COON HOUND DRAG HUNTS

One of the fastest growing sports in the rural communities, coon hound drag hunts, will be staged here Saturday, September 12. The coon dog races will be a part of the Sportman's Day Program which has become a popular annual feature of the fair. Sportsmen and dog owners sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. Forty champion dogs will participate in the races which will begin at ten o'clock in the morning. Preliminary races will continue until noon and at one-thirty o'clock the championship events will be staged in front of the grandstand. Other outstanding events on Sportman's Day will be the Junior Conservation Day and casting for boys from each of Kentucky's nine wildlife districts. ## Unidentified Body Found Buried Near Livingston

### Officers Believe Woman Murdered

The decomposed body of a short heavy-set woman between forty and fifty years old has been found in a wooded land south of Livingston, and officers are looking for the person or persons believed to be responsible for the woman's death.

The signal went to press this week, the woman's identity still remained a mystery, but a coroner's jury had returned a verdict of foul play in connection with the death. The body was found at nine o'clock Saturday morning near Old Highway U. S. 25 about six miles south of Livingston, in the symbol community.

The discovery was made by J. B. Lewis of Symbol, who was looking for some logs which had escaped from a storm blow away several barns in the community.

The woman's body was found covered with a log and other debris. Officers reported that dead and leaves had been raked over the body, but that there was no evidence of tools having been used. It was believed that the log had been moved to the end, about forty or fifty feet from the road on the corner of the creek in Livingston County.

The woman had been wearing a white point dress, with hair her dark brown hair was worn loose and pulled up in some in the back and on the sides. No accessories found near the spot, and officers uncovered only one stocking and garter. A fish was also found in the water near the area, and all of the people nearby were fishing.

Dr. Robert Pennington, London physician, stated that the woman had been dead about three weeks. Her height was five feet, one inch and five eighths inches, and her weight was estimated at between 150 and 175 pounds.

Anyone who might be able to identify the woman is asked to contact the House Funeral Home of London or Laurel County Coroner, Ed Bryant.

### Woman's Clothes Found On Side of The Road

A suitcase of feminine wearing apparel is being held in the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office, with local law enforcement officers left to only wonder about what happened to the owner or owners of the clothes.

The suitcase, along with a beach bag and two shopping bags, was found last Thursday on the side of the road near Roundstone and Green Hill. The only identification is the name R. L. Stokes, on the suitcase.

The bags were found by a group of men out hunting, who reported their find to the sheriff's office.

The suitcase had been tagged by Sheriff Dewey Ballinger to believe the clothes might belong to more than one woman or girl. Only one bathing suit was found in the beach bag, but two bathing caps had been packed. Cash money in both purses totaled 14 cents.

Four school girls from Quail won the talent contest sponsored by the Southern States Co-operative Tuesday night at Renfro Valley.

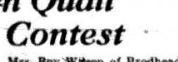
