RECIPE: Smothered Chickens With Potatoes. Now that flocks of hens are being culled, peckers are low and it is a good time to include back or stewed chickens in the menu. Miss Florence Inlay, food specialist at the University of Kentucky recommends smothered chickens also. 3 pound chicken, 1/2 cup flour, and 1/2 teaspoon salt, 5 or 6 medium size potatoes, 1/2 cup parsley. Cut chicken as for frying and shake a few pieces at a time in a bag containing flour and salt. Broil the pieces in hot fat, then place in baking dish to which 1/2 cup hot water is added. Peel potatoes, place on chicken, and bake in a moderate oven, 35-40 degrees, until tender, allowing 45 minutes to one hour. For baking Sprinkle with half the parsley 10 minutes before removing from oven and the remainder just before serving. Menu: Smothered chicken with potatoes, buttered cabbage hot biscuits with butter, cinnamon apple salad and cottage pudding with caramel sauce.

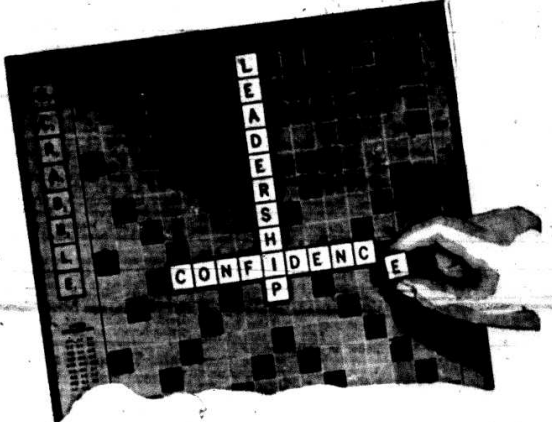

Are you satisfied with your present farming and homemaking program? Do you want to improve the kind of rural living that you like? Is your farm producing all that it should? Would you like to make your farm a better way to farm? Would you like to make more money from farming? Would you like to send your children through school?

The Kentucky Farm and Home Development Program may be offering the opportunities you have been waiting for. This program is a new approach for aiding farm families in solving their problems. Not just one problem, but all problems in the farm home and on the farm. This program brings into balance the crops and livestock, the labor and machinery, the income and expenses. Briefly here is how the program operates.

Planning meetings are held during the winter months when farm work is not pressing. The County and Home Agents present to the families the latest research information and outlook for the future. 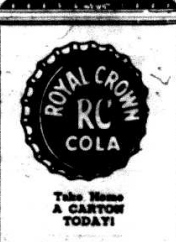

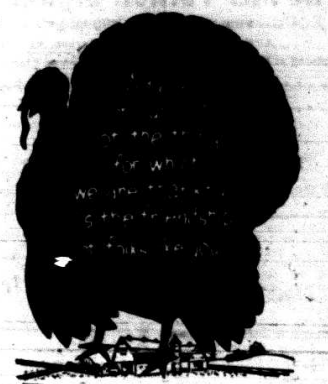

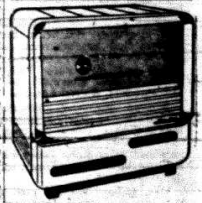
