Repanel Old Door. DON'T discard a door just because the wood is dented and battered beyond repair! It can be salvaged without great trouble or expense. Dr. Robert Harry Miller Dies In Fire Here Tuesday Night

Fire of undetermined origin breaks out in living room of apartment in Vernon Theatre Building.

A fire which left the living room of his apartment in the Vernon Theatre Building a charred remains Tuesday night took the life of Dr. Robert Harry Miller, Mt. Vernon druggist.

The fire broke out shortly before ten o'clock while Mrs. Miller was filling a night appointment at the beauty shop. Dr. Miller had been reading his newspaper. The cause of the fire has not been determined, but it is believed that Dr. Miller may have dozed off to sleep while smoking.

The flames were first noticed at the corner end of the apartment, located over Mary's Cafe. By the time the Mt. Vernon Fire Department could reach the scene, the room was a solid mass of flames, but quick action on the part of the fire department held the flames to the one room with only smoke damage in an adjoining room. Entrance to the room was blocked by a mass of flames and the heat holding fire fighters back until the blaze was extinguished.

Dr. Miller's body was found lying near the door, which led members of his family to believe he may have attempted to escape the fire. A coroner's jury gave suffocation and third degree burns as the cause of death.

The fire broke out while the second show was playing at the Vernon Theatre, with panic spreading throughout the town of Mt. Vernon. Reports were that the theatre was on fire. The Miller apartment stretches out over both Mary's Cafe and the theatre, but the theatre section of the building was not damaged and all patrons in the show were rescued by the building by the time the alarm was spread.

The Vernon Theatre is operated by Dr. Miller's brother, Floyd E. Miller, with the Floyd Miller residence next door to the theatre building. Floyd Miller was in Cincinnati at the time of the tragedy, but a large number of Dr. Miller's relatives and other friends were in the Miller house when the fire broke out, as a child supposed had been held there earlier in the day.

The doctor's wife could see the flames from the window of Elaine's Beauty Shoppe, where she was getting a permanent wave. Mrs. Miller's permanent wave was never finished, as she knew the flames were coming from the room in which she'd left her husband.

Other relatives witnessed the tragedy from across the street. Lewis Miller, owner and operator of the Rockcastle Hotel, is a cousin, and Mrs. Ann Tate Miller and her daughter and granddaughter, Mrs. Dot Borden, also relatives, live in apartment next to the hotel.

The Miller family is one of the oldest in Mt. Vernon. Dr. Miller was born in this county, on November 28, 1891, the son of the late Milton A. Miller, Jr. and Susie Brown Miller, and had lived most of his 62 years here, becoming known and loved by adults and children alike. Mothers and fathers who could still remember going to the Miller drug store as children, remember were always stopping in at drug store for treats and medicines for their children, with Dr. Miller always taking time out to chat with the little ones, remembrance with the proud parents and visit with the uncles and aunts and grandparents.

Miller's Drug Store was a place where everybody knew every body else, and Dr. Miller was

Soil Conservation News

Soil and water conservation loans were made available to eligible farms in Rockcastle County and throughout the nation Sept. 1, 1954 by legislation passed by the 83rd Congress. This new loan program will be handled by the Farmers Home Administration, Department of Agriculture, with technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service and Extension Service.

To be eligible for soil and water conservation loan farmers must have sufficient experience or training to indicate that he has reasonable knowledge with technical assistance in farming operations and unable to obtain the necessary credit on reasonable terms and conditions from private and cooperative sources. These loans may be used to carry out measures for soil conservation, water development, conservation, construction and repair of terraces, dikes, ditches, ponds and other structures, and the purchase of pumps and other irrigation equipment where such irrigation can be carried on in approved areas according to the laws of the State for water rights.

Loan payments will be set up without the shortest period consistent with the ability of the borrower to repay and the useful life of the improvements.

The loan in no case will be a payment period on loans to individuals exceed 20 years and to associations beyond 40 years.

The loan limit for individuals is \$25,000, and secured by lien on chattels or real estate.

Application for soil and water conservation loans can be filed with Mr. Robert Winn, County Supervisor, of the local Farmers Home Administration building located in the county Educational Building in Mt. Vernon, on any Monday morning.

