Cooper Cites U.S. Senate Records Showing Fixed 90% Tobacco Law First Bore Only His Name

April 24, 1948—Senator John Sherman Cooper appeared before the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry to champion and to explain the need for 90% parity on tobacco. 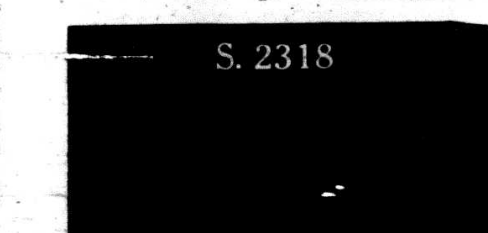
April 24, 1948—Senator John Sherman Cooper is, as Chairman of the Committee points out, "our first witness." The testimony of Senator Cooper appears on Pages 332 and 333 and Pages 441 to 447. His testimony covers approximately nine printed pages of detailed information on tobacco, the tobacco program and parity. All this happened a month and a half before the date on which Mr. Barkley now claims he "explained" the amendment to Senator Cooper.

June 10, 1948—The Congressional Record of this date records the first introduction of the Cooper Amendment in the United States Senate. Introduction of the amendment occurred six days before the date on which Mr. Barkley now claims he "took the amendment" to Cooper "explained it to him and he agreed to offer it."

Sen. John Sherman Cooper of Kentucky today made public photostatic copies of official Senate records to show it was he, and no one else, who wrote and introduced the amendment adopted in 1948 that guaranteed Kentucky farmers a 90 per cent support price for tobacco. Cooper's opponent, Alben W. Barkley, known as the Cooper amendment, is still in force. It became a permanent part of the new farm act at the last session of Congress. At Cooper's request, President Eisenhower recommended continuation of the Cooper 90 per cent fixed parity plan for tobacco. Cooper's opponent, Alben W. Barkley of Paducah, claimed in his opening campaign speech at Shelbyville, that Virgil Chapman of Paris, then a representative, brought the amendment to the Senate and that he (Barkley) and Chapman persuaded Cooper to introduce the amendment. Barkley said in his radio speech at Shelbyville that "I took the amendment to him (Cooper), explained it to him and he agreed to offer it." Barkley added that the Senate "debated it for two days; we had a rollcall on it; it passed." Cooper, in releasing the accompanying photostats of official Senate records, said, "These official Senate records tell the whole truth, and I am willing to stand on that. The people of Kentucky know that I have been in public life for quite a while. No one yet has been able to show where I have made any misstatements. I do not want to go to the Senate if, in order to get there, I have to mislead the people."

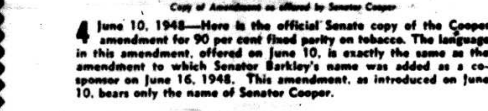

AMENDMENT

Copy of Amendment as offered by Senator Cooper

June 10, 1948—Here is the official Senate copy of the Cooper amendment for 90 per cent fixed parity on tobacco. The language in this amendment, offered on June 10, is exactly the same as the amendment to which Senator Barkley's name was added as a co-sponsor on June 16, 1948. This amendment, as introduced on June 10, bears only the name of Senator Cooper.

June 16, 1948—Senator Cooper calls up his amendment for the consideration of the Senate. The presiding officer of the Senate points out that the Cooper amendment has already been printed and is awaiting action.

Senator Barkley asks that the amendment be reprinted so that he can get his name on it, even though it has been in print since June 10.

Here is the amendment as it was reprinted, identical in every word to the amendment offered six days earlier, on June 10, by Senator Cooper. Barkley now claims he "changed a few words" in the amendment before giving it to Senator Cooper yet the amendment, as finally passed, was exactly the same as originally introduced by Senator Cooper.

