Home Agents Notes

Non-producers Schedule December 8-18

Present Poultry Situation
The economic outlook for poultry isn't too bright at the present time. In fact we are facing a situation many of us have never faced before. I don't think that any of us know a definite solution at this time, however, we do know of several practical ways that may help you.

1. Watch your feed costs. This should be done by immediately cutting all non-producing hens, by selling all roosters if hatching eggs are not sold, and by checking your feeders to see that there is no feed wastage. The different methods of feeding may influence feed costs as much as a \$1.00 a bushel, so each hen will eat approximately 100 pounds of feed yearly.
2. Keep hens in production. This is the time of year that you should be alert to keep hens from going into a slump. Forty eight feet of feeder space per hundred hens with an equal amount of good feed in them, kept warm water at all times, at least fourteen hours of light, a wet mash or pellet feeding as production slumps, and keeping your hens comfortable are ways to keep your hens in production.
3. We must produce a quality product. If there is an abundance of any product, the best will be sold first and so on down the line. To produce quality eggs, we must keep clean filters in the nests, keep the floor dry, gather eggs three or four times daily, and cool the eggs rapidly to a temperature between 40 and 60 degrees.

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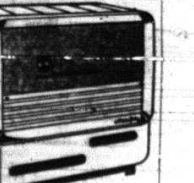
