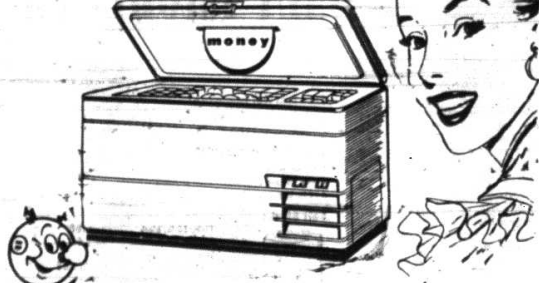

Sen. Ed P. Warinner Candidate For Congress States His Position

State Senator Ed P. Warinner declared that Kentuckians would long feel economic hurt if the administration tax program at Frankfort last winter.

Warinner, of Albany, is a candidate for the Republican nomination for Congress from the Eighth District and vigorously opposed the several tax measures approved by the General Assembly.

Talking to district Republican leaders, Warinner asserts that the changes made by the new laws further unbalance the present inequitable tax structure of Kentucky.

Speaking specifically about the increased tobacco tax which is now effective, Senator Warinner said this "hurts the majority of Kentucky farmers, and the thousands of workers in the tobacco industry in Kentucky as well as many thousands of trades people patronized by these farmers and tobacco workers."

The Senator has received the plaudits of farmers and business people alike for his fight against the tobacco tax and other taxes which he said was waged not only in the interest of people of his district but for all the people of Kentucky.

or butter and milk in Wisconsin—it hits the most people where it hurts most," Warinner said.

"Representatives of various farm organizations and tobacco interests were in Frankfort opposing the added tobacco tax, but the administration sought to rush the bill through the Senate without a hearing. It did go through the House without any sort of public hearing."

Warinner, the Republican caucus chairman, caught the administration forces off guard and offered a Senate motion calling for a public hearing on the tobacco levy. His motion quickly carried. It was the only real opposition move made on the tax program.

Despite the strong arguments presented at the hearing by farmers and tobacco people, the administration forces held together enough votes for passage. Warinner said the full effect of this vote may not be felt for some time, but he predicted a gradual weakening in Kentuckians demand for tobacco products and therefore a weakening in the price of tobacco—the state's leading cash crop. He said that the survival of tobacco as a money crop for Kentucky may depend upon some tax relief for tobacco products—now three times the price received by the growers.

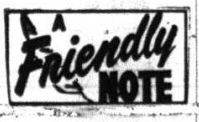

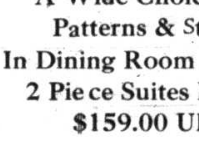

THE BIBLE SPEAKS. BY DR. KENNETH D. FOREMAN. Foreman's Acts 17:18-19; 1 Timothy 2:2-4; Hebrews 1:1-3; 1 Peter 2:2-4. Sermonal Discourse: Psalm 118:1-16.

Book to Grow By. Lesson for July 15, 1954.

EVERY living thing needs food, whether it's a speck of a creature too small to see without a microscope, swimming around in ditch water, or the great elephant. Plants need it. Animals need it. Man needs it. If a body is not fed, it will die. If a child is not fed, it will die. If a man is not fed, he will die. If a nation is not fed, it will die.

From Childhood Acquainted. Most people when they are grown up, when the foods they learned to eat as children, if they are not used to eat rhubarb, or hominy, or squash, or oysters, when you were little, you aren't used to eating them. It's probably after you are grown, it is exactly the same way with the Bible as to life there are exceptions of course. The Christian who gets the most out of the Bible are those who, like Timothy, were from childhood acquainted with the sacred writings. The first and best start toward knowing the Bible and loving it, is when you are a child. It is when you are a child that you are most likely to begin committing Bible passages to your heart.

Study is Hard Work. It cannot be too often repeated. Scripture and do not struggle never comes without struggle. With the Bible. Food for the soul, food for the character, it is not study, but a study absorbed like salt in hot water. If we are to grow by this book of God, we have to study it not just for one or two days read at the sleepiest time of day are better than no verses at all, but real Bible study calls for more serious effort. If the reader is interested he should ask his pastor to recommend some books that his denunciation might help. He should buy a Bible to get a more thorough understanding of Scripture. A Bible dictionary or a Bible atlas is a handy reference. A one volume commentary on the Bible are basic helps. Many churches publish day-by-day booklets with Bible passages for every day and these are useful for devotional hours, but they are often hop-skip-and-jump in the use of Scripture and do not always give the kind of help needed (for example, in studying some particular book of the Bible or Romans) certainly every Sunday for every teacher to own or at least to borrow the help needed for his study of the Sunday school lessons. The reason why so many Christians get so little out of the Bible is simply that they won't put enough time on it.

Live Wires in an Old House. One of the most helpful variations of the Bible in our time is J. B. Phillips, whose "Letters to Young Churches" has helped so many to understand Paul's letters. It says that in his work as a translator he has often felt like an electrician installing fixtures in an old house and as he has done this, he has found the Bible is an ancient book, but it is a living book. The writer to the Hebrews thinks of it not as a dead book, but as a living book. The Bible does more than comfort and strengthen us; it challenges, rebukes, starts us up by divine insight into our darkest hearts. We never grow by the Bible if we are never made ashamed by it.
