## Highway 25 Blacktopping Completed To Boone's Gap

Work now underway on stretch of new highway between Boone's Gap and Berea and on Highway 39 near Crab Orchard.

Blacktopping of a six-mile stretch of U. S. Highway 25 between Roundstone and Boone's Gap was completed this week, and construction workers were battling Old Man Winter in an effort to get the blacktopping started on the last stretch of the new highway between Boone and Berea.

Before Tuesday's snow, State Engineer Paul Hooper, Berea, had reported that concrete work on the Boone's Gap-Berea stretch of highway could be completed within two weeks, but inclement weather conditions may delay progress. Until the state engineer reports that traffic will not be in the mud this winter, the concrete work already is 80 per cent completed, 15 per cent 35 per cent completed and the binder course 70 per cent.

Work on the road is being done under state supervision, with the Nally and Hamilton Construction Company of Berea, Inc. on the grading and concrete work, and the Breslin Construction Company of Louisville doing the blacktopping. The deadline for blacktopping of the road is Nov. 15, with possibilities of an extension of time if weather conditions permit.

State Inspector Timothy Smith gave exceedingly heavy traffic as the reason for construction being behind schedule. Until this week, the weather was good, compared to other jobs, Mr. Smith stated.

The road has been widened from 18 to 24 feet, with Class 2 concrete on some sections. The blacktop is 2 and 3-4 inches thick.

Construction superintendent of the blacktopping work is Theodore Mize.

The Nally & Hamilton Company also is working on Highway 39 near Crab Orchard.

County Health News

It is the parents responsibility to see that their children are immunized against those diseases which are preventable. Neglect to do so exposes not only their own children but also their communities as well. Four such preventable diseases are diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus and smallpox. In succeeding columns public health programs to prevent each of these will be dealt with separately.

Many physicians now recommend a triple vaccine which immunizes against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. But whether or not immunization against these three is given singly or simultaneously, the important thing is that children be immunized. Since epidemics often result through negligence, it is important that immunizations be given at an early age, in infancy and that "booster shots" be given as advised by the family physician. Diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus may leave serious after effects or may be fatal, which emphasizes the need for early immunization. If vaccination against smallpox is relaxed, a real epidemic with many fatalities could result. For further information concerning immunizations consult your family physician or the Rockcastle County Health Department.

A pamphlet entitled, "The Prevention and Control of Communicable Diseases," is available through the local health department. The County Health Department may be consulted on Mondays and Fridays, with immunizations given on both days. ARMYWORMS The unusually warm weather for this season of the year has brought a threat of armyworm invasion to Kentucky. For the past few days armyworm moths have been in flight at lights in the evening. Many of these moths have already deposited their eggs in a mass on the leaves. The eggs have hatched. The small worms, less than a quarter inch in length, may now be found in some clover, alfalfa and small grain crops. Foundation Sweet Roll Dough Many homemakers enjoy making a specialty of rolls of different kinds. The following sweet roll dough may be the basis for twists, braids, hot cross buns, clover leaf rolls or other varieties, says Miss Florence Imlay, food specialist at the University of Kentucky. 2 cups milk, 3 tablespoons sugar, 2 teaspoons salt, 3 tablespoons fat, 2 eggs, 1 cake yeast, 16 cup lukewarm water, 7 to 8 cups soft wheat flour.

Scald the milk, add sugar, salt and fat and cool to lukewarm. Add yeast dissolved in lukewarm water and about half the flour. Beat the eggs well and add to mixture. Add more flour to make a soft dough. Place in well greased bowl, cover with cloth, and set in warm place to double in bulk. Shape rolls and place on greased pan. Set in warm place, let rise until light and bake in 425 degrees, for about 20 minutes. Cinnamon Rolls: When dough has doubled in bulk, divide in three equal pieces. Roll each piece in an oblong about 14 by 8 inches in size. Spread with softened butter and sprinkle with 1-3 of this mixture: 2 c sugar, 1 tablespoon cinnamon, 1/4 cup raisins, roll up lengthwise as usually roll. Cut with sharp knife in 1-inch slices, and pull carefully. Place outside up shallow greased baking pan. Let rise until doubled and bake as above.