The 3-member county committee of the FHA certifies as to the eligibility of applicants and economic soundness of the improvements to be financed.

The Supervisor will assist in developing sound farm and home plans when a farmer is receiving funds for major land adjustments and extensive reorganization of the farm business.

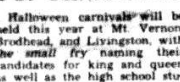

County Agent Notes

Do Not Mutch Strawberries
Yel

Mutching strawberries now will cause damage to the plants and they may be damaged by mutching or by keeping them in a growing condition when they should be dormant.

Strawberries need a cold spell on them to put them into dormancy and if straw is on them they will be kept warm

at the time when they should be cold. Wait until after there has been a cold period and then mutching is safe. Generally speaking you are safe to mutch anytime after Thanksgiving and before Christmas. You will find it was a hard day or two during this period that the straw will not be frozen and will be easy to spread.

This word of warning is given because some patches have been mutch already and just didn't want you to follow

this practice of mutching too early. Mutching demonstrations will be held throughout this area during the winter months and in November. You will get word of these. Plan to attend one.

Have A New Method For Whitening Discolored Nylon Garments

1. Wash garments thoroughly with soap or detergent by hand or machine, depending on construction and type of the garment.

2. Into approximately one gallon of hot water in an enamel container add one package of "E-COLOR REMOVER" and immediately add wet garments. Stir gently while maintaining temperature. If after 30 minutes whiteness is restored evenly, leave in 30 additional minutes. Temperatures in excess of 160 degrees F may set wrinkles that are difficult to remove by ironing.

3. Into approximately one gallon of warm water add two tablespoons of a detergent. Immerse garments and with occasional stirring let soak for 10 minutes. Rinse thoroughly in warm water.

4. For final rinse immerse garment in approximately one gallon of warm water containing two tablespoons of an optical brightener.

whitener. Drip dry and iron with a steam or a dry iron at "rayon" setting throughout this area.

Any precautions supplied by the manufacturers of any product used should be followed. It is important to follow the steps in the order given. Many garments may not need all the steps for satisfactory results.

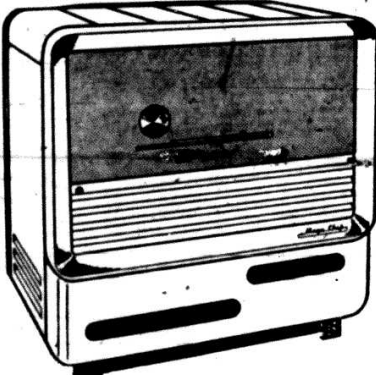

HOTEL OF THE FUTURE IS PIONEERED BY STATLER PROTOTYPE IN HARTFORD



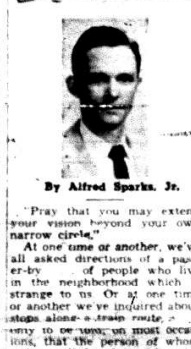
The hotel of the future is now being pioneered in Hartford, Conn., where the Statler Hotel recently opened a new 48-story building, many hotel men consider the first of an entirely new type of smaller structure.
The prototype of tomorrow's downtown inn has been carefully designed and engineered to serve as a test model, incorporating literally thousands of improvements in hotel operation developed by the efficient Statler organization during 46 years of hotel keeping.
The new Hartford hotel is different from any other in the world in several important respects. One of the most important innovations is the use of glass and metal exterior panels which weigh a quarter as much as those of any other hotel in the world, and are as light as such as conventional masonry walls.
While other buildings have been built with exterior walls of glass and metal, such walls elsewhere have been backed by conventional masonry to produce an overall weight more than four times that of the Statler wall.
The new walls consist of only a glass-film insulating panel, backed by a thin, light-weight surface of asbestos board which is merely painted to match the other walls of the room.

THE wonderful thing we know as the "Christian home" is never described directly in the Bible and yet it is in the Old Testament for you cannot have a Christian home without being a Christian. He has never seen a young delinquent coming out of homes where the father and mother lived a life of harmony together. Psychiatrists are dealing with emotional disorders, those weaknesses of the personality which can be so devastating in middle life.
