Soil Conservation News

The supervisors of the Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District are sponsoring an essay contest. The subject for the essays is "How Water Conservation Has Benefited My Community." The Courier-Journal, Louisville Times, W. H. A. S. and the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau are helping furnish the prizes for the best essays.

The essays will all be entered in the County Contest where first prize will be a \$25.00 savings bond. Second place winners will be entered in the state essay contest. Any student in the county may enter the contest. Essays written by grade students will be given special prizes. Three prizes of \$5.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00 will be given to the boys and girls who write the three best essays from the grades below high school.

Information can be secured at the Soil Conservation Service Office or from The County Superintendent of Schools. All essays must be in the County Superintendents office by December 11.

Requests for assistance from farmers on conservation practices are pouring in to the Soil Conservation technicians. Farmers are trying to get conservation work done before winter sets in. Ernest Lakes wants to lay out and build a pond. R. N. Egan has some creek work that he will try to get done before heavy rains begin.

The Savers brothers at Spire have completed straightening, shaping and seeding soil water

ways. Roy Brown has completed 2.5 waterways, diversions and a large pond on his place. C. E. Herrin has some diversions channels laid out for building just as soon as the boiler operator can construct them. Mr. Sexton his neighbor has just completed some sod waterways. Mrs. Algy Shutta will have a pond constructed in a few days.