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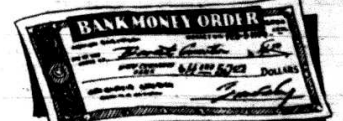
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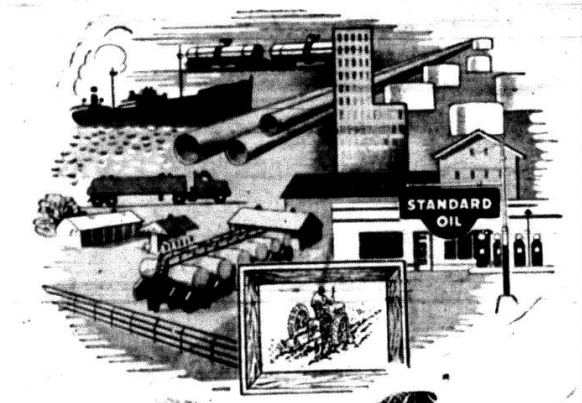

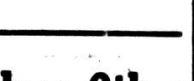

One of the largest crowds ever to attend a speaking hour turned out Friday night to hear Senator John Sherman Cooper, with more than a hundred Rockcastle County citizens and Republican campaign dinner at the Mt. Vernon school earlier in the evening.

The committee in charge of the campaign dinner had scheduled former Fayette Circuit Judge King Swopa as their speaker, but since Cooper's appearance here was scheduled for the same night, both speakers were heard at the Courthouse.

Mr. Cooper spoke briefly, as did his opponent, U. S. Representative James W. Lambert, who also introduced Eugene Siler, Republican candidate for U. S. Representative from this district.

Mr. Cooper was introduced as a Republican himself, when the speaker had formerly served as circuit judge in this district and spoke of his service to the people here in his capacity.

The purpose of his coming here to speak, he said, "was to give an account of his stewardship and to decide for themselves if he had their interests at heart."

Mr. Cooper was elected for a two-year term in the U. S. Senate in 1944 and was again elected to the Senate in 1952. During the interval between Senate terms, he served as U. S. Ambassador at large and consultant to the Secretary of State.

The Senator stated that he had tried with all his heart to advance the particular and peculiar interests of Kentucky. "But they want it here when the tobacco parity bill was introduced," he said, "and now he says he wrote the bill."

The fall's big offering of walnuts, almonds, filberts and dried prunes plus dates suggest fruit cookies as well as fruit cakes. Dried fruit bars that include both fruit and nuts are suggested as company for Halloween or served to cold or spicy. They fit nicely into lunch boxes, too.

and are worth considering for a Christmas greeting. The U. S. Department of Agriculture recipe makes 40 bars and calls for: 1 cup sifted flour; 1/4 teaspoon baking powder; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/4 cup melted table fat; 1 cup sugar; 2 eggs, well beaten; 1 cup chopped nuts; 1 cup chopped dried fruit, your choice of dates, apricots, figs, prunes, or 1-3 egg-nuts with 3-3 cup chopped evaporated apples. To make: Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Mix in the other ingredients in order given. Line a shallow pan with wax paper and spread the batter-mixture on it. Bake at about 350 degrees F. 25 or 30 minutes. Several minutes after removing from the oven, cut into bars about 1 by 3 inches. Turn out on a rack, peel off paper, when firm enough to hold shape, roll warm bars in confectioners sugar.

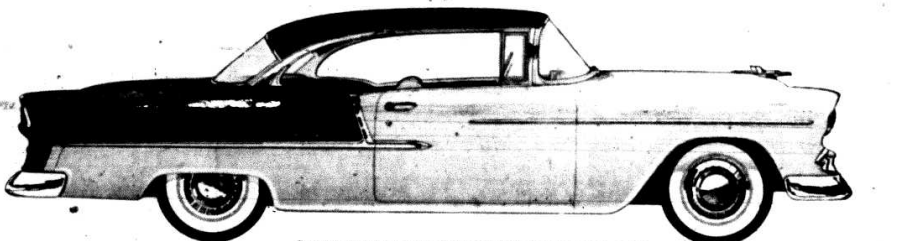
