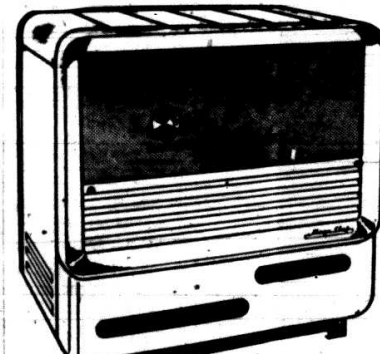



Home Agent Notes

Leaders Training Meeting The homemakers leader training school will be held Wednesday, Sept. 15 at the Home Economics Building on the Berea College Campus.

Only sound, well matured vegetables are worth the storing. Over ripe, woody vegetables do not improve by any vegetables tend to shrivel and mellow of storing. Under ripe dry up under the best storage.

2 Gentle handling is necessary. Carrying from the field to the storage room should be done in boxes and baskets and not in sacks. Skinned places and bruises become starting places for rot and spoilage.

A temperature for "cool" vegetables (white potatoes, beets, carrots, turnips and cabbage) a temperature of 40 degrees F. is required. The nearer 35 degrees is better. For the warm vegetables (wax and potatoes, squashes and cushaws) 60 to 60 degrees is optimum.

Air Humidity For "cool" group, a moist well ventilated room is needed. For the "warm" group the air must be dry at all times, but ventilated.

Ventilation A sure means of ventilation must be provided for changing the air in the storage room. Extension Leaflets 51 "Storage Structures," and 52 "Mounds and Pits," are available at your County Agent's Office.
