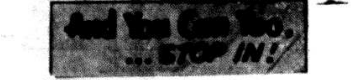
Southern States Meet

Painting Completed

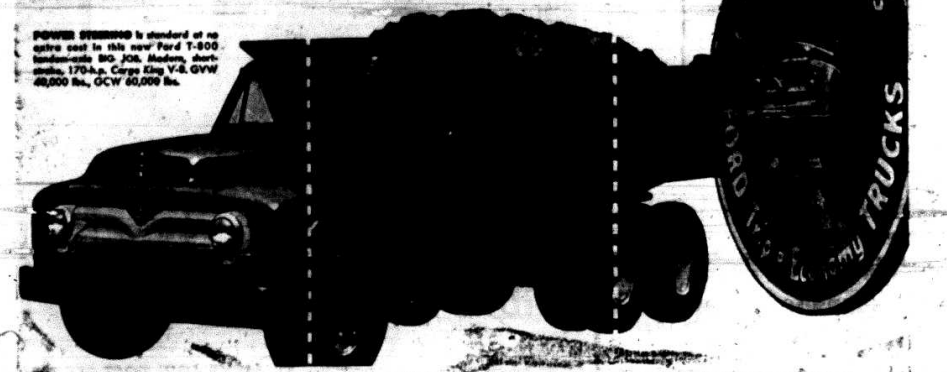
The painters have completed their work at the Mt. Vernon school this week, with the classrooms, library, restrooms and halls all newly decorated.

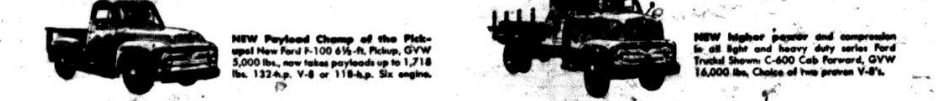

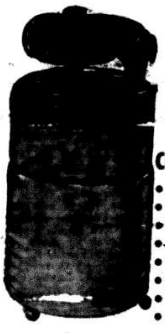

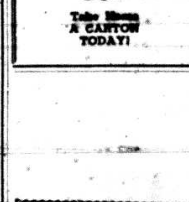

What will the U. S. Senate do with the McCarthy censure? Will it be a lengthy, drawn-out squabble, causing an internal conflict amongst the members of the Senate, or will the matter be disposed of within a short period of time? Tobacco manufacturers will continue their research for more time, and will no doubt cover the pages of the magazines and daily papers of the nation with statements from their doctors whose findings were different.

The Dixon-Yates dispute seems to run up pretty strong. This dispute is about granting the utilities in the Southern states a contract to tie in with the T. A. Some senators state that it is a give-away of power. Others say that it is no more than fair. To my way of looking at the matter, it seems to me to offer a plan that will eventually help equalize electric rates to the consumer. Why should it be necessary to spend millions of the people's money to build dams and power plants for the benefit of only a few? Those who live in the Tennessee Valley have the benefit of low electric rates. People in that region even heat their houses with electricity. It is cheaper than coal, much cheaper than oil. No wonder the senators from the south are fighting the issue. They live on cheap power paid for by the public.

Water in Berea is getting to be a very precious commodity. The lakes are almost empty. There is less than a two-months supply available at present. Rationing is to begin next week. It isn't the first time this has happened to this little town. I wazt through all those agonizing times. Baths were restricted to small wash basins. There was no sprinkling of lawns, no washing of cars, no water for a lot of things. Every faucet leak had to be stopped. Those were hard times, because water is such a necessary item in our daily living. I remember when the second reservoir was built up the valley near Cow Bell Hollow. We thought we had lots of water then, but within ten years there was no water. The dam was raised ten feet and then we thought we had enough. But today we are short of water and a larger lake is

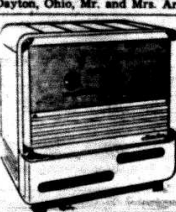
