Tobacco Grading Demonstrations. Arrangements have been made for the services of a federal tobacco grader from the tobacco branch, United States Department of Agriculture, for holding stripping and sorting demonstrations of Burley tobacco in Rockcastle County. The following schedule has been worked out for these demonstrations: Tuesday, October 19, 10:00 A. M., Wildie at Bill Stewart's farm.

Tuesday, October 19, 1:30 P. M., Spiro at Clyde Capps' farm. Wednesday, October 20, 10:00 A. M., Brodhead High school Agriculture Shop for Broadhead agriculture students only.

Wednesday, October 20, 1:30 P. M., Bert McWhorter's farm, Brindle Ridge. Wednesday, October 20, 7:00 P. M., Brodhead High School, Agriculture Shop for all farmers in Brodhead section.

Thursday, October 21, 10:00 A. M., Bruce Maybaw's farm on Scaffold Cane Road.

Thursday, October 21, 1:30 P. M., Ernest Lakes, farm Red Hill.

Friday, October 22, 10:00 A. M., Roy Brown's farm, Quail. All tobacco growers in Rockcastle County are invited to attend one of these demonstrations. Roy Stivers will be the grader in charge. Sufficient tobacco should be provided for the grader to have ample material for the demonstrations.

It is suggested that tobacco be bulked prior to the time set for the demonstrations to insure having the crop in case or in season for the stripping. All tobacco farmers are urged to bring samples from their individual crops to be stripped.

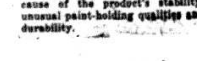

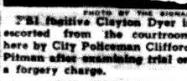
Two Men And Girl Held Here On Forgery Charges

FBI has fugitive warrant for arrest of trio's leader, also wanted for forgery in adjoining counties.

A fugitive from justice wanted by the FBI and law enforcement officials in two adjoining counties has been lodged in the Mt. Vernon Jail along with two accomplices from Corbin.

The trio of two men and a girl was apprehended Saturday night about a half mile south of Livingston after a Mt. Vernon jewelry store operator and the owner of a gift shop at Calloway became suspicious of checks they had received for merchandise purchased in this county.

The two men have been charged with forgery, and the girl has been charged with being an accessory to forgery. The men, Clayton Dyer, 28-year-old ex-convict from Doddsville, Wis., and Harold Arvil Broughton of Corbin are being held under \$1,000.00 bond each, and the girl, Mrs. Sue Johnson Bryant, is being held under \$500.00 bond. The bonds were set by County Judge Walter Bowdler Monday after the men admitted passing the checks. Dyer had signed the checks he gave with the name Kenneth Ruff, and Broughton had used the name Harold Johnson. The girl admitted picking out merchandise paid for with the bad checks, but no evidence was brought out during the examination.

The trio's first stop in this county was Faye's Gift Shop at Calloway, owned and operated by Mrs. Terryson (Faye) Lovell. 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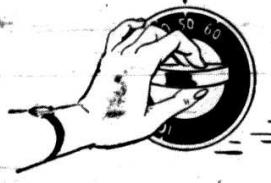

Fall-Added Fertilizer Can Up Corn Yield, Cut Work Load



Fall-fertilized corn (right) makes as vigorous growth as spring-fertilized plants (left), in Minnesota tests.

PUTTING ON this fall the fertilizer you would normally plow down or use in for corn or small grains next spring, can give you a head start on next year's crop operations, the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee points out in a recent statement. Adding fertilizer this fall has these advantages: 1-It leaves you more time for work next spring. Fields and roads are firmer in the fall and the ground is easier to get on with machinery.

2-The fall-added fertilizer will be there in spring with little loss of nutrients on most soils. 3-You will get just as good yields of corn and spring seeded grains from fall-applied fertilizer as from the same amount of nitrogen, phosphate and potash broadcast and plowed under in the spring.

4-It leaves you more time for work next spring. Fields and roads are firmer in the fall and the ground is easier to get on with machinery.

5-You will get just as good yields of corn and spring seeded grains from fall-applied fertilizer as from the same amount of nitrogen, phosphate and potash broadcast and plowed under in the spring.

6-Tests in Minnesota and other Midwestern states indicate that fall fertilization gives an favorable crop results as does spring added fertilizer.

7-Another advantage is that in the fall you are more likely to find the exact grade and amount of fertilizer you need for next year's use. It is important to act promptly, however, in making arrangements for your fall fertilizer supplies so they will be on hand when you want them.

8-As mentioned in these precautions for the use of fertilizer in the fall, Nitrogen fertilizers should not be applied until the soil cools down to 80 degrees or below. Nitrogen and to some extent potash should not be put on sandy soils where there is the probability of leaching through excessive rainfall.

9-Fertilizers should not be applied to frozen ground.

10-Tests in Minnesota and other Midwestern states indicate that fall fertilization gives an favorable crop results as does spring added fertilizer.

County Health Nurse Always Serving Public

The public health nurse for the Rockcastle County Health Department, Miss Lillie Phillips, becomes familiar with the problems of people in your community and can give the benefit of her guidance and counseling.

The public health nurse's uniform is the symbol of help. As she enters into daily activities in Rockcastle County, you meet her in prenatal clinics and parents' classes, in civic meetings, home visits and school.

The variety of services and situations in her public health job involve nutrition, prenatal and child care, school health, tuberculosis control, communicable diseases, control, sanitation, a large-sized mapping of the entire public health field.

Miss Phillips may make a home visit to assist with the care of an active case of tuberculosis. At the same time she will give guidance on ways to protect all family members from this communicable disease, and may suggest they obtain chest x-rays.

Public health education is important in Rockcastle County. When immunizing a young child she discusses with the parents when booster shots should be given and why the shots are necessary. In clinics the nurse gives nutrition information or may stress proper health dental care.

Through case finding in tuberculosis, venereal disease and other communicable diseases, she reports cases, consults with private physicians and aids in preventing the spread of disease.

Your public health nurse is your health yourself. Visit your health department and get acquainted with the public health problems which she deals.
