the new law is made for the benefit of the

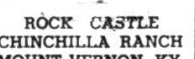

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

The Supervisors of Rockcastle County Soil Conservation district invited the business men from Livingston, Mt. Vernon, and Brodhead on a tour to see some of the problems and conservation measures being used to meet them. The farms of Henry Brown, W. D. Gentry and Roy Brown were visited. Conservation practices of terracing, diversions, tile drainage, pasture development and maintenance, series for hay, stock ponds, multiflora cover for a living fence, bicolor for wildlife were seen by those on the tour and explained by Soil Conservation Service Technician "Cly" Colson.

Dairy Farmers of County Meet At Brodhead, June 26

Farmers listen to experts on dairy business and then visit three farms.

On Saturday, June 26, there was a meeting of seventy-five farmers from Rockcastle county and several surrounding counties, at the Brodhead High School. The main purpose of the meeting was to acquaint the farmers with the recent Kentucky Legislation that would be of direct concern to the Dairy Farmer.

Mr. Roy Turner introduced the days program to the farmers and then turned the meeting over to Mr. Alfred Oppeneyer of Anville Institute. Mr. Oppeneyer is the guest speaker. Mr. Bullard Bennett, a representative from the Guernsey Cattle Association, Mr. Layville Bush, Dairy Specialist from the University of Ky., and Mr. B. W. Fortenberry, Agronomy Specialist from the University of Kentucky.

Mr. Bennett gave a brief talk on the history of the Guernsey breed of cattle and their growth in popularity throughout the country. He brought out strong points in his talk. They were as follows: Have the best cows possible for the herd take good care of the cows feed as much roughage as possible.

Mr. Bush presented the group with a copy of "Intensified Feeding" concerning the new State Legislation that could profitably aid the farmer. A movie, "Sales Promotion of Dairy Products," was shown in connection with this topic. This was sponsored by the American Dairy Association.

Mr. Fortenberry gave an interesting talk on "The Use of Pastures" and "The Seeding of Pastures." He pointed out that good pasture is one of the most important sources of feed for cattle and that the pasture should be given the best of care. He discussed the seeding dates and various methods of seeding legumes and grasses for pasture. A movie, "Silo and Silages" was shown.

A delicious chicken dinner was served by the women of the community to the farmers present. This was served in the school cafeteria.

During the afternoon the farms of Mr. Marcus Brown, Mr. Tim Pitt and Mr. Orville Burdette were visited by the dairy farmers. The meeting and tours proved to be of great educational value to the farmers who attended.

Richmond, Ky., July 1 (Special)—The summer school enrollment at Eastern Kentucky State College is 1180 which is 148 more than the summer enrollment for 1953. Paving Started On U. S. 25 This Week

Breslin Construction Company has announced its readiness for laying concrete foundation for U. S. 25

The Breslin Construction Co. of Louisville which has the contract for the improvement of U. S. 25 between Berea and Berea has the machinery ready to begin pouring concrete in the concrete there will be added to make the first batch of concrete on Wednesday and hopes to have the grading ready so that work on the foundation can proceed without interruption.

The first stretch to be covered will be just north of Snider, next to Mr. Lambert's farm. The road width will be 24 feet. At many places the old foundation will be left intact and the extra width will be added either on one side or on both, whichever the case may be. At present the addition is being removed and the road bed made more level. In such places the entire foundation will be of concrete. On top of the concrete there will be added the asphalt to a thickness of two and three fourths inches, thus giving the entire road bed a thickness of 8-three fourths inches. It is believed that this will make an unusually good road construction and will bear all the heavy traffic that this highway will have to carry. Mr. G. C. Woodford, superintendent of construction for the Breslin Company is pushing the big job ahead as fast as possible. However he fears that the heavy traffic through the summer months will retard the work. He warned that travel over the highway will be hazardous at places but so far there has been only short delays.

When the concrete is being hauled by trucks from the Kentucky Stone Company of Mount Vernon, while the material is being hauled by freight. The dumping place for the material is at Snider where a huge mixing plant has been erected. The cement is hauled from a Louisville concern. This cement is carried from the trucks by conveyors to the supply tower. From this tower the cement is measured in right proportions right into the cement mixer and then is hauled to the place where construction is taking place.

How long it will take to finish the project we did not learn. Needless to say it is a huge project and it will take a great many working days to complete the job.

Rockcastle County Schools To Receive \$162,993.70

Frankfort, Ky., July—School districts in Rockcastle County will receive \$162,993.70 from the \$26,212,500 common school per capita fund to be distributed among all school district in Kentucky this year, according to Superintendent of Public Instruction Wendell P. Butler.

The sum represents \$37.51 for each person between six and eighteen years old living in the district. The per capita figure is slightly lower this year due to an overall increase in the state school census from 687,731 to 698,759, while the fund for overall distribution on a per capita basis remains at the same level. The per capita figure last year was \$38.11.

The per capita allocation does not take into consideration the school equalization fund, for which \$8,753,000 is to be distributed on a need basis. Distribution of this fund will be announced later, following completion of an audit of the school districts in the county.

Withholding Law In Effect This Week

Kentucky's new withholding law on state income taxes starts July 1. Employers are required to withhold Kentucky income tax from all salaries and wages paid to employees after that date. State withholding taxes operate very much like Federal withholding.

During each pay period employers will withhold the tax from each paycheck, based on the salary earned and number of dependents. At the end of the year the employee must file a tax return as in the past, but by that time he will have paid most of his tax through withholding.

This year, however, since the law will be in effect for only six months, only about half of most employees' tax will be paid through withholding.

Employers who have not yet received an instruction booklet on withholding or a Kentucky income tax code number should contact the Income Division, Department of Revenues. Other questions regarding withholding will be answered by the division or one of the district offices located in Louisville, Lexington, Ashland, Covington and Paducah.

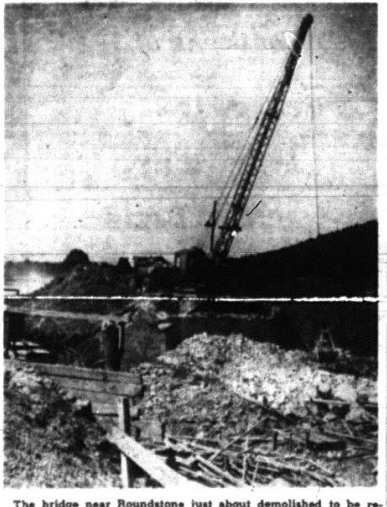
