Home Agents Notes

The Kieffer pear, the most commonly grown throughout this section never ripens on the tree to an appetizing softness. Even cooking won't make it satisfactory without proper ripening. To ripen this "stone" pear to an appetizing pear, good for cooking, canning, pickles or preserves, they must be picked carefully from the tree, taking care not to bruise and store at a cool temperature 40-65 degrees for two or three weeks. The pears should be gathered when they are two thirds to three fourths full size, that is, when the immature green color has changed to a lighter, slightly yellow shade.

Temperature Tips in Egg Cookery

For safe keeping eggs should be kept cold. However for cooking use a higher temperature. Here are some temperature tips from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

A high quality raw egg separates into a thick and white and most easily when it has been removed from the refrigerator one hour before separating.

For cake making, eggs of average size that is, like other ingredients should be at room temperature to combine well.

Egg-whites whip more easily and to a greater volume when the yolk is off.

For cooking in the shell, take the chill off the egg first.

\$22,130 for Needy in Rockcastle County in July

Residents of Rockcastle County of \$22,130 in Public Assistance payments for July covering old age assistance, aid to dependent children and for the temperature 40-65 degrees for old age assistance, \$8,943 dependent children payments, and \$443 for the needy blind. It was announced by Commissioner of Economic Security V. G. E. Barnes.

County payments in July included \$13,644 for old age assistance, \$8,943 dependent children payments, and \$443 for the needy blind. Statewide payments in the three categories were \$1,197, 447 for the month, which was distributed \$1,969,551 for old age assistance, \$1,135,056 for aid to dependent children and \$101,810 aid for needy blind. Averages were \$15.08 for each aged recipient, \$41.40 for each family caring for dependent children, and \$26.63 for each needy blind person.

County Agent Notes

DAIRY REFERENDUM Many leading dairymen and outstanding agricultural leaders believe that a well planned hard-hitting sales promotion program could easily sell an 8% surplus of dairy products.

It is believed that it is possible to regain much of the decrease in prices paid to farmers for their milk and cream. We are sure that we can produce less if we are to regain the prices farmers were receiving.

Do you believe an expanded year around program for the increased sale of dairy products would be good for dairy farmers? This is the question you will help decide with your vote on Saturday, August 21st. Voting places in Rockcastle County are as follows:

Court House, Mt. Vernon, Lovell's Mill, Broadhead, Hiali's Store, Wildie.

Here is the Referendum now proposed: The Kentucky Legislature at its regular session March, 1954 passed House Bill No. 165 which is an Act relating to dairying and creating a dairy commission. This Act proposed that a deduction, not to exceed two cents per hundred pounds of milk or one-half cent per pound of butterfat be made from every producer's milk check and every dairy producer's cream check on a year around basis. This money will be used to further develop a program of advertising, promotion and research to sell more milk and other dairy foods. This Act specifies that no money can be deducted from producers' checks until this program has been approved by

a majority of the dairy farmers voting.

By Voting "YES" You: 1. Join with your friends and neighbors of the Kentucky dairy industry in a program that assures substantial promotion of the products that earn your living.

2. Reach customers with strong sales messages for your dairy products, proved effective by the American Dairy Association.

4. Keep Kentucky in pace with dairy farmers of other states supporting a sales program.

LAW HELD INVALID

The Kentucky Court of Appeals held invalid the 1954 law requiring automobile license owners to show payment of personal property taxes before they could procure a license. The Appellate Court held that the law did not apply equally to all owners of motor vehicles, excluding buses of more than nine-passenger capacity, and that, it constituted classification in violation of the Constitution.

D. J. Schoer, Versailles automobile dealer, attacked validity of the law. Franklin Circuit Judge W. B. Ardery upheld it, but the Appellate Court held that the law was invalid because it did not apply equally to all owners of vehicles.

RAMBLINGS

It appears as though a great many dog owners would rather let their dogs run loose than pay the vaccine fee. That is happening in a certain section of Fayette County. But we need not go that far. Reports have not come to this office that many dogs have been found on the highway between Elizabethtown and Brodhead. We have not as yet investigated how much truth there is in this story, but it comes to us from pretty good authority. It there are stray dogs found without any tags on them they should be reported immediately to the dog warden who is to take charge of them and dispose of them in some manner. It isn't a very nice thing to thwart the law even if we don't like it. That is no reason to disobey it. It isn't the right method for dog rabies by vaccination, then let the legislature do the changing.

For many rural children school will begin next Monday. In at least 70, mostly one-room school buildings, there will be happy voices, and children will be playing and learning. What they do will depend to a large extent on the quality of teaching. But that is not all. However, hard a teacher may work—and her work is by no means easy—depends also on the cooperation of the parents who are ready and willing to give their support in more than mere lip service. They should visit the school occasionally and get acquainted with the teachers and help in any way possible to improve the school and its surroundings. Parents can do a lot to make the life of the little rural school more pleasant and wholesome.
